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FUNDING SUMMARY

General Fund FY 2027: Appropriates a total of \$47.5 million from the General Fund and 1618.0 full-time equivalent (FTE) positions for FY 2027. This is a net increase of \$900,000 and an increase of 221.1 FTE positions compared to estimated net FY 2026.

The General Fund changes include the following:

- An increase of \$356,000 to the DALs Administrative Division.
- An increase of \$300,000 to the Choose Iowa Fund.
- A new appropriation of \$200,000 to the Department of Agriculture and Land Stewardship (DALs) for the Choose Iowa School Purchasing Program.
- A new appropriation of \$122,000 to the Iowa State University (ISU) Veterinary Laboratory to assist in moving equipment and materials into its refurbished facility.
- A decrease of \$78,000 to the State University of Iowa (SUI) for groundwater planning and resources assessment.

Other Funds FY 2027: Appropriates a total of \$119.2 million from other funds. This is a net increase of \$18.2 million compared to estimated net FY 2026. This Bill appropriates \$53.1 million from the Fish and Wildlife Trust Fund, \$42.0 million from the Environment First Fund (EFF), \$18.0 million from the Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund (RIIF), \$4.0 million from the Groundwater Protection Fund (GWPF), and \$2.4 million from various other funds.

Iowa Code section [8.57A](#) contains a standing appropriation of \$42.0 million from the Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund (RIIF) to the EFF, and this Bill appropriates the following amounts to the following departments for FY 2027:

- \$17.3 million to the DALs.
- \$24.0 million to the Department of Natural Resources (DNR).
- \$695,000 to the SUI.

This Bill appropriates \$12.0 million from the EFF to the Resource Enhancement and Protection (REAP) Fund in lieu of the \$20.0 million General Fund standing appropriation in Iowa Code chapter [455A](#) and allocates \$1.0 million from the Open Spaces Account of the REAP to be used for State park maintenance, repair, and refurbishment for FY 2027. This Bill also appropriates \$375,000 from the EFF for the Floodplain Management and Dam Safety Program in addition to a \$1.5 million appropriation from the General Fund.

NEW PROGRAMS, SERVICES, OR ACTIVITIES

- General Fund — Choose Iowa School Purchasing Program:** Appropriates \$200,000 from the General Fund to the DALs in FY 2027 for the Choose Iowa School Purchasing Program. This is a new appropriation for FY 2027. Page 6, Line 6
- Other Funds — Water Quality Monitoring — DNR:** Appropriates \$300,000 for FY 2027 from the GWPF to the DNR to support water quality monitoring. This is a new appropriation for FY 2027. Page 8, Line 20
- Other Funds — Groundwater Protection Fund — Water Quality:** Appropriates \$176,000 to the DNR from the GWPF in FY 2027 for water quality. This is a new appropriation for FY 2027 and will be used to support the DNR's protection of the State's groundwater and will include administration, regulation, programs, salaries, support, maintenance, equipment, and miscellaneous purposes. Page 8, Line 34
- General Fund — ISU Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory Moving Assistance:** This is a new appropriation of \$122,000 from the General Fund for FY 2027 to the ISU Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory to assist in the installation and moving of equipment into its refurbished facility. In FY 2026, there was an appropriation of \$250,000 from the Iowa Animal Disease Prevention Fund (IADPF) for this purpose. Page 11, Line 16
- Other Funds — Iowa Geological Survey Groundwater Planning and Resource Assessment:** This is a new appropriation of \$78,000 for FY 2027. The assessment project involves mapping groundwater aquifers and measuring the amount of water contained within by the Iowa Geological Survey at the SUI. Page 14, Line 8
- Other Funds — Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund (RIIF) — Iowa Finance Authority — Water Quality Financial Assistance Fund:** A new appropriation of \$8.0 million from the RIIF for FY 2027 to the IFA to support the Wastewater and Drinking Water Treatment Financial Assistance Program to provide financial assistance for the installation and upgrade of wastewater and drinking water treatment facilities and systems. Page 23, Line 26
- Other Funds — RIIF — Iowa Finance Authority — Rural Iowa Infrastructure Bank Revolving Loan Program:** A new appropriation of \$10.0 million from the RIIF for FY 2027 to the IFA to the Rural Infrastructure Bank Revolving Loan Program created in the Bill to provide loans to small or medium sized communities to upgrade water or wastewater infrastructure. Page 24, Line 7
- Other Funds — Water Quality Monitoring (Standing) — Water Quality Financial Assistance Fund:** Creates a new standing appropriation of \$500,000 from the Water Quality Financial Assistance Fund (WQFAF) to the DNR for the purpose of water quality monitoring. Page 24, Line 15

Creates the Rural Iowa Infrastructure Bank Revolving Loan Program in the IFA.

