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FUNDING SUMMARY

Other Funds — FY 2025: This Bill appropriates a net total of \$223.2 million for FY 2025 from the following sources:

- Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund (RIIF): \$224.5 million in FY 2025. *(See note)*
- Technology Reinvestment Fund (TRF): \$19.8 million in FY 2025. This Bill appropriates \$21.1 million to the TRF from the RIIF.

Note: To avoid double counting, the \$21.1 million appropriation to the TRF from the RIIF is excluded from the total above.

Other Funds — FY 2026: This Bill appropriates \$18.2 million from the RIIF in FY 2026.

General Fund — FY 2025: This Bill suspends a \$5.0 million appropriation from the General Fund to the Renewable Fuels Infrastructure Fund (RFIF) for FY 2025 and appropriates \$10.0 million to the RFIF from the RIIF.

Technology Projects: Appropriates a total of \$3.6 million in FY 2025 from the TRF to the DOC for the following technology projects: Page 9, Line 33

- \$200,000 for Iowa Medical and Classification Center (IMCC) pharmacy pill counting/sealing machine replacements.
- \$100,000 for IMCC network switch equipment replacements.
- \$500,000 for Iowa Correctional Institution for Women (ICIW) network switch equipment replacements.
- \$200,000 for statewide ICIW/IMCC server replacement.
- \$140,000 for various Community-Based Corrections (CBC) technology updates.

Criminal Justice Information System Integration (CJIS): Appropriates \$1.4 million in FY 2025 from the TRF to the DOM for continued development and implementation of the CJIS. Page 11, Line 10

Endpoint Detection and Response: Appropriates \$1.1 million in FY 2025 from the TRF to the DOM for statewide endpoint detection and response. Page 11, Line 17

Iowa Centralized Logging and Monitoring Platform: Appropriates \$1.8 million in FY 2025 to the DOM for cybersecurity incident investigation response. Page 11, Line 20

Department of Revenue (IDR)
Tax System Modernization: Appropriates \$4.1 million in FY 2025 from the TRF to the IDR to continue updating information systems used for tax collection. Page 11, Line 23

Law Enforcement Radios: Appropriates \$1.6 million in FY 2025 from the TRF to the DNR for replacement of law enforcement radios. Page 11, Line 26

Department of Management
Technology Reinvestment Fund: Appropriates \$21.1 million in FY 2025 from the RIIF to the TRF. Page 15, Line 24

CHANGES TO PRIOR APPROPRIATIONS

Health and Human Services: Amends a previously enacted TRF appropriation for FY 2020 to the HHS for the upgrade of the Medicaid Management Information System by allowing the FY 2020 appropriation to remain available for expenditure until the end of FY 2025, or until the project is completed, whichever is earlier. Page 12, Line 17

Department of Corrections: Amends previously enacted RIIF appropriations for FY 2022 and FY 2023 to the DOC for the remodel and expansion of the kitchen and visitation areas at the Clarinda Treatment Complex by allowing the funds to remain available for expenditure until the end of FY 2025 and FY 2026, or until the project is completed, whichever is earlier. Page 13, Line 15

Health and Human Services: Amends a previously enacted TRF appropriation for FY 2022 to the Department of Inspections and Appeals for the costs associated with securing and maintaining a foster care registry by allowing the funds to remain available for expenditure until the end of FY 2025, or until the project is completed, whichever is earlier.

Page 14, Line 11

NOTE: 2023 Iowa Acts, [Senate File 514](#) (State Government Alignment Act) realigned the Child Advocacy Board, the entity responsible for establishing a registry of the placement of all children receiving foster care, from the then Department of Inspections and Appeals to the Department of Health and Human Services. Under Senate File 514, the Department of Inspections and Appeals was renamed to the Department of Inspections, Appeals, and Licensing.

Department of Corrections: Amends previously enacted RIIF appropriations for FY 2023 to the DOC for kitchen equipment at the Clarinda Treatment Complex and various infrastructure projects at correctional facilities to remain available until the end of FY 2026, or until the project is completed, whichever is earlier.

Requires the DPD to report to the General Assembly by December 15, 2024, on the projects funded with appropriations in this Bill.

Specifies that Division III of the Bill, which applies to changes to prior appropriations, is effective upon enactment.

