The account 3 shall consist of gift or grant moneys obtained from any 4 source, including but not limited to the federal government. 5 Moneys credited to the account are appropriated to the 6 department of management to be used for the community empowerment=related purposes for which the moneys were 8 received.

It is the intent of the general assembly to provide 12 communities with the discretion and authority to redesign 13 existing local programs and services targeted at and assisting 14 families expecting babies and families with children who are 5 15 newborn through five years of age. The Iowa department of 16 public health, department of human services, department of 17 education, and other state agencies and programs, as 18 appropriate, shall provide technical assistance and support to 19 communities desiring to redesign their local programs and 20 shall facilitate the consolidation of existing state funding 21 appropriated and made available to the community for family 22 support services. Funds which are consolidated in accordance 23 with this subsection shall be used to support the redesigned 24 service delivery system. In redesigning services, communities 25 are encouraged to implement a single uniform family risk 26 assessment mechanism and shall demonstrate the potential for 27 improved outcomes for children and families. Requests by 28 local communities for the redesigning of services shall be 29 submitted to the Iowa department of public health, department 30 of human services, and department of education, and are 31 subject to the approval of the Iowa empowerment board in 5 32 consultation with the departments, based on the innovation 33 zone principles established in section 8A.2, Code 1997 34 practices utilized with community empowerment areas under <u>35 chapter 28</u>.

DIVISION II

APPROPRIATIONS == EARLY CARE, HEALTH, AND EDUCATION PROGRAMS

FAMILY SUPPORT AND PARENT EDUCATION == FY 5 2006=2007 THROUGH FY 2008=2009. There is appropriated from the general fund of the state to the department of education for deposit in the school ready children grants account of the 8 Iowa empowerment fund for each fiscal year of the period 9 beginning July 1, 2006, and ending June 30, 2009, the 10 following amount, or so much thereof as is necessary, to be 11 used for the purposes designated:

For family support services and parent education programs 13 targeted to families expecting a child or with newborn and 6 14 infant children through age three, in accordance with this 6 15 section:

The amount appropriated in this section shall be 6 18 distributed in each of the fiscal years as part of the school 6 19 ready children grant program funding using the distribution 20 formula approved by the Iowa empowerment board and shall be 6 21 used by a community empowerment area only for family support 6 22 services and parent education programs targeted to families 23 expecting a child or with newborn and infant children through 24 age three.

Sec. 17. EARLY CARE, HEALTH, AND EDUCATION PROGRAMS == FY 26 2006=2007.

1. There is appropriated from the general fund of the 28 state to the school ready children grants account of the Iowa 29 empowerment fund for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2006, 30 and ending June 30, 2007, the following amount, or so much 31 thereof as is necessary, to be used for the purposes 32 designated:

For early care, health, and education programs, in 34 accordance with this section:

2. Of the amount appropriated in subsection 1, \$5,500,000 is allocated to increase the funding desired in is allocated to increase the funding designated for 3 distribution to community empowerment areas to assist 4 low=income parents with tuition for preschool for children

ages four and five who are not attending kindergarten in order 6 to increase the basic family income eligibility requirement to 7 not more than 200 percent of the federal poverty level. In 8 addition, if sufficient funding is available after addressing 9 the needs of those who meet the basic income eligibility 7 10 requirement, a community empowerment area board may provide 11 for eligibility for those with a family income in excess of the basic income eligibility requirement through use of a 7 13 sliding scale or other copayment provision. 7 14 7 15

3. Of the amount appropriated in subsection 1, \$3,500,000 is allocated for efforts to improve the quality of early care, 7 16 health, and education programs. The Iowa empowerment board 7 17 may reserve a portion of the allocation, not to exceed 18 \$100,000 for the technical assistance expenses of the Iowa 19 empowerment office and shall distribute the remainder to 20 community empowerment areas for local quality improvement efforts through a methodology identified by the board to make 2.1 22 the most productive use of the funding, which may include use 23 of the distribution formula, grants, or other means.

Of the amount appropriated in subsection 1, 25 \$1,000,000 shall be credited to the community empowerment 26 gifts and grants account created in this Act within the Iowa 27 empowerment fund. The amount credited shall be reserved for 28 distribution to implement those recommendations of the 29 business community investment advisory council created in this 30 subsection that are approved for implementation by the Iowa 31 empowerment board. Not more than 3 percent of the amount 32 allocated in this subsection shall be used for the expenses of 33 the advisory council created in this subsection.

