


Iowa Population Trends in Race and Ethnicity

- Hispanics and Latinos make up the largest minority population in Iowa at 6.2%, estimated in 2018.
- The largest percentage change in the minority population from 2010 to 2018 is Non-Hispanic Asians, estimated to have increased 58.3% while non-Hispanic blacks and African Americans have increased by 32.9%. Hispanics and Latinos show an estimated 28.3% increase, while the non-Hispanic white population shows a -0.4% decline from 2010 to 2018.
- The most diverse age category is the under 5 population, with a minority population of 21.0%.
- Median age is significantly lower in minority populations; however, the median age has increased across all races since 2010.

Increase in the Percentage of Minority Population by County — 2010-2018




Change in Percentage


Change in the Percentage of Hispanics or Latinos (of Any Race) by County — 2010-2018




