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FUNDING SUMMARY

Other Funds — FY 2027: This Bill appropriates a net total of \$196.3 million for FY 2027 from the following sources:

- Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund (RIIF): \$196.3 million in FY 2027. *(See note)*
- Technology Reinvestment Fund (TRF): \$39.9 million in FY 2027.

General Fund — FY 2027: This Bill suspends a \$17.5 million standing appropriation from the General Fund to the TRF for FY 2027 and appropriates \$39.9 million to the TRF from the RIIF. This action funds the TRF for FY 2027 and makes funding available for \$39.9 million in new TRF appropriations in this Bill.

Note: To avoid double counting, the \$39.3 million appropriation to the TRF from the RIIF is excluded from the total above.

Water Quality Initiative: Appropriates \$8.2 million in FY 2027 from the RIIF to the DALIS for the Iowa Water Quality Initiative.

Facility Enhancement: Appropriates \$7.0 million in FY 2027 from the RIIF to the IEDA for a grant to an organization with a sports entertainment venue in a city with a population between 15,550 and 15,800 according to the 2020 census to be used for facility enhancement.

Strengthening Communities Grants — Rural YMCAs: Appropriates \$250,000 in FY 2027 from the RIIF to the IEDA for grants related to facility infrastructure to nonprofit organizations committed to strengthening communities through youth development, healthy living, and social responsibility in cities with a population of less than 28,000.

Strategic Infrastructure Program Fund: Appropriates \$10.0 million for FY 2027 from the RIIF to the IEDA for deposit into the Strategic Infrastructure Program Fund.

Local Government Shared-Services Grant Fund: Appropriates \$10.0 million in FY 2027 from the RIIF to the IEDA for deposit in the Local Shared-Services Grant Fund. This appropriation is contingent on the enactment of 2026 Iowa Acts, [Senate Study Bill 3034](#) (Property Tax and Local Government Finance Bill); 2026 Iowa Acts, [House Study Bill 563](#) (Property Tax and Local Government Finance Bill); or successor legislation.

Library and Museum Renovation Project: Appropriates \$3.0 million in FY 2027 from the RIIF to the IEDA for a grant to a city with a population between 2,000 and 3,000 according to the 2020 census for the creation of an interactive museum exhibit at a presidential library.

Chief Information Officer Security Office: Appropriates \$2.9 million in FY 2027 from the TRF to the DOM, Security Office of the Chief Information Officer, for statewide endpoint detection and response, cybersecurity incident investigation response, and miscellaneous purposes. Page 9, Line 31

Iowa Integrated Justice (IIJ) System: Appropriates \$1.4 million in FY 2026 from the TRF to the DOM for continued development and implementation of the IIJ. Page 10, Line 1

Justice Data Warehouse: Appropriates \$283,000 in FY 2027 from the TRF to the DOM for the Justice Data Warehouse. Page 10, Line 5

Enterprise Artificial Intelligence (AI) Capacity Expansion: Appropriates \$2.5 million in FY 2027 from the TRF to the DOM for the enterprise AI capacity expansion. Page 10, Line 8

DPS/DOT Mobile Architecture for Communications Handling (MACH) and Traffic and Criminal Software (TraCS) Modernization: Appropriates \$2.0 million in FY 2027 from the TRF to the DOM for modernization of the MACH and TraCS programs. Page 10, Line 11

Digital Evidence Management System: Appropriates \$300,000 in FY 2027 from the TRF to the DPS for a new digital evidence management system. Page 10, Line 15

CHANGES TO PRIOR APPROPRIATIONS

Department of Transportation: Amends a previously enacted RIF appropriation of \$10.0 million for FY 2024 to the DOT for commercial service airport terminal improvements by allowing the funds to remain available for expenditure until December 31, 2026. Page 11, Line 17

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Department of Health and Human Services: Amends previously enacted RIIF appropriations for FY 2025 and FY 2026 to the HHS for the Woodward tunnel decentralization project by allowing the funds to remain available for expenditure until the end of FY 2028 and FY 2029, respectively, or until the project is completed, whichever is earlier.

Page 12, Line 1

STUDIES AND INTENT

Requires the DPD to report to the General Assembly by December 15, 2026, on the projects funded with appropriations in this Bill.