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A business community investment advisory council is d to advise the Iowa empowerment board. The membership 35 created to advise the Iowa empowerment board. The membership 1 of the advisory council shall be appointed by the governor in 2 a manner to ensure there is representation for rural and urban interests, various geographic areas of the state, and different sizes of businesses. The membership shall be The membership shall be 5 appointed as follows:

(1)Two members from nominees provided by the Iowa business council.

(2) Two members from nominees provided by the Iowa association of business and industry.

(3) One member from nominees provided by the Iowa chamber alliance.

(4) One member from nominees provided by the professional 8 13 developers of Iowa.

Three members representing early care, health, and 8 15 education services providers from nominees provided by the 8 16 state child care advisory council so that representation is 8 17 provided for for=profit child development home providers,
8 18 for=profit child care center providers, and nonprofit child 8 19 care center providers.

One member representing school administrators who have (6) 21 responsibilities involving a public preschool program from 22 nominees provided by the school administrators of Iowa.

(7) One member representing kindergarten teachers from 8 24 nominees provided by the Iowa state education association, 8 25 professional educators of Iowa, and nonpublic schools.

(8) One parent of a child from birth through age five who 27 is not attending kindergarten from nominees submitted by 28 community empowerment area boards.

(9) The directors of the state agencies represented on the 30 Iowa empowerment board may serve as nonvoting, ex officio 31 members of the advisory council.

The advisory council shall advise the Iowa empowerment 33 board on the best means to leverage private investment in 34 early care, health, and education services and provide options 35 for creating model projects for public=private partnerships to support quality early care, health, and education programming in communities. The advisory council shall complete its deliberations by submitting a report with recommendations and 4 findings to the Iowa empowerment board on or before December 5 31, 2006. The report shall address all of the following in addition to other items identified by the advisory council:

(1) A strategy for blending funding for early care, 8 health, and education services from the public sector and the 9 private sector, including but not limited to the funding 10 provided by businesses and individual families. The adv The advisory 11 council shall consider an approach based on that used for the 12 vision Iowa program, the grow Iowa values fund, and other 13 economic models.

(2) A strategy for community empowerment area boards to 9 15 develop and implement local public=private partnership

9 16 networks and apply for state and private funding to implement 9 17 innovative early care, health, and education programming, or 9 18 to be able to apply for competitive grants to enhance such 9 19 partnership networks. The advisory council shall give 9 20 consideration to similar approaches that have been successful 21 in other states.

- Sec. 18. EARLY CARE, HEALTH, AND EDUCATION PROGRAMS == FY 9 28 2007=2008 AND 2008=2009.
 - There is appropriated from the general fund of the 1. 30 state to the department of education for deposit in the school 31 ready children grants account of the Iowa empowerment fund for 32 each fiscal year of the fiscal period beginning July 1, 2007, 33 and ending June 30, 2009, the following amount, or so much 34 thereof as is necessary, to be used for the purposes 35 designated:

For early care, health, and education and preschool programs, to continue programs and initiatives developed 3 pursuant to the appropriation made in this division of this 4 Act for this purpose for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2006:

2. Expenditure of the amounts appropriated in this section is subject to enactment of law specifying how the amounts are to be distributed. It is the intent of the general assembly 10 10 that the increase in funding provided by this section of 10 11 \$5,000,000 over the amount appropriated in this division of 10 12 this Act for the same purpose for the fiscal year beginning 10 13 July 1, 2006, will be designated for the expansion of the 10 14 initiatives implemented pursuant to the business community 10 15 investment advisory council recommendations adopted pursuant 10 16 to this Act.

Sec. 19. PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT AND TRAINING ACTIVITIES. 10 18 The amounts credited to the Iowa empowerment fund for purposes 10 19 of professional development and training activities for the 10 20 fiscal year beginning July 1, 2006, in 2006 Iowa Acts, House 10 21 File 2527 and House File 2734, if enacted, are appropriated to 10 22 be used as provided in this section. For the fiscal year 10 23 beginning July 1, 2006, the Iowa empowerment board shall phase 10 24 out the professional development activities that began in the 10 25 previous fiscal year through community empowerment area 10 26 boards. The designated amounts shall be used for support of 10 27 professional development and training activities for persons 10 28 working in early care, health, and education by the Iowa 10 29 empowerment board in collaboration with representation from 10 30 Iowa state university of science and technology cooperative 10 31 extension service in agriculture and home economics, area 10 32 education agencies, community colleges, child care resource 10 33 and referral services, and community empowerment area boards. 10 34 Expenditures shall be limited to professional development and training activities agreed upon by the parties participating in the collaboration.

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
