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FUNDING SUMMARY

General Fund FY 2026: Appropriates a total of \$703.1 million from the General Fund and 5,666.3 full-time equivalent (FTE) positions to the departments of Justice (DOJ); Corrections (DOC); Inspections, Appeals, and Licensing (DIAL); Public Defense (DPD); Public Safety (DPS); and Homeland Security and Emergency Management (HSEMD), the Iowa Law Enforcement Academy (ILEA), and the Board of Parole (BOP) for FY 2026. This is an increase of \$7.8 million and 15.2 FTE positions compared to estimated FY 2025.

Other Funds FY 2026: Appropriates a total of \$20.6 million from other funds for FY 2026. This is no change compared to estimated FY 2025.

Standing Appropriations FY 2026: The attached tracking report also includes a standing unlimited appropriation from the General Fund estimated at \$10,000 for State Cases Court Costs, which does not appear in this Bill. The Bill also increases the standing limited Consumer Education and Litigation Fund appropriation for public education related to consumer fraud and enforcement to \$1.9 million and the standing limited appropriation for investigation, prosecution, and consumer education related to consumer fraud to \$125,000 which is no change compared to estimated FY 2025.

In addition, of the \$36.1 million appropriated to the State Public Defender, an allocation of \$100,000 to the College Student Aid Commission with the Department of Education is contingent upon the enactment of SF 250 (Rural Attorney Recruitment Program Bill) or successor language.

Office of the State Public Defender: An increase of \$2.1 million and 13.0 FTE positions for the Office of the State Public Defender and a decrease of \$880,000 to the Indigent Defense Fund compared to estimated FY 2025.

Page 12, Line 30

Department of Public Safety: A decrease of \$1.6 million and a decrease of 6.0 FTE positions compared to estimated FY 2025. These changes include:

- An increase of \$3,000 for increased operating costs within public safety administration.
- An increase of \$1.6 million for increased operating costs and 4.0 FTE positions within the Division of Criminal Investigation.
- An increase of \$1.0 million for increased operating costs and 4.0 FTE positions within the Division of Narcotics Enforcement.
- An increase of \$136,000 for increased operating costs within the Division of State Fire Marshal.
- An increase of \$2.2 million for increased operating costs within the Iowa State Patrol.
- A decrease of \$2.1 million for department-wide duties.

STUDIES AND INTENT

Intent

Specifies the intent of the General Assembly that the DOC prohibit the use of offender labor for partisan political purposes when negotiating leases with a private corporation providing private industry employment. Violation of these contract terms will result in termination of the lease agreement.

Page 6, Line 25

Specifies the intent of the General Assembly that the DOC, as a condition of receiving appropriated funds, restrict offender access to personal identifying information of citizens when contracting with a private business for offender employment. Page 6, Line 34

Requires that within available funding, each CBC district department continue programs and plans for intensive supervision, sex offender treatment, diversion of low-risk offenders to the least restrictive sanction available, job development, and expanded use of intermediate sanctions. Page 9, Line 13

Requires each CBC district department to provide alternatives to prison consistent with Iowa Code chapter [901B](#). Page 9, Line 20

Requires the Office of Drug Control Policy of the DPS to consider federal grants made to the DOC for the benefit of the CBC district departments as local government grants rather than State government grants as defined by federal regulations. Page 9, Line 26

Prohibits the use of the Public Safety Assessment in pretrial hearings when determining whether to detain or release a defendant before trial until the use of the Public Safety Assessment has been specifically authorized by the General Assembly. Page 9, Line 35

Permits the DOC to work with nonprofit and governmental entities to use inmate labor to restore or preserve rural cemeteries or historical landmarks and to clean up roads and water resources. Page 10, Line 20

Encourages State agencies to buy products from Iowa Prison Industries (IPI) whenever possible. Requires State agencies to obtain a bid from IPI for office furniture purchases exceeding \$5,000 or in accordance with administrative rules. Page 11, Line 19

Specifies that it is the intent of the General Assembly that the Iowa State Patrol assign State patrol members to perform school bus inspections rather than having road troopers perform these inspections. Page 17, Line 6

Nonreversion

Allows any unexpended funds appropriated for the Victim Assistance Grant Program to the Iowa DOJ for FY 2026 from the General Fund to remain available for expenditure in FY 2027. Page 2, Line 25

Allows any unexpended funds appropriated to the DOC for educational programs for inmates at State penal institutions from the General Fund to remain available for expenditure through FY 2027. Page 7, Line 21

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY
JUSTICE SYSTEM APPROPRIATIONS BILL