Page 6, Line 15

Nonreversion

Permits unexpended funds appropriated in Division I (RIIF) of this Bill to remain available for expenditure until the end of FY 2029. However, if the project is completed in an earlier fiscal year, the unencumbered or unobligated moneys revert at the end of that same fiscal year.

Page 7, Line 31

Permits unexpended funds appropriated in Division II (TRF) of this Bill to remain available for expenditure until the end of FY 2029. However, if the project is completed in an earlier fiscal year, the unencumbered or unobligated moneys will revert at the end of that same fiscal year.

Page 10, Line 26

SIGNIFICANT CODE CHANGES

Suspends the General Fund annual standing appropriation of \$17.5 million to the TRF for FY 2026.

Page 11, Line 1

EFFECTIVE DATE

Specifies that Division III of this Bill, related to changes to prior appropriations, is effective upon enactment.

Page 12, Line 23

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund (RIIF) appropriation to the Department of Administrative Services (DAS) for maintenance projects at Terrace Hill.

 DETAIL: This appropriation would fund residence window repairs and storm window replacements; heating, ventilation, and air conditioning (HVAC) repairs; and exterior wood trim, masonry, and pavement repairs at Terrace Hill.

1 13 2. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE AND LAND STEWARDSHIP
 1 14 a. (1) For deposit in the water quality initiative fund
 1 15 created in section 466B.45 for purposes of supporting the
 1 16 water quality initiative administered by the division of soil
 1 17 conservation and water quality as provided in section 466B.42,
 1 18 including salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous
 1 19 purposes, notwithstanding section 8.57, subsection 3, paragraph
 1 20 "c":
 1 21 \$ 8,200,000

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the Iowa Department of Agriculture and Land Stewardship (DALS) for the Iowa Water Quality Initiative. This appropriation is exempt from the vertical infrastructure requirement in Iowa Code section [8.57\(3\)\(c\)](#).

 DETAIL: The Water Quality Initiative provides funding for prioritized watersheds to implement conservation practices that will reduce nutrient transport to bodies of water in Iowa. Funded projects are typically managed by soil and water conservation districts. The Initiative was appropriated \$5,200,000 from the RIIF each year from FY 2016 through FY 2022. Since FY 2023, the Initiative has been appropriated \$8,200,000 from the RIIF. The Initiative has also received funding from the General Fund and the Environment First Fund (EFF). Since FY 2013, the Water Quality Initiative has received a total of \$131,095,201 from the General Fund, EFF, and RIIF.

1 22 (2) (a) The moneys appropriated in this lettered
 1 23 paragraph shall be used to support demonstration projects in
 1 24 subwatersheds as designated by the department that are part
 1 25 of high-priority watersheds identified by the water resources
 1 26 coordinating council.

Requires the appropriated funds to be used to support demonstration projects in subwatersheds that are included within high-priority watersheds as identified by the Water Resources Coordinating Council.

1 27 (b) The moneys appropriated in this lettered paragraph
 1 28 shall be used to support demonstration projects in watersheds
 1 29 generally, including regional watersheds, as designated by the
 1 30 division, and high-priority watersheds identified by the water
 1 31 resources coordinating council.

Requires funds to be used to support demonstration projects in watersheds generally, including regional watersheds identified by the Water Resources Coordinating Council.

1 32 (3) In supporting projects in watersheds and subwatersheds
 1 33 as provided in subparagraph (2), all of the following apply:

Specifies the following criteria for projects in high-priority watersheds:

1 34 (a) The demonstration projects must utilize water quality
 1 35 practices as described in the latest revision of the document
 2 1 entitled "Iowa Nutrient Reduction Strategy" initially presented
 2 2 in November 2012 by the department of agriculture and land
 2 3 stewardship, the department of natural resources, and Iowa
 2 4 state university of science and technology.

- Requires that projects utilize water quality practices described in the latest version of the Iowa Nutrient Reduction Strategy.
- Requires the DALS to collaborate with agricultural landowners in targeted watersheds.
- Prohibits the State's cost-share amount for water quality protection practices from exceeding 50.00% of the value of the practices, except in instances of edge-of-field practices.
- Requires that demonstration projects be used to educate the public about water quality practices.
- Requires the DALS to conduct water quality evaluations within targeted watersheds and create a database of water quality practices. All information received is a confidential record and exempt from public access.