 1 2 REBUILD IOWA INFRASTRUCTURE FUND

1 3 Section 1. REBUILD IOWA INFRASTRUCTURE FUND —
 1 4 APPROPRIATIONS. There is appropriated from the rebuild Iowa
 1 5 infrastructure fund created in section 8.57 to the following
 1 6 departments and agencies for the following fiscal years, the
 1 7 following amounts, or so much thereof as is necessary, to be
 1 8 used for the purposes designated:

1 9 1. DEPARTMENT OF ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES

1 10 a. For the demolition of the fleet building located at 307
 1 11 East Seventh Street, Des Moines, Iowa, notwithstanding section
 1 12 8.57, subsection 5, paragraph “c”:
 1 13 FY 2024-2025:
 1 14 \$ 1,997,500

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund (RIIF) appropriation to the Department of Administrative Services (DAS) for fleet building demolition. This appropriation is exempt from the vertical infrastructure requirement in Iowa Code section [8.57\(5\)\(c\)](#).

DETAIL: This appropriation would fund the demolition of the vacated fleet building located at the northeast corner of East 7th Street and Walnut Street in Des Moines and return the area to green space.

1 15 b. For major maintenance projects:
 1 16 FY 2024-2025:
 1 17 \$ 20,000,000

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the DAS for major maintenance projects to State facilities.

DETAIL: Major maintenance funds are used to correct deficiencies in State buildings and make a wide range of repairs. Major maintenance is defined as “expenditures made beyond the regular, normal upkeep of physical properties for the repair or replacement of failed or failing building components as necessary to return a facility to its currently intended use, to prevent further damage, or to make it compliant with changes in laws, regulations, codes, or standards.”

1 18 c. For elevator upgrades and replacement on the capitol
1 19 complex and Terrace Hill:

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the DAS for elevator upgrades and replacements.

DETAIL: This appropriation would fund the elevator upgrades and replacement on the Capitol Complex.

1 22 2. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE AND LAND STEWARDSHIP

1 23 a. (1) For deposit in the water quality initiative fund
1 24 created in section 466B.45 for purposes of supporting the
1 25 water quality initiative administered by the division of soil
1 26 conservation and water quality as provided in section 466B.42,
1 27 including salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous
1 28 purposes, notwithstanding section 8.57, subsection 5, paragraph
1 29 "c":
1 30 FY 2024-2025:
1 31 \$ 8,200,000

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the Iowa Department of Agriculture and Land Stewardship (DALS) for the Iowa Water Quality Initiative. This appropriation is exempt from the vertical infrastructure requirement in Iowa Code section [8.57\(5\)\(c\)](#).

DETAIL: The Water Quality Initiative provides funding for prioritized watersheds to implement conservation practices that will reduce nutrient transport to bodies of water in Iowa. Funded projects are typically managed by soil and water conservation districts. The Initiative was appropriated \$5,200,000 from the RIIF each year from FY 2016 through FY 2022. In FY 2023 and FY 2024, the Initiative was appropriated \$8,200,000 from the RIIF. The Initiative has also received funding from the General Fund and the Environment First Fund. Since FY 2013, the Water Quality Initiative has received a total of \$109,945,201 from the General Fund, Environment First Fund, and RIIF.

1 32 (2) (a) The moneys appropriated in this lettered
1 33 paragraph shall be used to support demonstration projects in
1 34 subwatersheds as designated by the department that are part
1 35 of high-priority watersheds identified by the water resources
2 1 coordinating council.

Requires the appropriated funds to be used to support demonstration projects in subwatersheds that are included within high-priority watersheds as identified by the Water Resources Coordinating Council. Requires funds to be used to support demonstration projects in watersheds generally, including regional watersheds identified by the Water Resources Coordinating Council.

2 2 (b) The moneys appropriated in this lettered paragraph
2 3 shall be used to support demonstration projects in watersheds
2 4 generally, including regional watersheds, as designated by the
2 5 division and high-priority watersheds identified by the water
2 6 resources coordinating council.

2 7 (3) In supporting projects in watersheds and subwatersheds
2 8 as provided in subparagraph (2), all of the following apply:

Specifies the following criteria for projects in high-priority watersheds:

2 9 (a) The demonstration projects must utilize water quality

- Requires that projects utilize water quality practices described

2 10 practices as described in the latest revision of the document
 2 11 entitled "Iowa Nutrient Reduction Strategy" initially presented
 2 12 in November 2012 by the department of agriculture and land
 2 13 stewardship, the department of natural resources, and Iowa
 2 14 state university of science and technology.