Allows any unexpended funds appropriated to the DPS for the Criminalistics Laboratory Fund from the General Fund to remain available for expenditure through FY 2027. Page 15, Line 26

Allows any unexpended funds appropriated to the DPS for costs associated with the training and equipment needs of volunteer fire fighters from the General Fund to remain available for expenditure through FY 2027. Page 17, Line 18

Allows any unencumbered or unobligated moneys in the Federal Receipts Fund at the close of FY 2026 available for the intended purposes. Any interest or earnings on moneys in the Fund are credited to the Fund. Page 22, Line 3

Required Reports

Requires the DOJ to submit a report to the General Assembly by January 15, 2026, with the FY 2027 budget estimate that specifies the amount of funding from all non-General Fund sources and any revisions that occur as a result of actual reimbursements. The report is required to include actual reimbursements for FY 2025 and actual and expected FY 2026 reimbursements from other agencies and internal funds. Page 3, Line 1

Requires the DOC to provide an annual status report to the General Assembly regarding private sector employment of inmates by January 15, 2026. Page 10, Line 29

Requires the DOC to submit a report regarding electronic monitoring to the General Assembly by January 15, 2026. Page 11, Line 2

SIGNIFICANT CODE CHANGES

Increases the hourly rates for court-appointed counsel by \$2 for each case type beginning July 1, 2025 (FY 2026). Page 20, Line 11

Increases the standing limited annual appropriations in Iowa Code section [714.16C](#) (Consumer Education and Litigation Fund) from \$1,125,000 to \$1,875,000 for public education related to consumer fraud and enforcement. In addition, the standing limited appropriation for the Department of Justice to be used for investigation, prosecution, and consumer education related to consumer fraud is increased from \$75,000 to \$125,000. Page 20, Line 20

Allows proceeds deposited in the Capital Reinvestment Fund to be used for upgrades to the Iowa Corrections Offender Network system. Page 20, Line 34

Establishes a Federal Receipts Fund under the control of the DOC. The Fund consists of all federal moneys Page 21, Line 21

received by the Department and any other moneys appropriated to the Fund but excludes moneys deposited in the special fund pursuant to Iowa Code section [8.41](#). Moneys in the Fund are appropriated to the Department for purposes of the operations of the Department and any other use authorized or required under the federal law or contract pursuant to which the moneys were paid. Moneys in the Fund do not revert, and interest or earnings on moneys in the Fund are credited to the Fund.

Appropriates moneys in the Federal Receipts Fund to the Department for purposes of the operations of the DOC and any other use authorized or required under the federal law or contract pursuant to which the moneys were paid.

Page 21, Line 31

EFFECTIVE DATE

Specifies that Division V of the Bill related to the Federal Receipts Fund takes effect upon enactment and applies retroactively to July 1, 2023.

Page 22, Line 9

1 3 Section 1. DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE.

1 4 1. There is appropriated from the general fund of the state
1 5 to the department of justice for the fiscal year beginning July
1 6 1, 2025, and ending June 30, 2026, the following amounts, or
1 7 so much thereof as is necessary, to be used for the purposes
1 8 designated:

1 9 a. For the general office of attorney general for
1 10 salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous purposes,
1 11 including the prosecuting attorneys training program, matching
1 12 funds for federal violence against women grant programs,
1 13 victim assistance grants, the office of drug control policy
1 14 prosecuting attorney program, and odometer fraud enforcement,
1 15 and for not more than the following full-time equivalent
1 16 positions:

1 19 As a condition of receiving the appropriation provided
1 20 in this lettered paragraph, the department of justice shall
1 21 maintain a record of the estimated time incurred representing
1 22 each agency or department.

1 23 The general office of attorney general may temporarily
1 24 exceed and draw more than the amount appropriated in this
1 25 lettered paragraph and incur a negative cash balance as long
1 26 as there are receivables equal to or greater than the negative
1 27 balances and the amount appropriated in this lettered paragraph
1 28 is not exceeded at the close of the fiscal year.

1 31 Of the moneys appropriated in this lettered paragraph,

General Fund appropriation to the Department of Justice (DOJ) for the Office of the Attorney General for salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous purposes.

DETAIL: This is an increase of \$374,070 in funding and a decrease of 3.45 full-time equivalent (FTE) position compared to estimated FY 2025. The increase in funding is for general operating expenses. The decrease of 3.45 FTE positions is to restore the FTE positions to the previously authorized amount in [HF 2693](#) (FY 2025 Justice System Appropriations Act).

Requires the DOJ to maintain a record of the estimated time incurred to represent each agency or department.

Permits the Office of the Attorney General to incur a negative General Fund balance as long as there are equal receivables available to the Office by the close of the fiscal year.