2 5 (b) The division shall implement demonstration projects
 2 6 as provided in subparagraph division (a) by providing
 2 7 for participation by persons who hold a legal interest
 2 8 in agricultural land used in farming. To every extent
 2 9 practicable, the division shall provide for collaborative
 2 10 participation by such persons who hold a legal interest in
 2 11 agricultural land located within the same subwatershed.

2 12 (c) The division shall implement demonstration projects on
 2 13 a cost-share basis as determined by the division. Except for
 2 14 edge-of-field practices, the state's share of the amount shall
 2 15 not exceed 50 percent of the estimated cost of establishing the
 2 16 practice as determined by the division or 50 percent of the
 2 17 actual cost of establishing the practice, whichever is less.

2 18 (d) The demonstration projects shall be used to educate

3 6 (6) The moneys appropriated in this lettered paragraph
3 7 may be used by the department to support urban soil and water
3 8 conservation efforts, which may include but are not limited
3 9 to management practices related to bioretention, landscaping,
3 10 the use of permeable or pervious pavement, and soil quality
3 11 restoration. The moneys shall be allocated on a cost-share
3 12 basis as provided in chapter 161A.

3 13 (7) Notwithstanding any other provision of law to the
3 14 contrary, the department may use moneys appropriated in this
3 15 lettered paragraph to carry out the provisions of this lettered
3 16 paragraph on a cost-share basis in combination with other
3 17 moneys available to the department from a state or federal

3 19 (8) Not more than 10 percent of the moneys appropriated in

Requires the DALs to support education and outreach to encourage agricultural producers to establish water quality practices.

Permits the DALs to use funds for contracts that will assist with the coordination and implementation of the Water Quality Initiative.

Permits the DALs to use funds to support urban soil and water conservation practices and to allocate funds on a cost-share basis.

Permits the DALs to use the appropriated funds to implement projects on a cost-share basis and in combination with other funds available to the DALs.

Permits up to 10.00% of the appropriated funds for the Water Quality Initiative to be used for administration and implementation of the Initiative by the Soil Conservation Division.

3 23 b. (1) For updating the maximum return to nitrogen modeling
 3 24 system for fertilizer management, notwithstanding section 8.57,
 3 25 subsection 3, paragraph "c":
 3 26 \$ 1,000,000

DETAIL: Up to \$820,000 of the funds for administration and implementation of the Water Quality Initiative will be provided from the RIIF.

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the DALS for nitrogen modeling and fertilizer management. This appropriation is exempt from the vertical infrastructure requirement in Iowa Code section [8.57\(3\)\(c\)](#).

DETAIL: This appropriation funds research to update static maximum return to nitrogen (MRTN) recommendations to a new dynamic modeling system that considers variability in the environment, management, and weather. The research considers carbon dioxide equivalent (CO_{2e}) of nitrogen oxides (NO_x) with potential for carbon improvements to corn and soybean rotation systems. The goal of the research is to provide more accurate nitrogen recommendations that support higher crop yields and improve water quality by reducing the risk of nutrient runoff. There has been \$1,000,000 appropriated for this purpose since FY 2023.

3 27 (2) Any information received, collected, or held for
 3 28 purposes of this lettered paragraph is a confidential record
 3 29 exempt from public release if the information identifies a
 3 30 person who holds a legal interest in agricultural land or who
 3 31 has previously held a legal interest in agricultural land,
 3 32 a person who is involved or who was previously involved in
 3 33 managing the agricultural land or producing crops or livestock
 3 34 on the agricultural land, or the identifiable location of the
 3 35 agricultural land.

Requires the DALS to keep personal information collected from fertilizer management program participants confidential.

 4 2 For building repairs for the building located at 524 Fourth
 4 3 Street, Des Moines, Iowa:
 4 4 \$ 250,000

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the Department for the Blind for building repairs.

