JUSTICE SYSTEM	• Appropriates a total of \$367.6 million from the General Fund and 6,051.9 FTE positions for FY 2004. This is an increase of \$9.6 million and 17.0 FTE positions compared to the FY 2003 estimated net General Fund appropriation. Salary adjustment funding of \$5.7 million was provided from non-General Fund sources for FY 2003. Of this salary adjustment total, \$5.7 million has been included in the General Fund appropriations for FY 2004.
DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE	• Appropriates a total of \$10.0 million from the General Fund and 257.5 FTE positions, an increase of \$167,000 and 3.0 FTE positions compared to the FY 2003 estimated net General Fund appropriation. This is a decrease of \$167,000 in other funds for the Department for FY 2004 compared to the FY 2003 estimated net appropriation for the elimination of one-time salary funding. Major changes include:

	• Administration: Increases the appropriation by \$1.1 million. The change includes:
