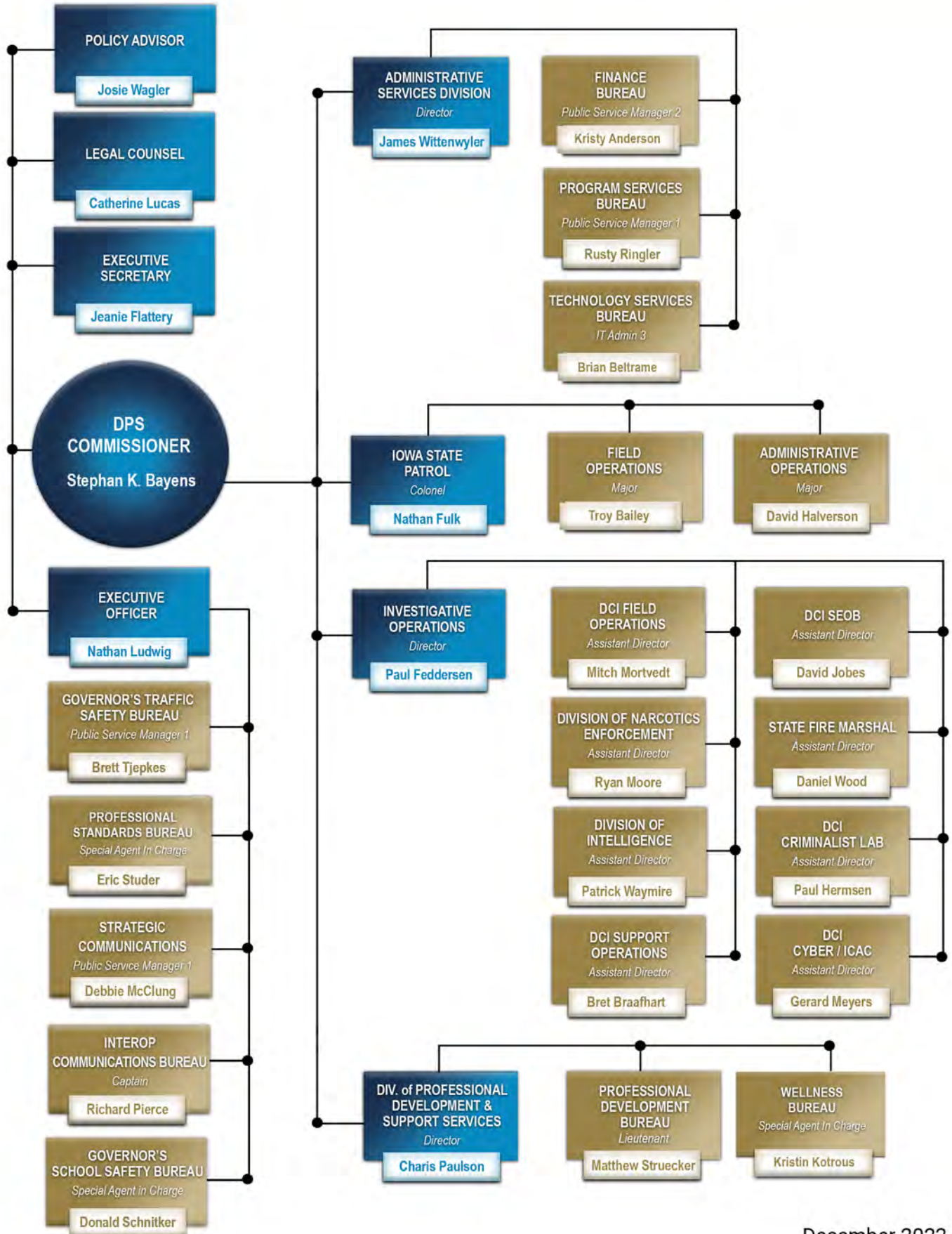

The Iowa State Patrol's primary mission is saving lives through traffic enforcement. The State Patrol is uniquely positioned to respond and provide sustained assistance to local agencies during large scale events, critical incidents, or natural disasters occurring in our state. Historically, these events have included prison disturbances, high-risk warrant execution, tornadoes, flooding and dignitary visits.