Page 26, Line 20

MAJOR INCREASES/DECREASES/TRANSFERS OF EXISTING PROGRAMS

General Fund — DALs Administrative Division: Appropriates a total of \$20.7 million and 420.0 FTE positions from the General Fund for FY 2027. This is an increase of \$356,000 and 78.6 FTE positions compared to estimated net FY 2026.

Page 1, Line 9

General Fund — Choose Iowa Fund: An increase of \$300,000 compared to estimated net FY 2026. The Choose Iowa Fund provides funding for the administration of the Value Added Agricultural Grant Program, Choose Iowa Promotional Program, and Dairy Innovation Revitalization Program.

Page 5, Line 5

General Fund — Iowa Geological Survey Groundwater Planning and Resource Assessment: A decrease of \$78,000 compared to estimated net FY 2026 to the Iowa Geological Survey at the SUI to support groundwater planning and resources assessment. The Bill also appropriates \$78,000 from the GWPF in FY 2027 for this purpose.

Page 13, Line 18

Other Funds — Iowa Animal Disease Prevention Fund (IADPF) — DALs Foreign Animal Disease Equipment: Appropriates a total of \$150,000 from the IADPF to the DALs to purchase and maintain equipment to further the implementation of the Foreign Animal Disease Preparedness and Response Strategy. This is a decrease in funding of \$100,000 compared to estimated net FY 2026.

Page 23, Line 4

Other Funds — IADPF — Foreign Animal Disease Preparedness and Response Fund: Appropriates a total of \$200,000 from the IADPF to the Foreign Animal Disease Preparedness and Response Fund. This is an increase in funding of \$100,000 compared to estimated net FY 2026.

Page 23, Line 13

Other Funds — IADPF — DALs Information Technology (IT) Resources: Appropriates a total of \$160,000 from the IADPF to the DALs for IT upgrades. This is a decrease in funding of \$290,000 compared to estimated net FY 2026.

Page 23, Line 16

Changes the standing appropriations from the Water Quality Financial Assistance Fund (WQFAF) to the following distributions:

Page 24, Line 15

- Appropriates \$500,000 to the DNR for water quality monitoring, which can include continuous monitoring.
- Appropriates 65.0% of the money remaining in the WQFAF to the IFA to support the Wastewater and Drinking Water Financial Assistance Program.

- Appropriates 15.0% of the remaining money in the WQFAF appropriated to the Division of Soil Conservation and Water Quality in the DALs to support the Water Quality Urban Infrastructure Program.
- Appropriates 20.0% of the money remain in the WQFAF to the Division of Soil Conservation and Water Quality in the DALs for deposit in the Water Quality Initiative Fund to provide technical assistance and support conservation practices in counties located in 8 different watersheds.

Allocates \$25.0 million from any unencumbered or unobligated moneys in the Water Quality Financing Program Fund to a regional water authority with membership consisting of public utilities, rural water districts, and other governmental entities, which serves a population of at least 600,000 and headquartered in the most populous county in the State based on the 2020 decennial census, for the purpose of constructing and installing additional nutrient removal technology. Allows these moneys to remain available for expenditure until June 30, 2029.

Page 25, Line 29

Transfers any unencumbered or unobligated moneys in the Water Quality Financing Program Fund remaining after July 31, 2026, to the WQFAF to provide technical assistance and support conservation practices in counties located in eight different watersheds. Any obligated moneys prior to July 1, 2026, are to remain in the Water Quality Financing Program Fund.

Page 26, Line 8

STUDIES AND INTENT

Intent

Requires the DALs to enter into a cost-sharing agreement with Iowa State University (ISU) to support the Local Food and Farm Program Coordinator position as part of the University's cooperative extension service in agriculture and home economics pursuant to Iowa Code chapter [267A](#).

Page 3, Line 3

Permits the DNR to use unappropriated funds from the State Fish and Game Protection Fund to provide funding of insurance premiums from unused sick leave balances of retiring conservation peace officers.

Page 7, Line 30

Permits the DNR to use unappropriated funds from the State Fish and Game Protection Fund for salary adjustment costs for FY 2027.

Page 8, Line 1

Requires any grant awarded from the moneys appropriated from the GWPF for water quality monitoring to be agreed upon by the DALs, DNR, and College of Agriculture and Life Sciences at ISU.

