#### EDUCATION APPROPRIATIONS BILL

#### **FUNDING SUMMARY**

*FY 2014:* Appropriates a total of \$894.9 million from the General Fund and 12,292.6 FTE positions to the Department for the Blind, the College Student Aid Commission, the Department of Education, and the Board of Regents for FY 2014. This is an increase of \$33.9 million and 15.9 FTE positions compared to estimated FY 2013.

Page 1, Line 1

FY 2015: Appropriates a total of \$816.4 million from the General Fund and 12,292.6 FTE positions to the Department for the Blind, the College Student Aid Commission, the Department of Education, and the Board of Regents for FY 2015. This is a decrease of \$78.5 million and no change in FTE positions compared to the FY 2014 appropriations. Each of the FY 2015 General Fund appropriations represents 85.0% of the FY 2014 appropriation, with the exception of the appropriation for Education Reform.

#### MAJOR INCREASES/DECREASES/TRANSFERS OF EXISTING PROGRAMS

#### Department for the Blind

Page 1, Line 4

• An increase of \$200,000 for the Department for the Blind for vocational rehabilitation purposes.

*College Student Aid Commission:* A net increase of \$3.3 million compared to estimated FY 2013. The changes include:

- National Guard Educational Assistance Program An increase of \$300,000 to provide for increased participation due to lower deployment levels.

- Vocational Rehabilitation An increase of \$150,000 for client services.
- Iowa Public Television An increase of \$474,000 for the Ready for School Initiative and equipment maintenance agreements.

**Board of Regents:** An increase of \$16.1 million compared to estimated FY 2013. The change includes:

- University of Iowa An increase of \$5.6 million (2.6%) for the general education budget.
- Iowa State University An increase of \$4.4 million (2.6%) for the general education budget.
- University of Northern Iowa (UNI) An increase of 6.1 million (7.5%) for the general education budget. The increase includes the standard increase of 2.6% and an additional \$4.0 million, the second installment in a three-year request for additional funding for UNI to address the inordinate impact of recent State funding reductions on UNI due to a greater portion of resident student enrollment paying lower tuition rates.

**Department of Education:** In addition to the 85.0% appropriations, \$60.0 million is appropriated for FY 2015 to implement the education reform provisions in HF 215.

• This is an increase of \$55.0 million compared to the FY 2014 appropriation. The appropriation is contingent on the enactment of HF 215. The appropriation funds new allocations for Teacher Leadership Grants, and High Need School Supplemental Aid under the Student Achievement and Teacher Quality Program.
