JACOB FREDERICK MILLER

MR. PRESIDENT: Your committee, appointed to prepare a suitable resolution commemorating the life and public service of the late Honorable J. F. Miller, submits the following report:

Jacob Frederick Miller was born at Chatsworth, Illinois, August 5, 1887, and died June 19, 1953. When nine years old his parents moved on a farm in Franklin County, Iowa, where he grew to manhood and was educated in the Franklin county schools. He taught school, specializing in manual training at Valparaiso University, and also attended Iowa State Teachers College. He became manager of the Farmers' Cooperative Association at Latimer, Iowa, in February, 1913. In 1919 he purchased a grain and feed business in Humboldt. He was married June 4, 1913, to Miss Gayle Tilton of Humboldt. To this union were born two children, a son, Wayne, and a daughter, Arlene. He was a member of the Methodist Church. He was very active in church and school work, serving fifteen years as a member of the Humboldt board of education. He was also a member of the Rotary Club.

Mr. Miller was elected to, and served in the Iowa House of Representatives during the Forty-eighth, Forty-ninth, Fiftieth, Fiftieth Extra, and the Fifty-first General Assemblies, and served the Fiftieth district in the Senate during the Fifty-second session.

Therefore, Be It Resolved by the Senate of the Fifty-sixth General Assembly: That in the passing of the Honorable J. F. Miller, the state has lost one who has always been very active in public affairs and kept interested and well informed on political matters, and the Senate tenders by

L. T. QUIRK

MR. PRESIDENT: Your committee, appointed to prepare a suitable memorial commemorating the life, character and public service of the late Honorable L. T. Quirk, begs leave to submit the following report:

L. T. Quirk, son of Thomas and Mary Quirk, was born January 20, 1874, in Clinton County, Iowa, and died January 15, 1954, at the age of 79 years. In 1876 he came with his parents to Sac County where he continued to live until the time of his death. He received his early education in the rural schools and later attended Sac Institute and Morning-side College. He taught in rural schools for several years.

On April 18, 1899, he was united in marriage to Fannie Fox and they established a home in Levey Township where they bought a farm. One son, Edward Lewis, was born to this union.

Mr. Quirk joined the Methodist Church in early manhood and was active in the church and community affairs. He was the first president of the Sac County Farm Bureau and took an active part in politics. He was elected to the State Legislature in 1922, serving in the House of Representatives for three terms and then was elected to the Senate. While in the Senate he was appointed to fill a vacancy in the State Highway Commission where he served for two years.

Mr. Quirk was a member of the Sioux City Consistory and the Pioneer Lawmakers of Iowa, and a fifty year member of both the Masonic Lodge and the Order of the Eastern Star.

He is survived by his wife, Fannie, of Lake View, Iowa, their son, Edward, of McNary, Arizona, and a brother, George, of Storm Lake.