DETAIL: This appropriation will fund the increased costs for materials and installation associated with the replacement of the Department for the Blind's building's chiller. The Department also received the following amounts for building repairs from the RIIF:

- FY 2022: \$139,100

- FY 2023: \$196,900
- FY 2024: \$232,000
- FY 2025: \$225,600
- Estimated FY 2026: \$559,000

 4 6 For installing air conditioning at the Anamosa state
 4 7 penitentiary and the Mount Pleasant correctional facility:
 4 8 \$ 8,137,500

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the Department of Corrections (DOC) for installation of air conditioning at the Anamosa State Penitentiary (ASP) and the Mount Pleasant Correctional Facility (MPCF).

DETAIL: This appropriation would fund the installation of air conditioning in Living Unit C, Living Unit B, and Living Unit D Third Floor at the ASP and the installation of air conditioning in the east and west housing units at the MPCF.

 4 10 a. For deposit in the community attraction and tourism
 4 11 fund created in section 15F.204, notwithstanding section 8.57,
 4 12 subsection 3, paragraph "c":
 4 13 \$ 10,000,000

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the Iowa Economic Development Authority (IEDA) for the Community Attraction and Tourism (CAT) Fund, which supports the CAT program. This appropriation is exempt from the vertical infrastructure requirement in Iowa Code section [8.57\(3\)\(c\)](#).

DETAIL: The amount of funding to the CAT program from the RIIF has varied across fiscal years. Between FY 2015 and FY 2022, the CAT program received \$5,000,000 in annual appropriations from the RIIF. Since FY 2023, the CAT program has received \$10,000,000 in annual appropriations from the RIIF.

The CAT grants assist communities in the development and creation of multipurpose attraction and tourism facilities. Eligible CAT projects must be permanent recreational, cultural, educational, or entertainment attractions; be available to the general public; and promote tourism in local communities. Eligible applicants include cities, counties, public organizations, and school districts in cooperation with a city or county. Previously funded projects include the development of attractions such as wellness centers, recreational centers, parks, recreational trails, swimming pools and aquatic centers, riverfront plazas and marinas, streetscapes, museums, libraries,

performing arts centers, sports complexes, public gardens, visitor centers, and campgrounds.

DETAIL: The funds are used for projects identified in the annual Lake Restoration Plan and Report, focusing on 35 projects on the priority list of 127 lake candidates. The DNR is required to implement the projects in accordance with the Lake Restoration Plan and Report and Iowa Code section [456A.33B](#). The Plan and Report is submitted annually by January 1 to the Transportation, Infrastructure, and Capitals Appropriations Subcommittee.

Iowa Code section 456A.33B provides overall goals for the projects in the program. Specific criteria include water quality targets relating to clarity, biota, sustainability, and safety. In addition to this appropriation, the DNR has been appropriated a total of \$165,659,000 since FY 2008 for lake restoration projects

Since FY 2008, the DNR has received \$60,500,000 for infrastructure improvements at State parks from the RIIF.

DETAIL: Projects related to eligible water bodies as defined in Iowa Code section [456A.33C](#) (On-Stream Impoundment Restoration Fund) are eligible for grants from the Water Trails and Low Head Dam Safety grants appropriation in FY 2026.

These funds support grant awards to local entities for water trail enhancements and dam mitigation grants to dam owners, including State and local government entities and private

owners, to improve low head dam safety. State-designated water trails are designed to provide the following four basic types, or levels, of recreational experiences: gateway, recreational, challenge, and wilderness. Each segment of a water trail is assigned one of these experience ratings to reflect a range of conditions available to the user in the designated waterways.

While there are different types of low head dams, they generally consist of a riverwide dam that is normally overtopped by the entire river's flow. Flood gates may or may not be present to reduce upstream flooding effects. The height of these dams is less than 30 feet. Low head dams were originally constructed throughout Iowa to power gristmills and sawmills. Some dams were later used for hydroelectric generation. Low head dams can be extremely dangerous due to the powerful recirculating hydraulics that are generated. Since FY 2009, appropriations for the Water Trails and Low Head Dam Public Hazard Program from the RIIF have totaled \$16,800,000. Recent prior year appropriations for the Water Trails and Low Head Dam Public Hazard Program include the following:

The Derelict Building Program is an existing program within the DNR that provides funding to Iowa towns of 5,000 or fewer residents to address neglected commercial or public structures that have sat vacant for at least six months. The Program's main focus is landfill diversion through the recycling and reuse of building materials and the elimination of hazards, both inside and out, posed by these empty structures. This appropriation would be used to support the additional requests in funding

received by the Program in recent years. The Program receives its funding from the DNR's Solid Waste Alternatives Program.

