#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY** EDUCATION APPROPRIATIONS BILL

#### FUNDING SUMMARY

**General Fund FY 2020:** Appropriates a net total of \$954.1 million from the General Fund and 11,843.0 full-time equivalent (FTE) positions for FY 2020 to the Department for the Blind, the College Student Aid Commission, the Department of Education, and the Board of Regents. This is an increase of \$33.2 million and a decrease of 73.2 FTE positions compared to estimated net FY 2019.

The funding includes \$960.9 million associated with appropriations typically funded in the annual Education Appropriations Bill and a net decrease of \$6.8 million to standing appropriations typically funded in the annual Standing Appropriations Bill. Included in the funding total in this Bill and in the attached tracking is the standing appropriation of \$1.8 million to the College Student Aid Commission for the Vocational-Technical Tuition Grant.

**Other Funds FY 2020:** Appropriates a total of \$40.3 million from the Skilled Worker and Job Creation Fund (SWJCF) for FY 2020. This maintains the current level of funding compared to estimated net FY 2019.

**Standing Appropriations FY 2020:** The Bill includes net decreases to unassigned standing appropriations totaling \$6.8 million compared to estimated net FY 2019. This represents a decrease of \$15.0 million compared to the appropriations specified in statute.

Specifies that the report will include computer science instruction provided by grade level, detail of moneys deposited into the Computer Science Professional Development Fund from public and private sources, award amounts from the Fund, and the impact on teachers.