2 15 (b) The division shall implement demonstration projects
 2 16 as provided in subparagraph division (a) by providing
 2 17 for participation by persons who hold a legal interest in
 2 18 agricultural land used in farming. To every extent practical,
 2 19 the division shall provide for collaborative participation by
 2 20 such persons who hold a legal interest in agricultural land
 2 21 located within the same subwatershed.

2 22 (c) The division shall implement demonstration projects on
 2 23 a cost-share basis as determined by the division. Except for
 2 24 edge-of-field practices, the state's share of the amount shall
 2 25 not exceed 50 percent of the estimated cost of establishing the
 2 26 practice as determined by the division or 50 percent of the
 2 27 actual cost of establishing the practice, whichever is less.

2 28 (d) The demonstration projects shall be used to educate
 2 29 other persons about the feasibility and value of establishing
 2 30 similar water quality practices. The division shall promote
 2 31 field day events for purposes of allowing interested persons to
 2 32 establish water quality practices on such persons' agricultural
 2 33 land.

2 34 (e) The division shall conduct water quality evaluations
 2 35 within supported subwatersheds. Within a reasonable period
 3 1 after accumulating information from such evaluations, the
 3 2 division shall create an aggregated database of water quality
 3 3 practices. Any information identifying a person holding a
 3 4 legal interest in agricultural land or specific agricultural
 3 5 land shall be a confidential record.

3 6 (4) The moneys appropriated in this lettered paragraph
 3 7 shall be used to support education and outreach in a manner
 3 8 that encourages persons who hold a legal interest in
 3 9 agricultural land used for farming to implement water quality
 3 10 practices, including the establishment of such practices in
 3 11 watersheds generally, and not limited to subwatersheds or
 3 12 high-priority watersheds.

3 13 (5) The moneys appropriated in this lettered paragraph
 3 14 may be used to contract with persons to coordinate the

in the latest version of the Iowa Nutrient Reduction Strategy.

- Requires the DALs to collaborate with agricultural landowners in targeted watersheds.
- Prohibits the State's cost-share amount for water quality protection practices from exceeding 50.00% of the value of the practices, except in instances of edge-of-field practices.
- Requires that demonstration projects be used to educate the public about water quality practices.
- Requires the DALs to conduct water quality evaluations within targeted watersheds and create a database of water quality practices. All information received is a confidential record and exempt from public access.

Requires the DALs to support education and outreach to encourage agricultural producers to establish water quality practices.

Permits the DALs to use funds for contracts that will assist with the coordination and implementation of the Water Quality Initiative.

3 15 implementation of efforts provided in this paragraph.

3 16 (6) The moneys appropriated in this lettered paragraph
3 17 may be used by the department to support urban soil and water
3 18 conservation efforts, which may include but are not limited
3 19 to management practices related to bioretention, landscaping,
3 20 the use of permeable or pervious pavement, and soil quality
3 21 restoration. The moneys shall be allocated on a cost-share
3 22 basis as provided in chapter 161A.

Permits the DALs to use funds to support urban soil and water conservation practices and to allocate funds on a cost-share basis.

3 23 (7) Notwithstanding any other provision of law to the
3 24 contrary, the department may use moneys appropriated in
3 25 this lettered paragraph to carry out the provisions of this
3 26 paragraph on a cost-share basis in combination with other
3 27 moneys available to the department from a state or federal
3 28 source.

Permits the DALs to use the appropriated funds to implement projects on a cost-share basis and in combination with other funds available to the DALs.

3 29 (8) Not more than 10 percent of the moneys appropriated in
3 30 this lettered paragraph may be used for costs of administration
3 31 and implementation of the water quality initiative administered
3 32 by the soil conservation division.

Permits up to 10.00% of the appropriated funds for the Water Quality Initiative to be used for administration and implementation of the Initiative by the Soil Conservation Division.

DETAIL: Up to \$820,000 of the funds for administration and implementation of the Water Quality Initiative will be provided from the RIIF.

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the DALs for the Renewable Fuels Infrastructure Fund (RFIF).

DETAIL: The RFIF provides financial assistance to owners or operators of a retail motor fuel site or a biodiesel terminal to convert their equipment to dispense and store renewable fuels. A total of \$37,000,000 has been appropriated to the RFIF from the RIIF through FY 2024. In previous years, the RFIF received a \$3,000,000 standing appropriation from the Statutory Allocations Fund that consisted of a number of fees related to driver's licensing, vehicle titles, and trailer registration fees. The Statutory Allocations Fund appropriation ended in FY 2017.

