DETAIL: The regional industry sector partnerships program works to solve future industry needs and design the training and infrastructure

needed to create regional workforce pipelines. The program uses part of the funding from an annual appropriation of \$5,000,000 from the Skilled Worker and Job Creation Fund (SWJCF) for the Pathways for Academic Career and Employment (PACE) Program.

The Network serves school districts by facilitating cooperation and collaboration between businesses and entities within the State education system and by offering work-based learning activities to students and teachers. The Network is funded by an annual appropriation of \$1,500,000 from the SWJCF.

Transfers any unexpended funds remaining in the Statewide Work-Based Learning Intermediary Network Fund to the General Fund at the close of FY 2024.

DETAIL: As of April 1, 2024, there was \$258,303 remaining in the Statewide Work-Based Learning Intermediary Network Fund.
