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FUNDING SUMMARY

Other Funds — FY 2027: This Bill appropriates a net total of \$190.1 million for FY 2027 from the following sources:

- Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund (RIIF): \$189.0 million in FY 2027. *(See note.)*
- Technology Reinvestment Fund (TRF): \$38.4 million in FY 2027.

General Fund — FY 2027: This Bill suspends a \$17.5 million standing appropriation from the General Fund to the TRF for FY 2027 and appropriates \$37.3 million to the TRF from the RIIF. This action funds the TRF for FY 2027 and makes funding available for \$38.4 million in new TRF appropriations in this Bill. The Bill also suspends a \$5.0 million appropriation from the General Fund to the Renewable Fuel Infrastructure Fund (RFIF) for FY 2027.

Note: To avoid double counting, the \$37.3 million appropriation to the TRF from the RIIF is excluded from the total above.

MAJOR INCREASES/DECREASES/TRANSFERS OF EXISTING PROGRAMS

State Capitol Maintenance Fund: Increases the standing appropriation from the RIIF to the State Capitol Maintenance Fund from \$500,000 to \$750,000.

Iowa Integrated Justice (IIJ) System: Appropriates \$1.4 million in FY 2026 from the TRF to the DOM for continued development and implementation of the IIJ. Page 12, Line 27

Justice Data Warehouse: Appropriates \$283,000 in FY 2027 from the TRF to the DOM for the Justice Data Warehouse. Page 12, Line 31

Enterprise Artificial Intelligence (AI) Capacity Expansion: Appropriates \$2.5 million in FY 2027 from the TRF to the DOM for the enterprise AI capacity expansion. Page 12, Line 34

DPS/DOT Mobile Architecture for Communications Handling (MACH) and Traffic and Criminal Software (TraCS) Modernization: Appropriates \$2.0 million in FY 2027 from the TRF to the DOM for modernization of the MACH and TraCS programs. Page 13, Line 2

Digital Evidence Management System: Appropriates \$300,000 in FY 2027 from the TRF to the DPS for a new digital evidence management system. Page 13, Line 6

Treasurer of State (TOS)
Clearwater Software: Appropriates \$192,000 in FY 2027 from the TRF to the TOS for software related to investment tracking. Page 13, Line 15

Tyler Tech Software: Appropriates \$228,000 in FY 2027 from the TRF to the TOS for software related to banking reconciliations. Page 13, Line 18

CHANGES TO PRIOR APPROPRIATIONS

Department of Transportation: Amends a previously enacted RIF appropriation of \$10.0 million for FY 2024 to the DOT for commercial service airport terminal improvements by allowing the funds to remain available for expenditure until December 31, 2026. Page 14, Line 12

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Department of Administrative Services: Extends the time frame for the DAS to use FY 2025 appropriated moneys to improve and repair the steps on the west side of the exterior of the Capitol building and for projects on the east side of the exterior of the Capitol building from June 30, 2026, to October 31, 2026.

Page 14, Line 31

Department of Health and Human Services

Woodward Tunnel Decentralization: Amends previously enacted RIIF appropriations for FY 2025 to the HHS for the Woodward tunnel decentralization project by allowing the funds to remain available for expenditure until the end of FY 2028, or until the project is completed, whichever is earlier.

Page 15, Line 6

State Medical Examiner's Office: Amends a previously enacted RIIF appropriation for FY 2025 to the HHS for the State Medical Examiner's Office expansion project by allowing the funds to remain available for expenditure until the end of FY 2028, or until the project is completed, whichever is earlier.

Civil Commitment Unit for Sexual Offenders (CCUSO) Patient Doors Conversion: Amends a previously enacted RIIF appropriation for FY 2025 to the HHS for the CCUSO patient doors conversion project by allowing the funds to remain available for expenditure until the end of FY 2028, or until the project is completed, whichever is earlier.

