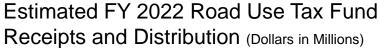

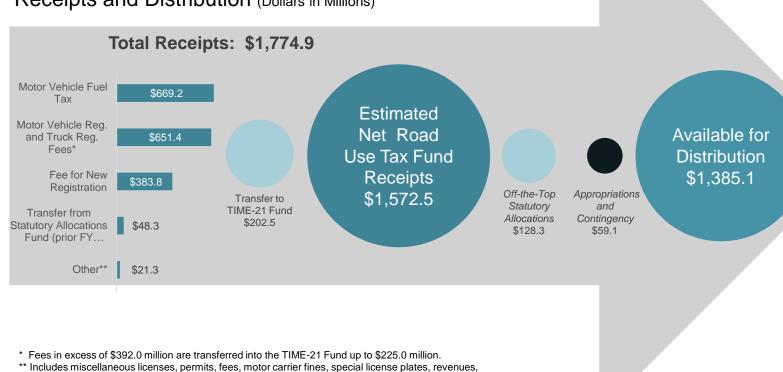

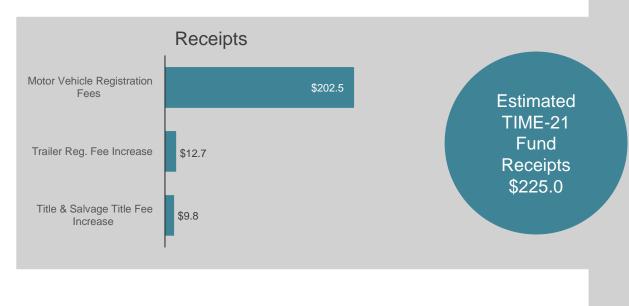

The initial \$10 for these fees is deposited into the Statutory Allocations Fund. The increase, either \$10 or \$20, is deposited into the TIME-21 Fund.

Transportation Operations Consolidation —The Governor has recommended a consolidation of eight appropriations into a singular appropriation, Transportation Operations. The consolidated appropriations include Administrative Services, Highway, Planning & Programming, and Strategic Performance.

- Transportation Operations will still receive funding from both the Primary Road Fund and the Road Use Tax Fund, similar to how each line item received funding prior to the consolidation.
- Transportation Operations will continue to receive additional appropriated funds in the annual Infrastructure Bill, as the Planning, Programming, and Modal Division is included in the consolidation.

2022 Legislative Session

Changes for FY 2023

- Transportation Operations: \$4.4 million increase for a new consolidation of eight appropriations related to DOT administration and operations. The line items consolidated are Administrative Services, Highway, Planning & Programming, and Strategic Performance, from both the RUTF and the PRF. The current total in of the consolidated appropriation among the eight divisions is \$344.0 million. The increase is to fund additional full-time equivalent (FTE) positions, replace brine infrastructure, and purchase additional equipment.
- Workers Compensation: **\$149,000** increase in workers' compensation, which is administered by the Department of Administrative Services.
- Administrative Services: \$126,000 for an increase in fees associated with the Office of the Chief Information Officer for information security.
- Statewide Communications System: \$96,000 decrease due to shifting use of the system.
 Funding for the lease payment is shifting from the RUTF and PRF to the RIIF as other public safety organizations use the system.
- Inventory and Equipment Replacement: \$4.9 million increase to fund the purchase of additional equipment in order to reduce the replacement life of snowplows to 12 years, and to establish a shorter replacement life of heavy-duty equipment.

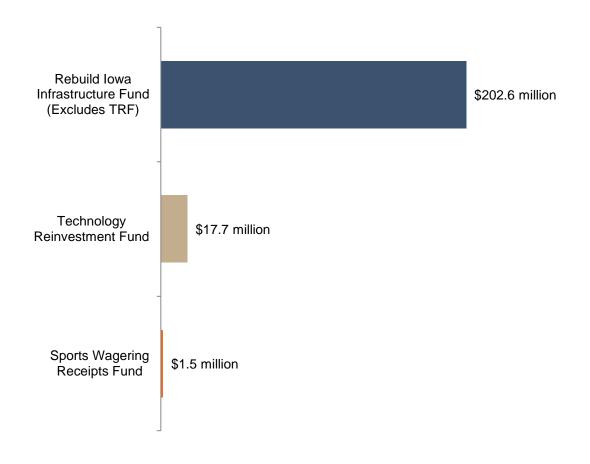

Changes for FY 2023 Continued

- Transportation Maps: \$195,000 increase to fund the appropriation for maps, which occurs
 every other year. Funding was last appropriated in FY 2021. Approximately 600,000
 maps are expected to be printed this year.
- Electronic Records Management: \$3.5 million for a new appropriation to fund updates and improvements to the Electronic Records Management System, which is used extensively across the DOT for data such as record storage, driver's license information, and vehicle registration.

