FUNDING SUMMARY

General Fund FY 2025: Appropriates a total of \$693.3 million from the General Fund and 5,662.2 full-time equivalent (FTE) positions to the departments of Justice (DOJ); Corrections (DOC); Inspections, Appeals, and Licensing (DIAL); Public Defense (DPD); Public Safety (DPS); and Homeland Security and Emergency Management (HSEMD), the Iowa Law Enforcement Academy (ILEA), and the Board of Parole (BOP) for FY 2025. This is an increase of \$24.0 million and 24.0 FTE positions compared to estimated FY 2024.

Other Funds FY 2025: Appropriates a total of \$19.5 million from other funds for FY 2025. This is no change compared to estimated FY 2024.

Standing Appropriations FY 2025: The attached tracking report also includes a standing unlimited appropriation from the General Fund estimated at \$10,000 for State Cases Court Costs, which does not appear in this Bill.

STUDIES AND INTENT

Intent

Requires that within available funding, each CBC district department continue programs and plans for

intensive supervision, sex offender treatment, diversion of low-risk offenders to the least restrictive sanction available, job development, and expanded use of intermediate sanctions.

Requires each CBC district department to provide alternatives to prison consistent with Iowa Code chapter [901B](#).

Page 9, Line 14

Requires the Office of Drug Control Policy of the DPS to consider federal grants made to the DOC for the benefit of the CBC district departments as local government grants rather than State government grants as defined by federal regulations.

Page 9, Line 20

Prohibits the use of the Public Safety Assessment in pretrial hearings when determining whether to detain or release a defendant before trial until the use of the Public Safety Assessment has been specifically authorized by the General Assembly.

Page 9, Line 29

Permits the DOC to work with nonprofit and governmental entities to use inmate labor to restore or preserve rural cemeteries or historical landmarks and to clean up roads and water resources.

Page 10, Line 15

Encourages State agencies to buy products from Iowa Prison Industries (IPI) whenever possible. Requires State agencies to obtain a bid from IPI for office furniture purchases exceeding \$5,000 or in accordance with administrative rules.

Page 11, Line 5

Specifies that it is the intent of the General Assembly that the Iowa State Patrol assign education officers to perform school bus inspections rather than having road troopers perform these inspections.

Page 16, Line 30

Nonreversion

Allows any unexpended funds appropriated for the Victim Assistance Grant Program to the Iowa DOJ for FY 2025 from the General Fund to remain available for expenditure in FY 2026.

Page 2, Line 23

Allows any unexpended funds appropriated to the DOC for educational programs for inmates at State penal institutions from the General Fund to remain available for expenditure through FY 2026.

Page 7, Line 15

Allows any unexpended funds appropriated to the DPS for the Criminalistics Laboratory Fund from the General Fund to remain available for expenditure through FY 2026.

Page 15, Line 15

Allows any unexpended funds appropriated to the DPS for costs associated with the training and equipment needs of volunteer firefighters from the General Fund to remain available for expenditure through FY 2026.

Page 17, Line 7

Required Reports

Requires the DOJ to submit a report to the General Assembly by January 15, 2025, with the FY 2026 budget estimate that specifies the amount of funding from all non-General Fund sources and any revisions that occur as a result of actual reimbursements. The report is required to include actual reimbursements for FY 2024 and actual and expected FY 2025 reimbursements from other agencies and internal funds. Page 2, Line 34

Requires the DOC to provide an annual status report to the General Assembly regarding private sector employment of inmates by January 15, 2025. Page 10, Line 24

Requires the DOC to submit a report regarding electronic monitoring to the General Assembly by January 15, 2025. Page 10, Line 32

Requires the DOC to produce and submit a report to the General Assembly by December 15, 2024, regarding the salaries of corrections officers in the DOC to ensure that the increase in starting pay for new corrections officers does not cause a compaction of the salaries of current corrections officers. Page 21, Line 19

SIGNIFICANT CODE CHANGES

Effective Date

Provides that Division IV of the Bill is effective upon enactment. Page 21, Line 17

Provides that the distribution of costs for the ILEA to provide basic training for a law enforcement officer sponsored by a political subdivision will be one-third of the total cost to the political subdivision and the remainder to the State. Page 19, Line 34

Increases the hourly rates for court-appointed counsel by \$3 for each case type beginning July 1, 2024. Page 20, Line 7

Provides that compensated hours for travel time outside the county of domicile for an Office of the State Public Defender contract attorney or guardian ad litem does not apply to a cap on the maximum work hours to which the attorney or guardian ad litem may be subject. Page 20, Line 24

Provides that for FY 2025, any moneys not otherwise appropriated from the Antitrust Fund and the Consumer Education and Litigation Fund are appropriated to the DOJ for salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous purposes. Page 21, Line 5

Titles this Bill as "An Act relating to an making appropriations to the justus system, and including effective date provisions".

