EXECUTIVE SUMMARY EDUCATION APPROPRIATIONS BILL

FUNDING SUMMARY

Appropriates a total of \$774.3 from the General Fund and 12,292.6 FTE positions to the Department for the Blind, the College Student Aid Commission, the Department of Education, and the Board of Regents for FY 2013. This is a decrease of \$37.0 million and a increase of 9.7 FTE positions compared to estimated net FY 2012.

NOTE: Total funding for FY 2013 includes the previously enacted appropriations for FY 2013 and new appropriation amounts proposed in this Bill.

DETAIL: Total funding for FY 2013 is no change compared to estimated net FY 2012.