4 3 The appropriation made in this paragraph is in lieu of the
4 4 standing appropriation from the general fund of the state in
4 5 section 159A.17 for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2024, and
4 6 ending June 30, 2025, which shall be zero.

CODE: Makes inapplicable a \$5,000,000 standing appropriation from the General Fund to the RFIF for FY 2025.

4 7 c. For updating the maximum return to nitrogen modeling
 4 8 system for fertilizer management, notwithstanding section 8.57,
 4 9 subsection 5, paragraph "c":
 4 10 FY 2024-2025:
 4 11 \$ 1,000,000

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the DALS for nitrogen modeling and fertilizer management. This appropriation is exempt from the vertical infrastructure requirement in Iowa Code section [8.57](#)(5)(c).

DETAIL: This appropriation funds research to update static maximum return to nitrogen (MRTN) recommendations to a new dynamic modeling system that considers variability in the environment, management, and weather. The research considers carbon dioxide equivalent (CO2e) of nitrogen oxides (NOx) with potential for carbon improvements to corn and soybean rotation systems. The goal is more accurate nitrogen recommendations that support higher crop yields and improve water quality by reducing the risk of nutrient runoff. There was \$1,000,000 appropriated for this purpose in FY 2023 and FY 2024.

4 12 Any information received, collected, or held for purposes
 4 13 of this paragraph is a confidential record exempt from public
 4 14 release if the information identifies a person who holds a
 4 15 legal interest in agricultural land or who has previously held
 4 16 a legal interest in agricultural land, a person who is involved
 4 17 or who was previously involved in managing the agricultural
 4 18 land or producing crops or livestock on the agricultural land,
 4 19 or the identifiable location of the agricultural land.

Requires the DALS to keep personal information collected from fertilizer management program participants confidential.

4 20 3. DEPARTMENT FOR THE BLIND
 4 21 For building repairs for the building located at 524 Fourth
 4 22 Street, Des Moines, Iowa:

 4 24 \$ 225,600

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the Department for the Blind for building repairs.

DETAIL: This appropriation will fund large, long-term maintenance expenses, including chiller repair, roof replacement, tuckpointing, and dock lift replacement. The Department also received \$139,100 in FY 2022, \$196,900 in FY 2023, and \$232,000 in FY 2024 for building repairs from the RIIF.

4 26 a. For deposit in the community attraction and tourism fund
 4 27 created in section 15F.204:
 4 28 FY 2024-2025:
 4 29 \$ 8,000,000

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the Iowa Economic Development Authority (IEDA) for the Community Attraction and Tourism (CAT) Fund, which supports the CAT Program.

DETAIL: The amount of funding to the CAT Program from the RIIF has varied across fiscal years. Between FY 2015 and FY 2022, the CAT

Program received \$5,000,000 in annual appropriations from the RIIF. In FY 2023 and FY 2024, the CAT Program has received \$10,000,000 in annual appropriations from the RIIF.

The CAT grants assist communities in the development and creation of multipurpose attraction and tourism facilities. Eligible CAT projects must be permanent recreational, cultural, educational, or entertainment attractions; be available to the general public; and promote tourism in local communities. Eligible applicants include cities, counties, public organizations, and school districts in cooperation with a city or county. Previously funded projects include the development of attractions such as wellness centers, recreational centers, parks, recreational trails, swimming pools and aquatic centers, riverfront plazas and marinas, streetscapes, museums, libraries, performing arts centers, sports complexes, public gardens, visitor centers, and campgrounds.

DETAIL: Since FY 2008, Regional Sports Authority districts have received annual appropriations of \$500,000 from the RIIF or General Fund, with the exception of FY 2024. In FY 2024, Regional Sports Authority districts received an appropriation of \$700,000 from the RIIF. The Regional Sports Authority District Program authorizes the IEDA to certify up to 10 districts for the promotion of youth sports, high school

athletics, the Special Olympics, or other nonprofessional sporting events. Each district receives an equal share of the appropriation. Funding is awarded to the convention and visitors bureaus for each area. The funds are used for marketing and other promotional efforts to attract youth sports, high school athletics, or other sporting events to the communities. Other expenses include venue rental, facility conversion, timing systems, field preparation, and other expenses related to hosting various sporting events.

