# **Program Overview FY17/18**


The Rural Solutions program provides a unique service to Iowa farm family members **not available through any other entity in the state of Iowa**. Founded by Easterseals Iowa in 1986, the program has received national and state awards and has been replicated in 27 states around the country.

Easter Seals Iowa offers agricultural work site and home modification consultations, peer support,

services for the family, information and referrals and medical equipment loan services. Team members are knowledgeable about resources throughout the state that can address the unique needs of rural family members with disabilities, and actively pursue services that will enhance their lives. Any farm family member with a disability or individual with a disability is eligible for services through the Rural Solutions program. Easter Seals Iowa Rural Solutions services are provided free of charge to the individual and family receiving the services.

### Farm Families Supported in the Past 32 Years

More than 2,000 lowa farm family members with disabilities, from all 99 counties, have been supported since the start of the program. Due to changes in the farming operation or one's abilities, oftentimes farm family members are supported numerous times throughout their years of living and farming with a disability.



#### Farm Families Supported FY 17/18

In fiscal year 2017/18, the program supported 116 farm family members; 85 males and 31 females.

### State Cost Avoidance

In FY 2017/18 the program supported 116 people, the vast majority of whom are working-age adults. Assuming program participants earn lowa's average weekly wage of \$750¹, the average participant would earn \$39,000. With 116 participants, it's reasonable to assume the Rural Solutions Program brings, at minimum, \$4,524,000 in wages to lowa by empowering individuals that may not otherwise work. Without the Rural Solutions program, many participants may find themselves on Social Security Disability² and Medicaid³—a program supported heavily by the state's general fund.

## **Additional Funding Would Achieve More**

The Rural Solutions Program has served its full capacity of participants for the past few years. Our staff and state funding, though generous, have not allowed us to expand services and meet the program's demands that we know exists. With an additional \$70,000 for the program, we can expand services to meet the needs of additional participants. These additional resources could bring nearly another \$1 million in wages to lowa. In summary, a \$200,000 appropriation to Rural Solutions would bring approximately \$5.5 million in wages to lowa's economy. The Rural Solutions program keeps farmers farming and contributes to the vitality of rural lowa. For many farm family members and rural residents with a disability, Rural Solutions represents their only hope of returning to farming and their communities.
