**NOTES ON BILLS AND AMENDMENTS (NOBA)** 

#### EDUCATION APPROPRIATIONS BILL

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**FY 2016:** Appropriates a total of \$1,026.0 million from the General Fund and 12,048.5 FTE positions for FY 2016 to the Department for the Blind, the College Student Aid Commission, the Department of Education, and the Board of Regents. This is an increase of \$39.8 million and 1.0 FTE position compared to estimated FY 2015.

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Appropriates a total of \$40.3 million from the Skilled Worker and Job Creation Fund (SWJCF) for FY 2016. This is no change compared to estimated FY 2015.

**FY 2017:** General Fund and SWJCF appropriations for FY 2017 are funded at 50.0% of FY 2016 levels.

### **NEW PROGRAMS, SERVICES, OR ACTIVITIES**

*Early Literacy Warning System:* This is a new appropriation for FY 2016. Funding for this purpose was included in the FY 2015 appropriation for the Department of Education Administration. The Early Warning System provides reading assessments for Pre-K through grade 6 to detect students deficient in reading. Local school districts use universal screening and progress monitoring assessments, and store student performance data on a statewide database. The Iowa Department of Education provides the assessments at no cost to schools.

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*High Need Schools:* This is a new appropriation of \$10.0 million for the High Need Schools program to provide supplemental assistance for identified schools with students whose first language is not English, who have special needs, and are of low-income backgrounds.

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*Iowa Academic Standards:* This is a new appropriation of \$1.5 million for the Iowa Academic Standards Program.

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*Career Planning System for grades 9-12:* A new appropriation of \$600,000 for development of a Career Planning System for grades 9-12 to replace the I Have a Plan Iowa (IHAPI) career information and decision making system that has been provided by the College Student Aid Commission (CSAC) in previous years.

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# MAJOR INCREASES/DECREASES/TRANSFERS OF EXISTING PROGRAMS

*College Student Aid Commission (CSAC):* An increase of \$2.3 million compared to estimated FY 2015. The changes include:

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- CSAC Administration An increase of \$182,000 to fund an increase in office rental expense.
- Iowa Tuition Grant (Nonprofit) An increase of \$2.0 million to fund additional and/or larger awards.
- Iowa Tuition Grant (For-Profit) An increase of \$100,000 to fund additional awards.

# **Department of Education:** An increase of \$20.9 million compared to estimated FY 2015. The changes include:

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- A decrease of \$1.9 million for Department of Education Administration.
- An increase of \$282,000 for Iowa Public Television to fund an increase in dues to the Public Broadcasting Service (PBS).
- A decrease of \$1.1 million for the Student Achievement and Teacher Quality Program to decrease funding for Beginning Teacher Mentoring and Induction (-\$801,875) as more districts participate in the Teacher Leadership and Compensation (TLC) System and to decrease funding for technical assistance for the Teacher Leadership and Compensation System (-\$350,000).
- A decrease of \$25,000 for Commission and Council Support.
- An increase of \$1.5 million for the Successful Progression for Early Readers program.
- An increase of \$8.1 million for the community colleges for State general aid.

# **Board of Regents:** An increase of \$16.6 million compared to estimated FY 2015. The changes include:

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- An increase of \$4.0 million (1.8%) for the University of Iowa (UI) for the general education budget.
- An increase of \$5.2 million (2.9%) for Iowa State University (ISU) for the general education budget.
- An increase of \$7.0 million (7.8%) for the University of Northern Iowa (UNI) for the general education budget.
- An increase of \$254,000 for the Iowa School for the Deaf for a general increase.
- An increase of \$107,000 for the Iowa Braille and Sight Saving School for a general increase.

# SIGNIFICANT CODE CHANGES

*Early Childhood Iowa:* Codifies intent language from previous years' appropriations relating to the Early Childhood Iowa Initiative.

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Student Achievement and Teacher Quality Allocations: Changes in the allocations include:

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- Beginning Teacher Mentoring and Induction A decrease of \$801,875 compared to the FY 2015 allocation because of decreased need as a result of the Teacher Leadership and Compensation System.
- Teacher Leadership and Compensation System A decrease of \$350,000 compared to the FY 2015 allocation for technical assistance.
- Eliminates an allocation for High Needs Schools that is replaced by a separate appropriation elsewhere in the Bill.

