EXECUTIVE SUMMARY AGRICULTURE AND NATURAL RESOURCES APPROPRIATIONS BILL

FUNDING SUMMARY

FY 2017 Funding: Appropriates a total of \$43.1 million from the General Fund and 1,569.0 FTE positions for FY 2017. Maintains the current level of funding and provides an increase of 96.1 FTE positions compared to estimated FY 2016. This bill also appropriates \$88.6 million from other funds. This maintains the current level of funding compared to estimated FY 2016.