Some recent examples of events are the Iowa Special Olympics Winter Games, AAU Junior Olympics, NAIA Division II Women's Basketball National Championship, U.S. Hockey League Fall Classic, NCAA Division II Super Regional Wrestling Tournament, the Iowa Summer Games Sports Festival, and the NCAA Division I Wrestling Championships.

In total, \$2,750,000 has been appropriated since FY 2016 for these projects. Project examples include updated boiler systems, roofs, parking access, energy efficiency improvements, and renovations to gyms and classrooms.

This included increasing the scope of work to increase bed capacity by 50 beds.

The current site was designed to accommodate 800 cases per year, and the IOSME is currently processing approximately 2,000 cases per year. The estimated total budget for the project is \$36,300,000.

The role of forensic pathologists and death investigators at the IOSME is to investigate sudden, unnatural, suspicious, or violent deaths. In summer 2024, the IOSME will have six full-time board-certified forensic pathologists, seven part-time board-certified forensic pathologists, and four medical examiner investigator liaisons.

DETAIL: The funds are used for projects identified in the annual Lake Restoration Plan and Report, focusing on 35 projects on the priority list of 127 lake candidates. The DNR is required to implement the projects in accordance with the Lake Restoration Plan and Report and Iowa Code section [456A.33B](#). The Plan and Report is submitted annually by January 1 to the Transportation, Infrastructure, and Capitals Appropriations Subcommittee.

Iowa Code section 456A.33B provides overall goals for the projects in the program. Specific criteria include water quality targets relating to clarity, biota, sustainability, and safety. In addition to this appropriation, the DNR has been appropriated a total of \$146,459,000 since FY 2008 for lake restoration projects. The annual funding since FY 2018 is summarized below:

These funds support grant awards to local entities for water trail enhancements and dam mitigation grants to dam owners, including State and local government entities and private owners, to improve low head dam safety. State-designated water trails are designed to provide the following four basic types, or levels, of recreational experiences: gateway, recreational, challenge, and wilderness. Each segment of a water trail is assigned one of these experience ratings to reflect a range of conditions available to the user in the designated waterways.

While there are different types of low head dams, they generally consist of a riverwide dam that is normally overtopped by the entire river's flow. Flood gates may or may not be present to reduce upstream flooding effects. The height of these dams is less than 30 feet. Low head dams were originally constructed throughout Iowa to power gristmills and sawmills. Some dams were later used for hydroelectric generation. Low head dams can be extremely dangerous due to the powerful recirculating hydraulics that are generated. Since FY 2009, appropriations for the Water Trails and Low Head Dam Public Hazard Program from the RIIF have totaled \$13,800,000. Recent prior year appropriations for the Water Trails and Low Head Dam Public Hazard Program include the following:

The Iowa National Guard armories are facing a backlog of deferred maintenance and equipment upgrade needs. Funding will be used for priority and emergency repairs first and then to address the backlog as funding is available. Generally, the State appropriation acts as a match to draw down federal funding on a one-to-one basis.

DETAIL: This appropriation will be used to fund the annual lease payment and tower maintenance. The difference will be funded from the Primary Road Fund. In FY 2024, there was an increase in the appropriation amount due to the State contractually assuming an annual maintenance agreement in the amount of \$2,315,350 beginning in FY 2024. The final payment for the lease purchase is expected to be in FY 2026, and the Motorola maintenance agreement will continue through FY 2030.

A lease-purchase contract was signed with Motorola in 2015 at an estimated cost of \$39,500,000 (\$36,400,000 in principal and \$3,100,000 in interest) over 10 years. This is the ninth payment made by the State. This is the eighth year the payment for the Communications System has been funded by the RIIF. In prior years, the payment was funded by the E911 Fund. The final payment is estimated to be in FY 2026.

DETAIL: This appropriation replaces student tuition and fees that pay the debt service on academic revenue bonds authorized in prior fiscal years. Iowa Code chapter [262A](#), enacted in the 1969 Legislative Session, authorizes the sale of academic revenue bonds by the Board of Regents.

The first academic revenue bonds were issued in 1970 and provided the primary source of funds for construction of academic facilities at the universities for several decades. Academic revenue bonds are secured by student tuition and fees. The appropriation is not mandatory by statute, but the Board of Regents indicated that without a tuition replacement appropriation, an aggregate tuition increase of 3.40% across the universities will be required to pay the debt service.