*Statewide Preschool Program Costs:* Division V of the Bill makes changes to statute related to the Statewide Preschool Program. The changes include:

- Permits school districts to transport preschool students along with students not in the preschool program.
- Allows administrative funds to be used for outreach activities and rent for facilities not owned by the school district.
- Permits up to 10.0% of the amount of preschool foundation aid passed through to a community-based provider to be used for administrative costs. Permits the cost of transportation involving children participating in the preschool program and other children to be prorated.
- Specifies that the Division is retroactively applicable to July 1, 2014.

*Statewide Preschool and Limited English Proficient Students:* Division VI of the Bill makes changes to statute related to additional weighting for Limited English Proficient (LEP) students in the Statewide Preschool Program. The changes include:

- Defines preschool budget weighted enrollment to include supplementary weighting for preschool students identified as LEP.
- Defines preschool foundation aid to include supplementary weighting for preschool students identified as LEP.
- Specifies that the five years of eligibility for additional weighting for students identified as LEP in grades K-12 does not include the additional weighting received for students identified as LEP in preschool.
- Specifies that students identified as LEP in preschool will receive an additional weighting of 0.11.
- Specifies that the Division applies to school budget years beginning with FY 2017.

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statute for these programs as follows:

- Permits up to 5.0% of the total amount a school district receives for at-risk programs or as modified supplemental amount under Iowa Code section 257.41 to be used for district-wide or building-wide at-risk and dropout prevention programming targeted to pupils who are not deemed at-risk.
- Permits a school district to use money received for the at-risk program or as modified supplemental amount under Iowa Code section 257.41 to pay for the instructional costs necessary to address the pupil's behavior if they have been determined by the school district to be likely to inflict self-harm or likely to harm another pupil.
- Removes the requirement that the Department of Education must submit an annual report that includes the ways school districts in the previous school year used modified supplemental amounts.

Supplementary Weighting for K-12 Limited English Proficient Students: Division VIII of the Bill makes changes to statute as follows:

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- Increases the number of years an LEP student is eligible to generate supplementary weighting from five to six years for students identified as LEP beginning in FY 2016. The fiscal impact of the sixth year of eligibility is \$5.2 million beginning in FY 2021. The State General Fund amount is \$4.6 million, and the statewide impact on property taxes is \$611,622.
- Increases the number of years an LEP student is eligible to generate supplementary weighting from five to seven years for students identified as LEP beginning in FY 2017. The fiscal impact of the seventh year of eligibility is \$8.3 million beginning in FY 2023. The State General Fund amount is \$7.4 million, and the statewide impact on property taxes is \$1.0 million.
- Specifies that the Bill is effective on enactment and applies to school budget years beginning in FY 2016.

*Gifted and Talented Program:* Requires the Department of Education to employ 1.0 FTE position for a consultant for gifted and talented children programs.

*Gap Tuition Assistance Program:* Division X makes the following changes to statute regarding the Program:

• Reduces the number of prior months of family income that are considered for eligibility from 12 to six months. Specifies that applicants qualified for the federal Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program are assumed to meet the financial qualifications for the Gap Tuition Assistance Program.

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- Requires first priority for assistance to be given to those earning incomes between 150.0% and 250.0% of the federal poverty level. Second priority is to be given to those earning incomes less than 150.0% of the federal poverty level.
- Specifies that those eligible for financial assistance under the federal Workforce Investment Act or the federal Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act are ineligible for the Gap Tuition Assistance Program unless funds budgeted for the federal programs have been fully expended by a workforce region.

*Iowa Tuition Grant:* Increases the cap on the maximum Iowa Tuition Grant award from \$5,000 to \$6,000.

School Board Vacancies: Specifies the provisions in Code that control the process for filling school board vacancies. Requires local school boards to publish notice of intent to fill a vacancy on the school board by appointment. The electors of the school district have the right to file a petition requiring that the vacancy be filled by a special election. The petition for a special election must be signed by at least 100 eligible electors or eligible electors equalling at least 30.0% of voters at the preceding regular school election, whichever is greater.

DETAIL: This is a decrease of \$1,900,000 and no change in FTE positions compared to estimated FY 2015. The FY 2015 appropriation included \$2,000,000 for the Early Literacy Warning System. The System receives a separate appropriation for FY 2016 in the Bill.

Requires the school climate and bullying work group to submit a report providing findings and recommendations to the Department of Education regarding matters to enhance statewide school climate improvement and bullying prevention, awareness, and intervention.