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the Department of Public Defense (DPD) for major maintenance projects at National Guard facilities throughout the State.

DETAIL: Past projects have included parking lot repairs; upgrades to heating, ventilation, and air conditioning (HVAC), electrical, and plumbing systems; additional classroom and office space; and other major maintenance and improvement projects at all 42 armories and other buildings maintained by the Iowa National Guard. The Iowa National Guard armories are facing a backlog of deferred maintenance and equipment upgrade needs. Funding will be used for priority and emergency repairs first and then to address the backlog as funding is available. Generally, the State appropriation acts as a match to draw down federal funding on a one-to-one basis.

DETAIL: State funds are used to match federal funding and used for capital improvements across the readiness centers.

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the DPD for Camp Dodge improvements.

DETAIL: These funds match federal grants, with the State providing 15.00% and federal funds providing 85.00% of funding. Past upgrades include modernization of the natural gas, electric, phone, water, sanitary, storm water, paving surfaces, and energy security and resiliency systems.

This appropriation is exempt from the vertical infrastructure requirement in Iowa Code section [8.57\(3\)\(c\)](#).

DETAIL: A lease-purchase contract was signed with Motorola in 2015 at an estimated cost of \$39,500,000 (\$36,400,000 in principal and \$3,100,000 in interest) over 10 years. The tenth and final payment was made by the State in FY 2026. This appropriation will be used to fund the ongoing tower maintenance agreement. The difference will be funded from the Primary Road Fund. In FY 2024, the State contractually assumed an annual maintenance agreement in the amount of \$2,315,350. The Motorola maintenance agreement will continue through FY 2030.

DETAIL: This appropriation replaces student tuition and fees that pay the debt service on academic revenue bonds authorized in prior fiscal years. Iowa Code chapter [262A](#), enacted in the 1969 Legislative Session, authorizes the sale of academic revenue bonds by the Board of Regents.

The first academic revenue bonds were issued in 1970 and provided the primary source of funds for construction of academic facilities at the universities for several decades. Academic revenue bonds are secured by student tuition and

fees. The appropriation is not mandatory by statute, but the Board of Regents indicated that without a tuition replacement appropriation, an aggregate tuition increase of 3.40% across the universities will be required to pay the debt service.

Funding for tuition replacement has been provided for many decades. Until FY 2002, the appropriation was made solely from the General Fund. Beginning in FY 2002, portions were funded from the General Fund and from infrastructure-related funds such as the RIIF and the Restricted Capitals Fund. From FY 2006 to FY 2008, funding for this appropriation was divided between the General Fund and the RIIF. Since FY 2009, the entire appropriation has been funded from the RIIF. The exception to this is FY 2018, in which appropriations were made from both the RIIF and the State Bond Repayment Fund.

The tuition replacement appropriation provides most of the annual debt service on the academic revenue bonds, but a portion of the debt service is paid from annual reductions in the Debt Service Reserve Fund.

DETAIL: This appropriation would fund the complete renovation of the Commons building on the UNI campus into a hub for outreach and civic education through a new Center for Civic Education to the Commons. The current Commons building at UNI has a variety of deferred maintenance issues, including HVAC systems, windows, and roof. This project received \$1,000,000 from the RIIF in FY 2026. Total appropriation requests beyond FY 2027 include \$14,340,000 in FY 2028 and \$8,540,000 in FY 2029. Total project funding is proposed at \$33,200,000, which includes \$3,320,000 from institutional funds, gifts, and grants.

DETAIL: This project would fund a nursing simulation laboratory at the SUI. Total appropriation requests beyond FY 2027 include \$7,000,000 in FY 2028 and \$6,000,000 in FY 2029. Total project funding is proposed at \$40,000,000, which includes \$20,000,000 in funding from University of Iowa General Fund Building Renewal.