Funding for tuition replacement has been provided for many decades. Until FY 2002, the appropriation was made solely from the General Fund. After FY 2002, portions were funded from the General Fund and from infrastructure-related funds such as the RIIF and the Restricted Capitals Fund. From FY 2006 to FY 2008, funding for this appropriation was divided between the General Fund and the RIIF. Since FY 2009, the entire appropriation has been funded from the RIIF. The exception to this is FY 2018, in which appropriations were made from both the RIIF and the State Bond Repayment Fund.

The tuition replacement appropriation provides most of the annual debt service on the academic revenue bonds, but a portion of the debt service is paid from annual reductions in the debt service reserve fund.

In [Senate File 577](#) (FY 2024 Infrastructure Appropriations Act), the Board of Regents was permitted to redirect a portion of its FY 2022 and FY 2023 appropriation for the Industrial Technology Center for the purpose of emergency steam tunnel repairs at UNI. This appropriation for FY 2025 is to recover the costs of those repairs that were redirected from previously appropriated moneys. This project will expand the existing facility by 48,000 square feet. The

current facility was constructed in 1974 and has \$10,000,000 in deferred maintenance. The Center will support the programs that educate students for management, manufacturing, construction, graphics and technology education fields

DETAIL: The State Recreational Trails Program consists of developed multiuse recreational trails and off-road paths throughout the State. A local match of 25.00% is required in accordance with the DOT administrative rules. Trails that receive funding must be maintained for public use for a minimum of 20 years. Applications for funding from the Trails Program are considered twice per year and are approved by the Transportation Commission. Appropriations for the last seven years include the following:

- FY 2022: \$1,500,000 from the RIIF

DETAIL: Between FY 2012 and FY 2024, there has been an annual appropriation of \$1,500,000 from the RIIF for the Grant Program, with the exception of FY 2021 when \$500,000 was appropriated from the RIIF and FY 2024 when \$1,000,000 was appropriated from the RIIF.

Funds are used for capital projects such as new bus storage buildings, administrative buildings, maintenance facilities, storage buildings, reconstruction of steam cleaning areas, or vehicle storage and wash bays, as well as for replacing roofs or other improvements.

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the DOT for the Railroad Revolving Loan and Grant Program. This appropriation is exempt from the vertical infrastructure requirement in Iowa Code section [8.57](#)(5)(c).

DETAIL: Historically, this Program has received appropriations from the RIIF. Recent appropriations include the following:

- \$500,000 in FY 2024
- \$2,000,000 in FY 2023
- \$1,000,000 in FY 2022
- \$500,000 in FY 2021
- \$1,000,000 in FY 2018, FY 2019, and FY 2020

The funds are used to provide grants and loans for construction and improvements to railroad facilities, such as railroad main lines, branch lines, switching yards, sidings, rail connections, intermodal yards, and highway grade separations. The Railroad Revolving Loan and Grant Program is targeted toward job growth and economic development. The Program has the following three eligible funding categories: job creation, rail network improvement, and rail port planning and development. Industries, railroads, local governments, and economic development agencies are eligible to apply for grants and loans from the Program.

DETAIL: Since FY 2012, appropriations have been made from the RIIF for improvements at commercial service airports. Since FY 2022, \$1,900,000 has been appropriated annually from the RIIF. There are eight commercial service airports in the State, located in Burlington, Cedar Rapids, Des Moines, Dubuque, Fort Dodge, Mason City, Sioux City, and Waterloo.

The funds are distributed through a 50/40/10 formula. For this appropriation, \$950,000 will be allocated equally among each of the commercial service airports, \$760,000 will be allocated based on the percentage of enplaned passengers during the previous fiscal year, and \$190,000 will be allocated based on the proportion of air cargo tonnage at each airport during the previous fiscal year. Airports submit applications to the DOT Office of Aviation for specific projects that are considered for approval by the Transportation Commission. No local match is required. Projects must meet the definition of vertical infrastructure.

In FY 2024, there was an additional \$10,000,000 appropriated from the RIIF for commercial service airport terminal improvements. Commercial airports were required to provide a 90.00% match for grants and could not utilize federal funds to provide the match.

Since FY 2022, \$1,000,000 has been appropriated annually from the RIIF for infrastructure improvements at general aviation airports.

General aviation airport vertical infrastructure projects may receive up to 85.00% of the total project costs but require a minimum level of \$5,000 in local match to be considered. Projects must meet the definition of vertical infrastructure. Eligible airports apply to the DOT Office of Aviation. Projects receive final approval from the Transportation Commission. These grants are available only for public use general aviation airports.
