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FUNDING SUMMARY

General Fund FY 2025: Appropriates a total of \$46.0 million from the General Fund and 1,618.0 full-time equivalent (FTE) positions for FY 2025. This is an increase of \$2.4 million and an increase of 204.0 FTE positions compared to estimated FY 2024.

The General Fund changes include:

- A new appropriation of \$1.8 million for the Choose Iowa Fund that combines the appropriations for the Value Added Agricultural Grant Program, Choose Iowa Promotional Program, and the Dairy Innovation and Revitalization Program. There is an increase of \$100,000 to the Choose Iowa Promotional Program in this appropriation.
- An increase of \$952,000 to the DALS Administrative Division.
- An increase of \$578,000 to Department of Natural Resources (DNR) Operations.
- A new appropriation of \$250,000 for the Butchery Innovation and Revitalization Program to the DALS.
- A decrease of \$250,000 for foreign animal disease vaccine development.
- A new appropriation of \$200,000 for a new Choose Iowa Food Purchasing Pilot Program.
- A new appropriation of \$150,000 to Iowa State University (ISU) for private forestry management.
- An increase of \$100,000 for livestock disease research.
- An increase of \$100,000 to the ISU Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory.
- An increase of \$75,000 for agricultural education.
- An increase of \$50,000 for foreign animal disease preparedness.
- An increase of \$50,000 to the Southern Iowa Development and Conservation Fund.
- An increase of \$25,000 to the DNR for forestry health management.

Other Funds FY 2025: Appropriates a total of \$97.1 million from other funds. This is an increase of \$646,000 compared to estimated FY 2024. The Bill appropriates \$49.8 million from the Fish and Wildlife Trust Fund, \$42.0 million from the Environment First Fund (EFF), \$3.5 million from the Groundwater Protection Fund (GWPF), and \$1.9 million from various other funds.

Iowa Code section <u>8.57A</u> contains a standing appropriation of \$42.0 million from the Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund (RIIF) to the EFF, and the Bill appropriates the following amounts to the following departments for FY 2024:

- \$17.3 million to the DALS.
- \$24.0 million to the DNR.
- \$695,000 to the University of Iowa (UI).

The Bill appropriates \$12.0 million from the EFF to the Resource Enhancement and Protection (REAP)	
Fund in lieu of the \$20.0 million General Fund standing appropriation in Iowa Code chapter 455A and	
allocates \$1.0 million from the Open Spaces Account of the REAP to be used for State park maintenance,	
repair, and refurbishment for FY 2025. The Bill also appropriates \$375,000 for the Floodplain Management	
and Dam Safety Program in addition to a \$1.5 million appropriation from the General Fund.	

Due to the passage of HF 2641 (Department of Agriculture Programs and Activities Bill) by both the House and Senate on April 17, 2024, the appropriations in Part A of Division VIII combined the Value Added Agriculture Grant Program, Choose Iowa Promotional Program, and Dairy Innovation and Revitalization Program appropriations into the Choose Iowa Fund. The Bill appropriates \$1.8 million to the Choose Iowa Fund in Part B of Division VIII of the Bill.

NEW PROGRAMS, SERVICES, OR ACTIVITIES

A new appropriation of \$200,000 to the DALS for the Choose Iowa Food Purchasing Pilot Project. The
Project will provide assistance to schools and food banks in the purchase of locally sourced foods.

A new appropriation of \$150,000 and 1.0 FTE position to ISU for the management of private forests in northeast Iowa.

Appropriates \$1.8 million from the General Fund to the Choose Iowa Fund. From the Fund, \$463,000 must be used for the Value Added Agricultural Grant Program, \$600,000 must be used for the Choose Iowa Promotional Program, and \$750,000 must be used for the Dairy Innovation and Revitalization Program. This appropriation maintains current levels of funding for the Value Added Agricultural Grant Program and the Dairy Innovation and Revitalization Program compared to estimated FY 2024 and provides and increase of \$100,000 to the Choose Iowa Promotional Program compared to estimated FY 2024.

A new appropriation of \$250,000 for the Butchery Innovation and Revitalization Program.

A new appropriation of \$250,000 from the Blufflands Protection Revolving Fund to the Iowa Geological Survey.

A new appropriation of \$100,000 from the Blufflands Protection Revolving Fund to the DALS for the Choose Iowa Food Purchasing Pilot Project.

A new appropriation of \$296,000 from the Blufflands Protection Revolving Fund to the DNR for State Park accessibility.