STUDIES AND INTENT

Specifies that in FY 2027, regarding major information technology system replacement, redevelopment, or modernization, the HHS must not enter into, amend, or extend a contract, purchase order, interagency agreement, or other financial obligation that will cost more than \$5.0 million or commit the State to multiyear financial obligations. This limitation does not apply to information technology changes needed to comply with the One Big Beautiful Bill Act if the changes do not materially advance broader system modernization or system replacement efforts.

Page 17, Line 25

Requires the HHS, in consultation with the Legislative Services Agency (LSA) and the DOM, to establish an information technology modernization study committee on or before August 1, 2026, to conduct a comprehensive review of the HHS's information technology systems, data architecture, and modernization strategy.

Page 18, Line 12

Nonreversion

Permits unencumbered or unobligated funds appropriated in Division I (RIIF) of this Bill to remain available for expenditure until the end of FY 2029. However, if the project is completed in an earlier fiscal year, the unencumbered or unobligated moneys will revert at the end of that same fiscal year.

Page 10, Line 22

Permits unencumbered or unobligated funds appropriated in Division II (TRF) of this Bill to remain available for expenditure until the end of FY 2029. However, if the project is completed in an earlier fiscal year, the unencumbered or unobligated moneys will revert at the end of that same fiscal year.

Page 13, Line 21

Required Reports

Requires the DPD to report to the General Assembly by December 15, 2026, on the projects funded with appropriations in this Bill.

Page 7, Line 32

Requires the HHS to submit a report to the General Assembly and the Governor before January 1, 2027, detailing the HHS Information Technology Modernization Study Committee’s findings, recommended statutory or budgetary changes, estimated costs and timelines, and options for phased implementation.

Page 20, Line 4

SIGNIFICANT CODE CHANGES

Suspends the General Fund annual standing appropriation of \$17.5 million to the TRF for FY 2026.

Page 13, Line 31

Suspends the General Fund standing appropriation of \$5.0 million to the RFIF for FY 2027.

Page 15, Line 33

Makes various Iowa code changes related to Regional Sports Authority Districts, including the following changes:

Page 16, Line 4

- Adds the definition of “entity” to Iowa Code section [15E.321](#) (Regional Sports Authority Districts) to mean an Iowa nonprofit organization established to promote economic development and tourism in an area within the State.
- Removes the requirement that only a convention and visitors bureau can apply for certification of a Regional Sports Authority District and specifies that an entity may apply for certification and for financial assistance.
- Removes the limitation that the IEDA may only certify 10 regional sports authority districts.
- Adds the requirement that the IEDA should consider the number of unique and innovative activities to be supported by the district when evaluating applications.
- Removes the requirement that a Regional Sports Authority District must promote nonprofessional sporting events and instead specifies that the events must be physical sporting events.
- Eliminates the requirement that each Regional Sports Authority District be governed by a seven-member board.
- Adds a requirements that each Regional Sports Authority District must submit a report to the IEDA no later than 30 days after the final date of the activity detailing the return on investment, the number of

new visitors, the total number of hotel rooms occupied, and any additional information as requested by the IEDA.

EFFECTIVE DATE

Specifies that Division III of this Bill, related to changes to prior appropriations, is effective upon enactment.

Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund appropriation to the Iowa Department of Agriculture and Land Stewardship (DALs) for the Iowa Water Quality Initiative. This appropriation is exempt from the vertical infrastructure requirement in Iowa Code section [8.57\(3\)\(c\)](#).

 DETAIL: The Water Quality Initiative provides funding for prioritized watersheds to implement conservation practices that will reduce nutrient transport to bodies of water in Iowa. Funded projects are typically managed by soil and water conservation districts. The Initiative was appropriated \$5,200,000 from the RIIF each year from FY 2016 through FY 2022. Since FY 2023, the Initiative has been appropriated \$8,200,000 from the RIIF. The Initiative has also received funding from the General Fund and the Environment First Fund (EFF). Since FY 2013, the Water Quality Initiative has received a total of \$131,095,201 from the General Fund, EFF, and RIIF.