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the Department of Transportation (DOT) for the Recreational Trails Program.

DETAIL: The State Recreational Trails Program consists of developed multiuse recreational trails and off-road paths throughout the State. A local match of 25.00% is required in accordance with the DOT administrative rules. Trails that receive funding must be maintained for public use for a minimum of 20 years. Applications for funding from the Trails Program are considered twice per year and are approved by the Transportation Commission. Appropriations for the last seven years include the following:

- FY 2025: \$3,500,000 from the RIIF
- FY 2024: \$2,500,000 from the RIIF
- FY 2023: \$2,500,000 from the RIIF

- FY 2020: \$1,500,000 from the RIIF

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the DOT for public transit infrastructure grants through the Public Transit Infrastructure Grant Fund.

DETAIL: Transit agencies may apply for grants that are approved through the Transportation Commission, and projects must meet the definition of vertical infrastructure. The State match requirement may be up to 80.00%. Funds are used for capital projects such as new bus storage buildings, administrative buildings, maintenance facilities, storage buildings, reconstruction of steam cleaning areas, or vehicle storage and wash bays, as well as for replacing roofs or other improvements. Between FY 2012 and FY 2020, annual appropriations for the Grant Fund were \$1,500,000. Appropriations since FY 2021 include the following:

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the DOT for the Railroad Revolving Loan and Grant Program. This appropriation is exempt from the vertical infrastructure requirement in Iowa Code section [8.57\(3\)\(c\)](#).

DETAIL: Historically, this Program has received appropriations from the RIF. Recent appropriations include the following:

- Estimated Net FY 2026: \$2,000,000
- FY 2025: \$2,000,000
- FY 2024: \$500,000
- FY 2023: \$2,000,000
- FY 2022: \$1,000,000
- FY 2021: \$500,000
- FY 2020: \$1,000,000

The funds are used to provide grants and loans for construction and improvements to railroad facilities such as railroad main lines, branch lines, switching yards, sidings, rail connections, intermodal yards, and highway grade separations. The Railroad Revolving Loan and Grant Program is targeted toward job growth and economic development. The Program has the

following three eligible funding categories: job creation, rail network improvement, and rail port planning and development. Industries, railroads, local governments, and economic development agencies are eligible to apply for grants and loans from the Program.

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the DOT for infrastructure improvements at commercial service airports.

DETAIL: Since FY 2012, appropriations have been made from the RIIF for improvements at commercial service airports. Since FY 2022, \$1,900,000 has been appropriated annually from the RIIF. There are eight commercial service airports in the State, located in Burlington, Cedar Rapids, Des Moines, Dubuque, Fort Dodge, Mason City, Sioux City, and Waterloo.

The funds are distributed through a 50/40/10 formula. For this appropriation, \$950,000 (50.00%) will be allocated equally among each of the commercial service airports, \$760,000 (40.00%) will be allocated based on the percentage of enplaned passengers during the previous fiscal year, and \$190,000 (10.00%) will be allocated based on the proportion of air cargo tonnage at each airport during the previous fiscal year. Airports submit applications to the DOT Office of Aviation for specific projects that are considered for approval by the Transportation Commission. No local match is required. Projects must meet the definition of vertical infrastructure.

In FY 2024, there was an additional \$10,000,000 appropriated from the RIIF for commercial service airport terminal improvements. Commercial airports were required to provide a 90.00% match for grants and could not utilize federal funds to provide the match.

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the DOT for infrastructure improvements at general aviation airports.

Fund. Since FY 2022, \$1,000,000 has been appropriated annually from the RIIF for infrastructure improvements at general aviation airports.

General aviation airport vertical infrastructure projects may receive up to 85.00% of the total project costs but require a minimum level of \$5,000 in local match to be considered. Projects must meet the definition of vertical infrastructure. Eligible airports apply to the DOT Office of Aviation. Projects receive final approval from the Transportation Commission. These grants are available only for public use general aviation airports.

County fairs receive approximately \$10,095 each. Examples of facilities recently renovated or constructed include sheep barns, grandstand roofs, offices, Americans with Disabilities Act-compliant restrooms and showers, hoop buildings, cattle barns, community centers and exhibit buildings, main auditoriums, and horse barns.
