

Dr. Slaughter was born at Hector, Schuyler county, New York, July 6, 1855. He was born and lived on a farm, and received such education as was afforded in the rural schools. Later he attended Colgate Academy at Hamilton, New York, after which he took up the study of medicine and received his degree from the Chicago Homeopathic Medical College in 1887.

In 1883 he was united in marriage to Mrs. Anna Matthews Chase of Chicago, Illinois, and to this union were born three children, Miss Marguerite Slaughter, Mrs. Warner A. Cruisenberry and Mr. Hugh Slaughter.

He moved to Iowa in 1896, first locating in Emmet county and afterwards locating in Wapello county. His life was given to public service and during his residence in Wapello county he served twice as coroner of the county. He represented Wapello county in the House during the Thirty-sixth, Thirty-seventh and Thirty-eighth General Assemblies.

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#### HONORABLE CHARLES C. SMITH

**MR. SPEAKER:** Your committee, appointed to prepare memorial resolutions commemorating the life, character and public services of the Honorable Charles C. Smith, a former member of the General Assembly of Iowa, begs leave to submit the following:

Charles C. Smith was born near Roxby, Lincolnshire, England, on February 1, 1854. He grew up in his native country and when twenty years of age came to America and located in Nebraska, later moving to Iowa and settling in Cass county.

When Mr. Smith came to Cass county he met a very prominent farmer, Mr. Lawrence Dolan, who offered the young man work. Mr. Smith accepted, little realizing that he would become one of the leading men of that part of the country. Being a very industrious man he soon began to prosper and in a short time decided to farm for himself.

In 1922, Mr. Smith retired from active farm life and moved to Griswold to make his home. He never lost interest in farm life and was always happy when he was on the farm. During the last years of his life he often went out and, while he did little work, he assisted in the management of the old home place.

Mr. Smith was a man in whom everyone had confidence. During the years of his residence on the farm he held many offices of trust and was a member of the Cass County Board of Supervisors for several terms.

He was Representative from Cass county in the Thirty-sixth General Assembly.

Mr. Smith was more than a farmer. He was a man who could recognize the progressive character of the times. He was a man of very broad vision.

Early in life Mr. Smith became a member of Cass Lodge No. 412, A. F. & A. M., filling the offices of the lodge with honor. He was also a member of the Methodist church of Griswold. He worked in the interests of the Sunday school and was ready and willing to do his every duty for the uplift of mankind.

He was married to Miss Millie A. Shaffer, October 11, 1877. Five children were born into the happy home, four sons and one daughter. They are Miss Laura, who remained at home with the parents, Ross, John, and Ray, all of whom reside in the vicinity of Griswold. One son, Fred, passed away about three years ago.

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#### HONORABLE LEONARD E. STANLEY

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, which was appointed to report resolutions commemorating the life, character and services of the late Leonard E. Stanley, begs leave to submit the following report and moves its adoption:

Leonard E. Stanley was born in Columbiana county, Ohio, April 4, 1853, and died at his home in Corning, Iowa, August 1, 1932.

When a few weeks old he came with his parents to Johnson county, Iowa, thence to Warren county. Mr. Stanley has been closely associated with the growth and development of Adams county since the settlement days of the early seventies.

On February 4, 1879, he was married to Hannah Hogenkamp. To this union were born six children, five of whom, along with the widow, survive the deceased.

Mr. Stanley's church affiliations have been, for the past thirty-five years, with the Congregational church in Corning, where he served on the Board of Deacons for several years. He was born and reared in a Quaker home and those early influences have ever dominated his life.

The abilities and character of Mr. Stanley have been utilized in public