2021 Legislative Session — Infrastructure Act by Fund (FY 2022)



The **Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund** is intended to be expended on vertical infrastructure, which includes:

- Land acquisition and construction
- Major renovation and major repair of buildings
- Routine, recurring maintenance
- All appurtenant structures
- Utilities
- Site development
- Recreational trails
- · Renewable fuel infrastructure programs
- Debt service payments on academic revenue bonds issued for capital projects at Board of Regents institutions

"Vertical infrastructure" does not include operational expenses or leasing of a building, appurtenant structure, or utility without a lease-purchase agreement.

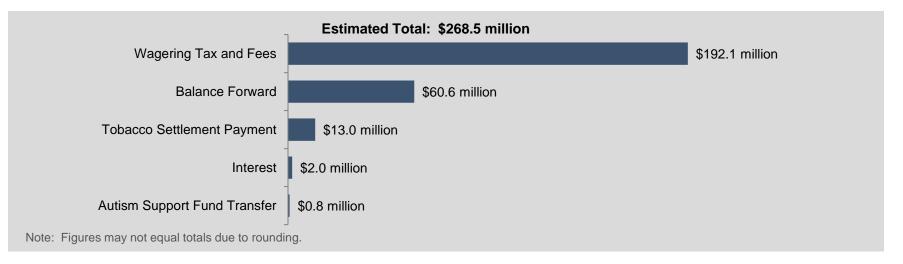

The **Technology Reinvestment Fund** may be expended on:

- The acquisition of computer hardware and software
- Software development
- Telecommunications equipment
- Maintenance and lease agreements associated with technology components
- Equipment intended to provide an uninterruptible power supply

Technology Reinvestment Fund (TRF) Resources

- \$17.5 million standing appropriation from the General Fund.
- This appropriation is often notwithstood. In other words, the General Assembly rescinds the appropriation for a single fiscal year and appropriates moneys to the TRF from other revenue sources.

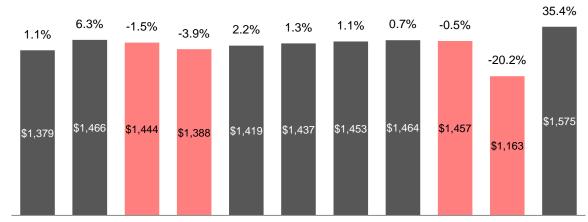

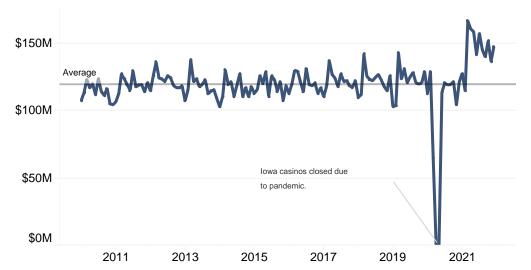

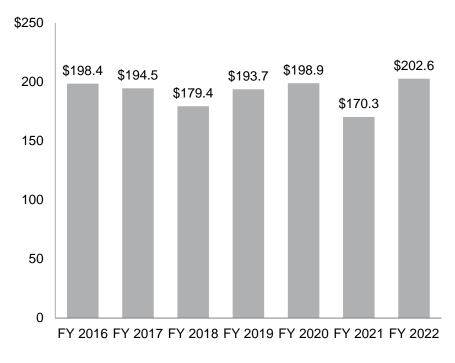

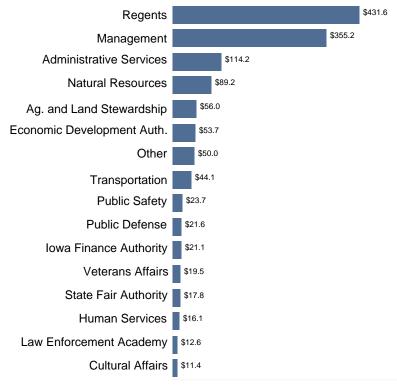
