### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY** AGRICULTURE AND NATURAL RESOURCES APPROPRIATIONS BILL

#### FUNDING SUMMARY

• Appropriates a total of \$32.9 million from the General Fund and 1,536.0 FTE positions for FY 2012. This is a decrease of \$839,000 and and increase of 12.4 FTE positions compared to estimated FY 2011. The Bill also appropriates \$76.6 million from other funds. This is an increase of \$200,000 compared to estimated FY 2011.

This Division makes Environment First Fund appropriations totaling \$33.0 million for FY 2012.

Environment First Fund appropriation to the DALS for the Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program (CREP).

DETAIL: This is a decrease of \$500,000 compared to estimated FY 2011. The Program is designed to protect floodplains and improve water quality from the agricultural drainage systems through the removal of nitrates from tile-drained water.

Prohibits the DALS from using more than 10.00% of the funds appropriated from the Environment First Fund for administration and implementation of soil and water conservation practices.

Allows the DALS to combine Environment First Fund appropriations as cost share funds to federal Natural Resources Conservation Service Wetlands Reserve Enhancement Program.
