

Mr. Junker was a member of the Republican Party and served in the House of Representatives from 1973 to 1979.

A talented musician and composer, Mr. Junker was a 38-year member of the Sioux City Symphony Orchestra where he played viola. His civic involvement included the Museum Association Board where he was a past vice-president, member of the Sioux City Council from 1970-1972, and membership at Blessed Sacrament Catholic Church.

Willis Junker died on April 29, 1998, in a Sioux City hospital after being stricken unexpectedly at his home. He was proceeded in death by his daughter, Julie Junker. Survivors include his wife, Nancy of Clive; son, Stephen of Ames; and other relatives.

Mr. Lane was born on May 9<sup>th</sup>, 1905. He married Mildred Johnston and they had two children, Jon Allen and Lynda Carol, and a foster daughter, Patricia Margaret.

Mr. Lane attended rural school and high school in Jasper County. He graduated in agricultural economics from Iowa State College.
