
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Iowa State Promotes Economic Growth in Iowa



Impact of State Funding (\$1,400,000)

State funding is used to provide assistance to manufacturers and small businesses. Every \$1 of state funds is used as match to acquire over \$1 of federal funds to expand services to lowa companies.

CIRAS and Iowa Lean Consortium (ILC) Merge

- ILC formally moved under CIRAS July 1, 2018
- ILC brings over 150-member organizations from manufacturing, healthcare, finance, insurance and government
- Member-driven model will expand reach to more lowa businesses
- Goal: Develop people, eliminate waste from processes



Impact of State Funding (\$841,000)

State funding accounts for nearly 50% of program dollars. Federal funding requires a 1:1 match, half of which must be in cash.



- 163 projects supported
- >100 lowa companies have participated
- 55 startups assisted, including 34 that were started as a direct result of GIVF/RIF funding

- One industry partner reported a \$30 million impact via increased and retained sales
- Over history of program, approximately \$3 dollars in additional funding has been brought in for every \$1 invested in R & D projects
- Recent company partners include Diamond V, MTI, Seigwerk, UTAS, Gross-Wen Technologies, and Global Vet Link

Impact of State Funding (\$1,050,000)

RIF is the primary source of flexible funding to support economic development, research for initiation of startup companies, and to seed early stage research that has high potential for commercial success.



- Launched 1st cohort June 2016
- Intense yearlong accelerator program
- Participants receive mentoring from experienced entrepreneurs
- Development grant funded expansion of program to rural lowarian
- Six cohorts have started/completed the program
- 70 jobs created
- More than \$20 million in venture financing


