Louis Kopriva farmed northwest of Pocahontas until his retirement in 1946. He also sold liability insurance for the past twenty years.

The Honorable Louis L. Kopriva had a life-long interest in politics and civic affairs. He served as a member of the Sherman township school board and as township trustee. He also assisted in the organization of the AAA in Sherman township. He served Pocahontas county as a Representative in the Fifty-third General Assembly of the Iowa State Legislature. He was a member of the Fourth Degree Knights of Columbus of the Bishop Heelan Assembly.

THOMAS L. KUHN

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, appointed to prepare a suitable resolution commemorating the life, character and public service of the late Thomas L. Kuhn, begs leave to submit the following memorial:

Thomas L. Kuhn, legislator and servant of the public, was born at Hepburn in Page county, Iowa, in 1892. He passed away at the St. Francis Hospital, Maryville, Missouri, on October 15, 1952, at the age of sixty years. He received his education in the public schools at Lenox and Bedford, Iowa.

He was married in 1911 to Clara Daugherty of Bedford, Iowa, who passed away in September, 1944. To this union were born three daughters and four sons: Mrs. Arthur King, Blockton, Iowa; Mrs. Kenneth Olson, Seattle, Washington, and Mary A. Kuhn, now deceased. Also, Thomas L. Kuhn, Jr., Seattle, Washington; James A. Kuhn, Seattle; Kenneth D. Kuhn, who died in service, and Charles P. Kuhn, now de-

ceased. A second marriage was consummated in 1945 to Mae McCurdy of Bedford, Iowa, who now survives.

He was a member of the Methodist Church and of the Odd Fellows Lodge. He served his country as county auditor and clerk of Taylor county for eight years and worked for the state auditor in the homestead department. Four years ago he was named county assessor of Taylor county, in which capacity he was serving at the time of his death.

In 1941 Honorable Thomas L. Kuhn was elected to represent Taylor county in the House of Representatives. He served in the Fiftieth Session of the General Assembly of Iowa.

Mr. Kull was born March 14, 1876, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Kull of Bloomfield, Wisconsin. He died March, 1953, at the age of 77 years.

He was graduated from the Lake Geneva High School and while still a young man he joined the Lake Geneva Congregational Church.

He was married in 1900 to Jessie Arnold and following their marriage they moved to a farm near Cresco, where they lived for twenty years. Then then retired and moved to Cresco.

Mr. Kull was elected Representative and served in the Thirty-second, Thirty-second Extra, Thirty-third and Thirty-fourth Sessions of the General Assembly.
