





- Conference topics tie to ESFs being updated





Response



2020 COVID-19 - DR 4483

First Governor's Proclamation – March 9, 2020

- Extended multiple times
- Current Proclamation in effect through February 15, 2022
- Continuous emergency authorities in effect 708 days
- National Emergency declared current through April 2022
- Presidential Declarations granted to all states

2020 COVID-19 - DR 4483

- State EOC activated for 708 days
 - Over 40 partner agencies/organizations supporting the state response
- State EOC has received over 5,500 mission requests from all 99 counties to date
 - CY 20 20.3 million PPE items distributed
 - CY 21 26.2 million PPE items distributed
- Ongoing maintenance of PPE to ensure adequate supplies
- Ongoing support of IDPH/SHL for Testing Resources
- Ongoing support of Test Iowa initiative

Derecho – December 2021

1st Ever December Derecho Event in the US


- Governor's Emergency Proclamation issued for 50 counties
- Surveyed damages in 75 counties
 - \$6.9 million in FEMA eligible Public Assistance damage
 - 262 residential properties damaged with 42 destroyed and 60 with major damage.
- Governor has requested a Major Disaster Declaration

HSEMD Resource Management Warehouse

In 2020, HSEMD in partnership with the Iowa National Guard, laid the groundwork to begin the construction of a centrally-located resource management warehouse.

- Provides HSEMD the capability to store resources inside at one location
 - 69 Pumps
 - 17 Generators
 - 5280 feet of HESCO
 - 1 million sandbags
- Expands the HSEMD's capacity to store more resources

Stafford Act Declarations

7 disasters open ranging from 2008 to 2020


- \$2 billion in damages
- 3 of the top 5 disasters occurred in 2019/2020
 - 2019 Missouri River Flood \$230 Million
 - 2020 Derecho \$235 Million
 - 2020 COVID \$240 Million
- Workload
 - Recovery employee / 35 projects / \$16.5 million

2020 COVID-19 - DR 4483

Public Assistance program

- 541 applicants
- Currently obligated \$227 million (federal share 100%)
 - \$188 million paid to applicants
- Current disaster estimate \$250 million (federal share 100%)

Mitigation



Enhanced Mitigation Plan

- Enhanced Plan approved through September 2023
- Iowa is 1 of only 14 states and territories with an Enhanced Plan
- Qualifies the state and local governments to receive additional hazard mitigation disaster funding (20% instead of 15%)

Loss Avoidance - Mitigation

Avoided losses over the past seven years from 2014-2020 = **\$437 million**

2019 = \$44million, 2018 = \$135 million



Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities

- Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities (BRIC) is funded by a 6% set aside from estimated national disaster expenditures
- Iowa Code 29C was amended to authorize state match for non-disaster programs reducing the local match requirement for projects that utilize this funding
- Provides ability for communities to request funding for larger projects if cost share reduced

Flood Mitigation Board

- Flood Recovery Fund
- Total appropriation of \$36 million allocated to local housing recovery; drainage, berm and levee projects; localized flood mitigation, levee repair, and improvements projects
- Outstanding need exists
 - We continue to take a holistic approach to this fund to determine which funding source best matches each request.
 - FEMA PA / HMA / BRIC
 - IEDA CDBG-DR
 - State Contingent Loan fund
- Fly Our Colors DOT HF 2641 collects fees from plate sales for flood mitigation projects

Technology

Maximizing technology to provide increased efficiency and effectiveness

911 Program

- The Wireline Migration project, putting wireline 911 calls onto the Next Generation 911 Network, is mostly complete—goal of saving local jurisdictions money as well as modern technical advantages.
- 35 PSAPs have implemented the shared technological services. An additional 25 are scheduled to join. This allows PSAPs to achieve cost savings through sharing technology
- Implementation of a five year strategic plan to address areas identified for improvement based on the National 911 Program's Peer Assessment began in January 2021

Alert Iowa

\$400,000 appropriation

- Switched to new vendor in 2021
- Alerting capability for entire state
- Allows access to federal alerting systems
 - Wireless Emergency Alerts
 - Emergency Alert System
- Currently utilized by:
 - 87 Counties; 38 State Agencies
