Estimated FY 2023 Statutory Allocations Fund Receipts and Distribution (Dollars in Millions)



Transportation Appropriations — Governor's Recommendations

2023 Legislative Session

Motor Vehicle Enforcement Division Alignment — The Governor is recommending aligning the Motor Vehicle Enforcement Bureau, which is currently under the DOT, to the Department of Public Safety. This recommendation includes a decrease of \$12,502,000 from the PRF and a decrease of \$798,000 from the RUTF for a total decrease of \$13,300,000 from road funds. The recommendation also includes a decrease of 100.00 full-time equivalent (FTE) positions. The decrease in funding includes salary costs, funds associated with contributions to the equipment revolving fund, and indirect costs.

The Governor is also recommending the following changes under Transportation Operations, resulting in a net decrease of \$6,048,395 from the PRF and \$406,528 from the RUTF:

• An increase of \$2,678,029 from the PRF and \$162,448 from the RUTF due to increased fuel prices.

• An increase of \$3,354,517 from the PRF and \$203,483 from the RUTF due to increases in the monthly life cycle depreciation costs for equipment and surcharge costs for equipment replacement purchases.


• An increase of \$421,059 from the PRF and \$25,541 from the RUTF for additional Work Zone safety item purchases.


Additional Changes for FY 2024:

- Department of Administrative Services (DAS) Personnel and Utility Services: **\$428,000** increase to pay the annual increases in the DAS utility services.
- Statewide Communications System: **\$146,000** increase to pay the increase in the DOT share of the Statewide Interoperable Communications System.
- Workers' Compensation: **\$165,000** decrease in workers' compensation, which is administered by the DAS.
- Transportation Maps: **\$195,000** decrease for transportation maps, which is appropriated every other year. Funding was last appropriated in FY 2023.
- Inventory and Equipment Replacement: **\$11.1 million** increase to fund the increased costs of equipment replacement purchases as a result of the shift to a 12-year replacement life cycle for equipment.
- Davenport Facility: **\$21.9 million** increase for a new DOT facility in Davenport. The current facility is deteriorating due to age and is not properly sized to accommodate current DOT operations and equipment.

Infrastructure Appropriations 2022 Legislative Session — Infrastructure Act by Fund (FY 2023)




Infrastructure Appropriations Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund (RIIF) Resources — Estimated FY 2023



Technology Reinvestment Fund (TRF) Resources

- \$17.5 million standing appropriation from the General Fund.
- This appropriation is often notwithstood. In other words, the General Assembly rescinds the appropriation for a single fiscal year and appropriates moneys to the TRF from other revenue sources.



Adjusted Gross Revenue (AGR) by Year (in millions)








Average Annual Appropriations from the RIIF since FY 2017