1 23 (2) (a) The moneys appropriated in this lettered
 1 24 paragraph shall be used to support demonstration projects in
 1 25 subwatersheds as designated by the department that are part
 1 26 of high-priority watersheds identified by the water resources
 1 27 coordinating council.

Requires the appropriated funds to be used to support demonstration projects in subwatersheds that are included within high-priority watersheds as identified by the Water Resources Coordinating Council.

 1 29 shall be used to support demonstration projects in watersheds
 1 30 generally, including regional watersheds, as designated by the

Specifies the following criteria for projects in high-priority watersheds:

1 35 (a) The demonstration projects must utilize water quality

 2 2 entitled "Iowa Nutrient Reduction Strategy" initially presented
 2 3 in November 2012 by the department of agriculture and land
 2 4 stewardship, the department of natural resources, and Iowa

- Requires that projects utilize water quality practices described in the latest version of the Iowa Nutrient Reduction Strategy.
- Requires the DALS to collaborate with agricultural landowners in targeted watersheds.
- Prohibits the State's cost-share amount for water quality protection practices from exceeding 50.00% of the value of the practices, except in instances of edge-of-field practices.
- Requires that demonstration projects be used to educate the public about water quality practices.
- Requires the DALS to conduct water quality evaluations within targeted watersheds and create a database of water quality practices. All information received is a confidential record and exempt from public access.

2 6 (b) The division shall implement demonstration projects
 2 7 as provided in subparagraph division (a) by providing
 2 8 for participation by persons who hold a legal interest
 2 9 in agricultural land used in farming. To every extent
 2 10 practicable, the division shall provide for collaborative
 2 11 participation by such persons who hold a legal interest in

These funds support grant awards to local entities for water trail enhancements and dam mitigation grants to dam owners, including State and local government entities and private owners, to improve low head dam safety. State-designated water trails are designed to provide the following four basic types, or levels, of recreational experiences: gateway, recreational, challenge, and wilderness. Each segment of a water trail is assigned one of these experience ratings to reflect a range of conditions available to the user in the designated waterways.

While there are different types of low head dams, they generally consist of a riverwide dam that is normally overtopped by the entire river's flow. Flood gates may or may not be present to reduce upstream flooding effects. The height of these dams is less than 30 feet. Low head dams were originally constructed throughout Iowa to power gristmills and sawmills. Some dams were later used for hydroelectric generation. Low head dams can be extremely dangerous due to the powerful recirculating hydraulics that are generated. Since FY 2009, appropriations for the Water Trails and Low Head Dam Public Hazard Program from the RIIF have totaled \$16,800,000. Recent prior year appropriations for the Water Trails and Low Head Dam Public Hazard Program include the following:

The first academic revenue bonds were issued in 1970 and provided the primary source of funds for construction of academic facilities at the universities for several decades. Academic revenue bonds are secured by student tuition and fees. The appropriation is not mandatory by statute, but the Board of Regents indicated that without a tuition replacement appropriation, an aggregate tuition increase of 3.40% across the universities will be required to pay the debt service.

Funding for tuition replacement has been provided for many decades. Until FY 2002, the appropriation was made solely from the General Fund. Beginning in FY 2002, portions were funded from the General Fund and from infrastructure-related funds such as the RIIF and the Restricted Capitals Fund. From FY 2006 to FY 2008, funding for this appropriation was divided between the General Fund and the RIIF. Since FY 2009, the entire appropriation has been funded from the RIIF. The exception to this is FY 2018, in which appropriations were made from both the RIIF and the State Bond Repayment Fund.

The tuition replacement appropriation provides most of the annual debt service on the academic revenue bonds, but a portion of the debt service is paid from annual reductions in the Debt Service Reserve Fund.
