FUNDING SUMMARY

Appropriates a total of \$554.4 million from the General Fund for FY 2015 to the Departments of Justice, Corrections, Inspections and Appeals, Public Defense, Human Rights, Public Safety, and Homeland Security and Emergency Management, the Iowa Law Enforcement Academy, Board of Parole, and Civil Rights Commission. This is an increase of \$6.6 million compared to estimated FY 2014. This Bill also appropriates a total of \$14.0 million from other funds for FY 2015 reflecting no change compared to estimated FY 2014.
