HONORABLE DAVID E. MACKIE

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, appointed to prepare resolutions commemorative of the life, character and public services of the late Honorable David E. Mackie, of Benton county, Iowa, begs leave to submit the following report:

David E. Mackie was born in Benton county, Iowa, June 2nd, 1870, on a farm near Mount Auburn, Iowa. His boyhood days were spent on the farm owned by his father, and attended the rural school, later attending the Tilford Academy at Vinton, Iowa, and graduated from the Business College at Dixon, Illinois. After completing his education Mr. Mackie assumed the management of his father's farm. In November 1898, he was united in marriage to Miss Olive L. Graham, and to them were born three sons, all remaining to mourn the departure of a faithful and loving father. They are R. Leland Mackie, Vinton, Iowa; Eldon Mackie, Vinton, Iowa, and Donald G. Mackie, Charles City, Iowa.

Mr. Mackie was one of the very successful farmers of that day, also was president of the Mount Auburn Savings Bank for twenty-five (25) years. In 1920 he moved from his farm to Vinton, Iowa, and became engaged in the implement business continuously until the time of his death.

He was affiliated with the Presbyterian Church and was a very active member.

He was a life-long Republican, and in the year of 1915 he accepted the call of his party as a Candidate for State Representative. He was elected and served in that capacity during the Thirty-sixth and Thirty-seventh sessions of the General Assembly. He rendered a full measure of service to his county and state in this position.

He lived a long, honorable and active life and deserved the honor and respect so beautifully expressed by all who knew him.

HONORABLE JAMES SAMUEL MICHAEL

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, appointed to prepare resolutions commemorative of the life, character and public services of the late Honorable James Samuel Michael, of Woodbury county, Iowa, begs leave to submit the following report:

James Samuel Michael was born on April 3, 1859, at Sir John's Run, Virginia, and was the son of Andrew Jackson Michael and Lenora Corne Michael. He was of the 1879 class at Shepherd's College at Shepherds-town, Virginia.

In 1884 Mr. Michael came to Sioux City and established the Sioux City Seed Company, one of the largest in the middle west.

Mr. Michael married Miss Alice Smith, a native of Sioux City, Iowa, in 1888, and she, together with her two children, Mrs. Helen Michael Wilde, and Berkeley Michael, mourns the death of her beloved husband.

Mr. Michael served as the only Democrat elected from Woodbury county in the Thirty-sixth General Assembly of the state of Iowa. He was a member of Landmark Lodge, A. F. and A. M., the Sioux City Consistory, Knights Templar, Abu-Bekr, Sons of the American Revolution, Progress Club, Boys of '68 and the Pioneer Club, having served the Pioneer Club as its president for two terms. He was a member of St. Thomas' Episcopal Church. He was at all times a perfect gentleman, genial, kindhearted and devoted to his family and friends.