General Fund appropriation to the DOJ for the Victim Assistance Grants Program.

DETAIL: This is an increase of \$150,000 compared to estimated FY 2025.

Allocates \$150,000 exclusively for the benefit of human trafficking victims with the remaining money allocated as grants to providers of services for victims of human trafficking, domestic abuse, rape, or

sexual assault.

2 2 The balance of the victim compensation fund established
 2 3 in section 915.94 may be used to provide salary and support
 2 4 of not more than 24.00 full-time equivalent positions and to
 2 5 provide maintenance for the victim compensation functions
 2 6 of the department of justice. In addition to the full-time
 2 7 equivalent positions authorized pursuant to this paragraph,
 2 8 7.00 full-time equivalent positions are authorized and shall
 2 9 be used by the department of justice to employ one accountant
 2 10 and four program planners. The department of justice may
 2 11 employ the additional 7.00 full-time equivalent positions
 2 12 authorized pursuant to this paragraph that are in excess of the
 2 13 number of full-time equivalent positions authorized only if
 2 14 the department of justice receives sufficient federal moneys
 2 15 to maintain employment for the additional full-time equivalent

Permits 24.00 FTE positions to be funded from the Victim Compensation Fund to administer the victim compensation functions of the DOJ. Authorizes an additional 7.00 FTE positions to be used by the DOJ to employ one accountant and four program planners. The DOJ may employ the additional 7.00 FTE positions in excess of the number of FTE positions authorized only if the DOJ receives sufficient federal funding to maintain employment for the FTE positions during FY 2026 and succeeding fiscal years.

DETAIL: This is no change in funding and an increase of 1.00 FTE position compared to estimated FY 2025. The Victim Compensation Fund will provide the support costs for these positions. The 7.00 FTE positions in this Section are federally funded from the federal Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) Victim Assistance Grant. A percentage of the Grant may be used for the administration of the Grant. Currently, the Crime Victim Assistance Division (CVAD) uses up to 5.00% of the VOCA Victim Assistance Grant for administration.

NOTE: The federal VOCA Victim Assistance Grant for the current fiscal year is \$7,625,910. This award may be distributed over several years. Up to 5.00% (\$381,296) of the Grant may be used for administrative costs.

2 21 The department of justice shall transfer at least \$150,000
 2 22 from the victim compensation fund established in section 915.94
 2 23 to the victim assistance grant program established in section
 2 24 13.31.

Requires the DOJ to transfer at least \$150,000 from the Victim Compensation Fund to the Victim Assistance Grant Program in FY 2026.

2 25 Notwithstanding section 8.33, moneys appropriated in this
 2 26 lettered paragraph that remain unencumbered or unobligated at
 2 27 the close of the fiscal year shall not revert but shall remain
 2 28 available for expenditure for the purposes designated until the
 2 29 close of the succeeding fiscal year.

CODE: Allows any unexpended funds appropriated for the Victim Assistance Grant Program to remain available through the end of FY 2027.

2 30 c. For legal services for persons in poverty grants as

General Fund appropriation to the DOJ for the Legal Services Poverty Grants Program.

DETAIL: This is no change in funding compared to estimated FY 2025. Iowa Code section [13.34](#) requires the Office of the Attorney General to

contract with a nonprofit organization to provide legal counsel to indigent persons in civil matters. The Office of the Attorney General currently contracts with Iowa Legal Aid to provide those services.

2 33 d. To improve the department of justice’s cybersecurity and
2 34 technology infrastructure:
2 35 \$ 202,060

General Fund appropriation to the DOJ for cybersecurity and technology infrastructure.

DETAIL: This is no change in funding compared to estimated FY 2025.

3 1 2. a. The department of justice, in submitting budget
3 2 estimates for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2026, pursuant
3 3 to section 8.23, shall include a report of funding from sources
3 4 other than amounts appropriated directly from the general fund
3 5 of the state to the department of justice or to the office of
3 6 consumer advocate. These funding sources shall include but
3 7 are not limited to reimbursements from other state agencies,
3 8 commissions, boards, or similar entities, and reimbursements
3 9 from special funds or internal accounts within the department

Requires the DOJ to submit a report with the FY 2027 budget estimate that specifies the amount of funding from all non-General Fund sources and any revisions that occur as a result of actual reimbursements. The report is required to include actual reimbursements for FY 2025 and actual and expected FY 2026 reimbursements from other agencies and internal funds.

3 14 b. The department of justice shall include the report
3 15 required under paragraph “a”, as well as information regarding
3 16 any revisions occurring as a result of reimbursements actually
3 17 received or expected at a later date, in a report to the