1 3 Section 1. DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE.
 1 4 1. There is appropriated from the general fund of the state
 1 5 to the department of justice for the fiscal year beginning July
 1 6 1, 2024, and ending June 30, 2025, the following amounts, or
 1 7 so much thereof as is necessary, to be used for the purposes
 1 8 designated:
 1 9 a. For the general office of attorney general for
 1 10 salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous purposes,
 1 11 including the prosecuting attorneys training program, matching
 1 12 funds for federal violence against women grant programs,
 1 13 victim assistance grants, the office of drug control policy
 1 14 prosecuting attorney program, and odometer fraud enforcement,
 1 15 and for not more than the following full-time equivalent
 1 16 positions:
 1 17 \$ 10,539,176
 1 18 FTEs 234.00

General Fund appropriation to the Department of Justice (DOJ) for the Office of the Attorney General for salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous purposes.

DETAIL: This is an increase of \$2,789,316 million and 6.00 FTE positions compared to estimated FY 2024. These changes include:

- An increase of \$884,090 for 3.00 Attorney FTE positions, 2.00 Investigator FTE positions, and 1.00 Paralegal FTE position. These positions will assist county attorneys with investigating and prosecuting crimes such as murder, sexual assault, and public corruption.
- An increase of \$1,905,226 for general operations.

1 19 As a condition of receiving the appropriation provided
 1 20 in this lettered paragraph, the department of justice shall
 1 21 maintain a record of the estimated time incurred representing
 1 22 each agency or department.

Requires the DOJ to maintain a record of the estimated time incurred to represent each agency or department.

1 23 The general office of attorney general may temporarily
 1 24 exceed and draw more than the amount appropriated in this
 1 25 lettered paragraph and incur a negative cash balance as long
 1 26 as there are receivables equal to or greater than the negative
 1 27 balances and the amount appropriated in this lettered paragraph
 1 28 is not exceeded at the close of the fiscal year.

Permits the Office of the Attorney General to incur a negative General Fund balance as long as there are equal receivables available to the Office by the close of the fiscal year.

1 29 b. For victim assistance grants:
 1 30 \$ 5,016,708

General Fund appropriation to the DOJ for the Victim Assistance Grants Program.

DETAIL: This is no change compared to estimated FY 2024.

1 31 The moneys appropriated in this lettered paragraph shall be
 1 32 used to provide grants to care providers providing services to

Requires victim assistance funds to be awarded as grants to providers of services for victims of human trafficking, domestic abuse, rape, or sexual assault.

1 33 crime victims of human trafficking, domestic abuse, rape, or
1 34 sexual assault.

1 35 The balance of the victim compensation fund established
2 1 in section 915.94 may be used to provide salary and support
2 2 of not more than 24.00 full-time equivalent positions and to
2 3 provide maintenance for the victim compensation functions
2 4 of the department of justice. In addition to the full-time
2 5 equivalent positions authorized pursuant to this paragraph,
2 6 7.00 full-time equivalent positions are authorized and shall
2 7 be used by the department of justice to employ one accountant
2 8 and four program planners. The department of justice may
2 9 employ the additional 7.00 full-time equivalent positions
2 10 authorized pursuant to this paragraph that are in excess of the
2 11 number of full-time equivalent positions authorized only if
2 12 the department of justice receives sufficient federal moneys
2 13 to maintain employment for the additional full-time equivalent
2 14 positions during the current fiscal year. The department
2 15 of justice shall only employ the additional 7.00 full-time
2 16 equivalent positions in succeeding fiscal years if sufficient
2 17 federal moneys are received during each of those succeeding
2 18 fiscal years.

Permits 24.00 full-time equivalent (FTE) positions to be funded from the Victim Compensation Fund to administer the victim compensation functions of the DOJ. Authorizes an additional 7.00 FTE positions to be used by the DOJ to employ one accountant and four program planners. The DOJ may employ the additional 7.00 FTE positions in excess of the number of FTE positions authorized only if the DOJ receives sufficient federal funding to maintain employment for the FTE positions during FY 2025 and succeeding fiscal years.

