

In 1961, he was elected a Fellow in the American College of Trial Lawyers. From 1973 to 1978, he was president of the Iowa Law School Foundation. He was the recipient of the Hancher-Finkbine Medallion, in 1978, which is granted annually to an alumnus of the University of Iowa based on leadership, learning and loyalty.

Donovan Burington died March 30, 1998. Survivors include his wife, Jeanne Burington, Mason City; two daughters, Anne Dillaber, Denver, Colorado; and Jane Coutts (husband, Stephen), Rancho Santa Fe, California; five grandchildren; and two great-grandchildren. His parents and one brother preceded him in death.

HERBERT L. CAMPBELL II

Mr. Speaker: Your committee appointed to prepare a suitable resolution commemorating the life, character, and public service of the late Honorable Herbert L. Campbell II, begs leave to submit the following memorial:

Mr. Campbell was born on December 24th, 1910. He married Neva Stacy in 1931. They had one daughter and three sons.

Mr. Campbell graduated from Seymour High School and attended Iowa Wesleyan College in Mt. Pleasant. He lived in the Washington area his entire adult life, devoting his energy to farming. Known for his avid interest in soil stewardship and the responsible care of the land, Mr. Campbell organized the first soil conservation district in the Washington County area. He was active in tree planting efforts, and won the coveted Master Farmer Award. His special interest in agriculture and social concerns led him to run for the Iowa House of Representatives, where he served for four years, from 1969 to 1972.

Mr. Campbell was also an active member of the Washington United Methodist Church, Y's Men, Sigma Phi Epsilon, YMCA, Isaac Walton League, past president of the Washington County Fair Board, Farm Bureau, Rotary Club and Halcyon House Board of Directors. He was also interested in education issues, serving as a school board director, treasurer of American Field Service, and President of Campbell Farms, Inc.

Mr. Campbell died on March 10, 1998 at the Washington County Hospital at the age of 87. He was preceded in death by his parents, his wife Neva in 1983, and one sister and one brother. He is survived by his family of one daughter, Linda Campbell of Chicago, Illinois; and three sons, Herbert L. (Larry) Campbell III of Earl, Arkansas; Bruce M. Campbell of Washington, Iowa; and Rodney K. Campbell of Homewood, Illinois. Other survivors include ten grandchildren, nine great-grandchildren, and one sister Erma Bohrer of Laramie, Wyoming.

HORACE C. DAGGETT

Mr. Daggett, son of Mildred (Rundlett) and Donald Daggett, was born on May 15, 1931 in Prescott, Iowa. Horace graduated valedictorian from the Prescott Community School District in 1948. He played basketball, receiving Honorable Mention All-State recognition his senior year.

Horace was united in marriage on September 28, 1952 with Ruth A. Foster, and to this union five children were born: Sherry, Dennis, Debra, Dale and Douglas.

Horace began farming in 1950 on 160 acres near Prescott and retired from that occupation 1991.

Horace's military career began in 1949 when he joined the Army National Guard in Corning, Iowa, as a member of the 168th Infantry. He concluded his career as Sergeant Major, one of the highest ranks attainable by non-commissioned personnel.

Horace began his public life in 1968 with his election to the Lenox School Board. In 1973, he began serving in the Iowa House of Representatives, serving 24 years. He truly loved these endeavors and viewed himself as a servant to his constituents. In 1996, he was selected Republican National Legislator of the Year.
