June 2021

New Reemployment Case Management system launches, resetting Iowa's relationship with unemployment

RECAP: PANDEMIC RESPONSE

- Unemployment Insurance (UI) Division delivered timely support with a sustained high level of service to lowans.
- Oversaw immediate implementation and eventual drawdown of five additional COVID-19 federal payment programs.
- Record volume of benefits paid out and customer service calls processed.




- Initial UI Claims have dropped to pre-pandemic levels and trends point downward.
- Total unemployment benefits paid in November 2021:
 - \$12.5 million (lowest monthly payout in more than two decades)
- lowans receiving unemployment:
 - <u>Peak</u>: 204,175 (May 2020)
 - <u>Current</u>: 17,573 (December 2021)

2021 RESPONSE: COVID RECOVERY

Serving Iowans.

- lowa ended federal pandemic benefits programs in June 2021 to refocus on economic recovery and reemployment.
- Volume of unemployment claims remains at a high level. But IWD staff has seen improvement as the economy has reopened.
- In-person visits to IowaWORKS centers up nearly 672% from Jan. 2021 to Jan. 2022.

REEMPLOYMENT CASE MANAGEMENT

- A recognition that lowa's workforce shortage is an urgent problem that requires more urgency from IWD.
- New program provides enhanced assistance during Week 1 for unemployed lowans in the hopes of getting them back to work as quickly as possible.

How it Works



18 new Career Planners meeting one on one with unemployed.



Review work search, **make direct connections** to any needed training.



New software matches worker skills with those in demand with employers.



Increased requirement for work search (from two to four).

REEMPLOYMENT CASE MANAGEMENT

- Built on proven tools, resources, and assessments that help return unemployment to its original mission.
- Not about eliminating benefits but reducing the need for unemployment.
- Because lowa needs every worker to be active and in the economy.

RCM goes further than existing programs by meeting with more people and earlier in the process.

More one-on-one assistance **faster return to workforce**.



REALIGNMENT

- Launching a conversation about finding new efficiencies in Iowa's workforce programs
- Currently more than 100 workforce programs at 11 agencies
- Recognition that workforce demands are evolving, so government must evolve to serve lowans best in the future





Registered Apprenticeship Programs



- Valuable programs that invest in people and empower lowa employers to grow their own talent base.
- Creates rewarding career paths, beginning at the high school level with a proven earn while you learn model.
- Long-term solution now available in nearly every sector.

Iowa broke Registered Apprenticeship records in FY 2021 by adding 181 new programs, 51 new occupations, and 4,350 new apprentices.

Home Base Iowa

- **lowaWORKS Career Planners and staff assist individuals** in conjunction with partner agencies.
- Offices serve as first stop for case management and new programs that reset lowa's approach to unemployment.

IowaWORKS is also a critical resource for the **number of current job openings in Iowa**, top available occupations, wages, and other labor market facts.





Unemployment Trust Fund

Fund Levels by Fiscal Year





Governor Reynolds' use of **\$728.5 million** in CARES Act and ARPA funding (and \$98 million from coronavirus-related programs) to support the trust fund helped **stabilize the impacts of the pandemic and keep lowa competitive.**

Unemployment Trust Fund (cont.)

For the fifth consecutive year, tax rates used to fund unemployment benefits remained in **Table 7**, the second lowest allowed by law.



Tax Table formula based on:

- Trust fund balance (the higher figure of balance on June 30 or August 15)
- Total UI contributory wages
- Trust fund target level as a percentage of UI contributory wages



Without the Governor's infusion of coronavirus relief funds and other federal programs, **IWD estimates that** the tax tables would have moved to the higher rates on Table 6.

- Reducing the maximum length of unemployment benefits in lowa from 26 weeks to 16.
- Lowering the threshold at which an unemployment recipient is required to accept suitable work.
- Creating a new reemployment division within state government to focus on getting lowans back to work.