DETAIL: This is a decrease of 0.05 FTE position compared to estimated FY 2024. The Victim Compensation Fund will provide the support costs for these positions. The 7.00 FTE positions in this Section are federally funded from the federal Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) Victim Assistance Grant. A percentage of the Grant may be used for the administration of the Grant. Currently, the Crime Victim Assistance Division (CVAD) uses up to 5.00% of the VOCA Victim Assistance Grant for administration.

NOTE: The federal VOCA Victim Assistance Grant for the current fiscal year is \$15,059,205. This award may be distributed over several years. Up to 5.00% (\$752,960) of the Grant may be used for administrative costs.

2 19 The department of justice shall transfer at least \$150,000
2 20 from the victim compensation fund established in section 915.94
2 21 to the victim assistance grant program established in section
2 22 13.31.

Requires the DOJ to transfer at least \$150,000 from the Victim Compensation Fund to the Victim Assistance Grant Program in FY 2025.

2 23 Notwithstanding section 8.33, moneys appropriated in this
2 24 lettered paragraph that remain unencumbered or unobligated at
2 25 the close of the fiscal year shall not revert but shall remain
2 26 available for expenditure for the purposes designated until the
2 27 close of the succeeding fiscal year.

CODE: Allows any unexpended funds appropriated for the Victim Assistance Grant Program to remain available through the end of FY 2026 for the purposes designated.

2 28 c. For legal services for persons in poverty grants as
2 29 provided in section 13.34:
2 30 \$ 2,634,601

General Fund appropriation to the DOJ for the Legal Services Poverty Grants Program.

DETAIL: This is no change in funding compared to estimated FY 2024. Iowa Code section [13.34](#) requires the Office of the Attorney General to contract with a nonprofit organization to provide legal counsel to

indigent people in civil matters. The Office of the Attorney General currently contracts with Iowa Legal Aid to provide those services.

2 31 d. To improve the department of justice's cybersecurity and
2 32 technology infrastructure:
2 33 \$ 202,060

General Fund appropriation to the DOJ for cybersecurity and technology infrastructure.

DETAIL: This is no change in funding compared to estimated FY 2024.

2 34 2. a. The department of justice, in submitting budget
2 35 estimates for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2025, pursuant
3 1 to section 8.23, shall include a report of funding from sources
3 2 other than amounts appropriated directly from the general fund
3 3 of the state to the department of justice or to the office of
3 4 consumer advocate. These funding sources shall include but
3 5 are not limited to reimbursements from other state agencies,
3 6 commissions, boards, or similar entities, and reimbursements
3 7 from special funds or internal accounts within the department
3 8 of justice. The department of justice shall also report actual
3 9 reimbursements for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2023,
3 10 and actual and expected reimbursements for the fiscal year
3 11 beginning July 1, 2024.

Requires the DOJ to submit a report with the FY 2026 budget estimate that specifies the amount of funding from all non-General Fund sources and any revisions that occur as a result of actual reimbursements. The report is required to include actual reimbursements for FY 2024 and actual and expected FY 2025 reimbursements from other agencies and internal funds.

3 12 b. The department of justice shall include the report
3 13 required under paragraph "a", as well as information regarding
3 14 any revisions occurring as a result of reimbursements actually
3 15 received or expected at a later date, in a report to the
3 16 general assembly. The department of justice shall submit the
3 17 report on or before January 15, 2025.

Requires the DOJ to submit the report described above to the General Assembly by January 15, 2025.

3 18 3. a. The department of justice shall fully reimburse
3 19 the costs and necessary related expenses incurred by the Iowa
3 20 law enforcement academy to continue to employ one additional
3 21 instructor position who shall provide training for human
3 22 trafficking-related issues throughout the state.

Requires the DOJ to fully reimburse the costs incurred by the Iowa Law Enforcement Academy (ILEA) to continue to employ an additional instructor to provide training on human trafficking-related issues throughout the State.

3 23 b. The department of justice shall obtain the moneys
3 24 necessary to reimburse the Iowa law enforcement academy to
3 25 employ such an instructor from unrestricted moneys from either
3 26 the victim compensation fund established in section 915.94 or
3 27 the human trafficking victim fund established in section 915.95
3 28 or the human trafficking enforcement fund established in 2015

Requires the DOJ to fully reimburse the ILEA for the costs of the additional instructor with unrestricted moneys from either the Victim Compensation Fund, the Human Trafficking Victim Fund, or the Human Trafficking Enforcement Fund.

3 30 Sec. 2. OFFICE OF CONSUMER ADVOCATE. There is appropriated
3 31 from the commerce revolving fund created in section 546.12 to