Page 9, Line 4

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Specifies that the amount appropriated cannot exceed the total amount of interest and earnings on moneys in the GWPF and its accounts accrued during FY 2027 and the amount appropriated can only be made available after the maximum amount of interest and earnings is made available to the SUI.

Page 9, Line 9

Specifies that the appropriated amount cannot exceed the total amount of interest and earnings on moneys in the GWPF and its accounts accrued during FY 2027.

Page 13, Line 30

Specifies that the appropriated amount cannot exceed the total amount of interest and earnings on moneys in the GWPF and its accounts accrued during FY 2027.

Page 14, Line 29

Allows the DNR to use up to \$1.0 million from the Open Spaces Account for State park maintenance, repair, and refurbishment in FY 2027.

Page 22, Line 20

Nonreversion

Allows any unencumbered or unobligated funds from the Dairy Survey Program to carry forward for expenditure in FY 2028.

Page 2, Line 29

Allows any unencumbered or unobligated funds from the Local Food and Farm Program appropriation to carry forward for expenditure in FY 2028.

Page 3, Line 8

Allows any unencumbered or unobligated from the Iowa FFA Association appropriation to carry forward for expenditure in FY 2028.

Page 3, Line 18

Allows any unencumbered or unobligated funds from the Farmers With Disabilities Program appropriation to carry forward for expenditure in FY 2028.

Page 4, Line 10

Allows the unexpended funds from the Choose Iowa Food Purchasing Program appropriation to carry forward for expenditure in FY 2028.

Page 5, Line 34

Allows any unencumbered or unobligated funds from the Choose Iowa School Purchasing Program appropriation to carry forward for expenditure in FY 2028.

Page 6, Line 16

Allows any unencumbered or unobligated funds from the Floodplain Management and Dam Safety appropriation to carry forward for expenditure in FY 2028.

Page 10, Line 6

Allows any unencumbered or unobligated funds from the Forestry Health Management appropriation to carry forward for expenditure in FY 2028.

Page 10, Line 15

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Allows any unencumbered or unobligated funds from the Groundwater Planning and Resources Assessment appropriation to remain available for expenditure.

Page 14, Line 3

Allows any unencumbered or unobligated funds from the EFF appropriations to remain available for expenditure until the close of FY 2028 or until a specific project is completed, whichever is earlier.

Page 19, Line 10

Allows any unencumbered or unobligated funds from the EFF appropriations for soil and water conservation practices to remain available for expenditure until the close of FY 2030.

Page 19, Line 19

Specifies that the Hungry Canyons allocation to the Loess Hills Development and Conservation Fund in this Bill is exempt from reversion.

Page 19, Line 28

Allows any unencumbered or unobligated funds from the Iowa Animal Disease Prevention Fund (IADPF) to carry forward for expenditure in FY 2028.

Page 23, Line 19

Required Reports

Requires the DALs to submit a quarterly report to the General Assembly and the Department of Management (DOM) detailing the expenditure of the moneys appropriated for DALs administration, regulation, and programs.

Page 1, Line 26

Requires the DNR to submit a quarterly report to the General Assembly and the DOM detailing the expenditure of moneys appropriated for DNR administration, regulation, and programs.

Page 7, Line 10

Reversion Requirements

Specifies that any unencumbered or unobligated funds appropriated in FY 2026 to Iowa's Center for Agricultural Safety and Health (I-CASH) will revert to the General Fund at the end of FY 2027. If moneys are reverted, the SUI is required to transfer to the General Fund from other unencumbered General Fund appropriations or other funds the difference between the amount reverted and the amount appropriated.

Page 13, Line 10

SIGNIFICANT CODE CHANGES

Increases the maximum grant from the Wastewater and Drinking Water Treatment Financial Assistance Program from \$500,000 to \$1,000,000.

Page 24, Line 11

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

AGRICULTURE AND NATURAL RESOURCES APPROPRIATIONS BILL - AS AMENDED

Prohibits the IFA from initiating any new loans under the Water Quality Financing Program after June 30, 2026. Any loans or interest payments received on or after July 1, 2026, are deposited in the WQFAF to support the Wastewater and Drinking Water Treatment Financial Assistance Program.

Page 25, Line 19

EFFECTIVE DATE

Specifies that Division I, Part B regarding the Choose Iowa School Purchasing Program appropriation, is effective July 1, 2026, if 2026 Iowa Acts, House File [2748](#) (Agricultural Programs and Activities Bill), or successor legislation, is enacted.