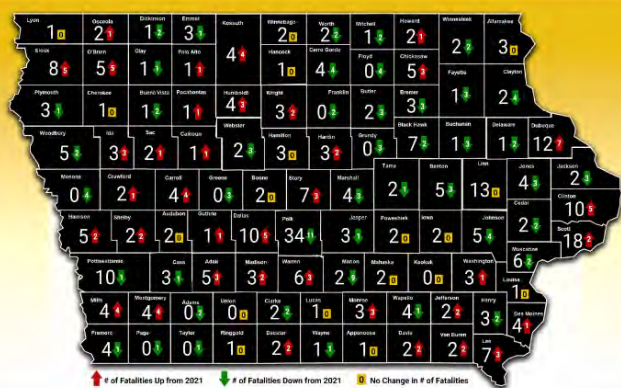

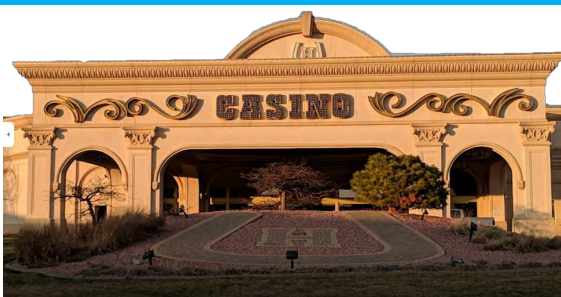


DIVISION OF CRIMINAL INVESTIGATION – SPECIAL ENFORCEMENT OPERATIONS BUREAU

The mission of the Special Enforcement Operations Bureau (SEOB) is to ensure public confidence and trust in Iowa's expanding gaming industry. The DCI SEOB serves as the primary criminal investigative and enforcement agency for enforcing Iowa Code chapters 99D, 99E and 99F. The 58 Special Agents assigned to this bureau are responsible for conducting criminal investigations and enforcement activities, background investigations, and providing regulatory support at state licensed casinos and throughout the state concerning casino gaming, pari-mutual wagering, sports wagering and fantasy sports contests. Special Agents assigned to the SEOB have offices in each of the 19 casinos licensed by the Iowa Racing and Gaming Commission.

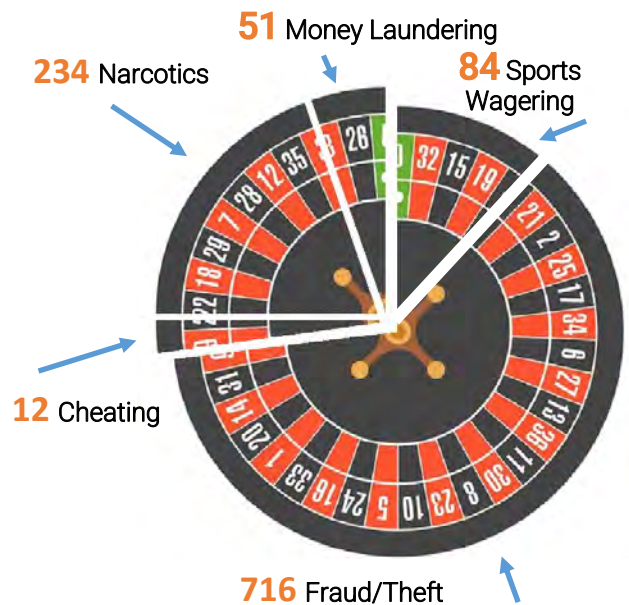

DIVISION OF CRIMINAL INVESTIGATION CRIMINALISTICS LABORATORY

The DCI Criminalistics Laboratory employees provide professional forensic scientific services and support to the criminal justice community throughout Iowa. The lab is accredited under the ANSI National Accreditation Board (ANAB) and provides forensic science capabilities in 10 different disciplines. Through additional legislative support, hard work, and efficiency improvements; the DCI Lab has continued to bring overall average case assignment turnaround times.

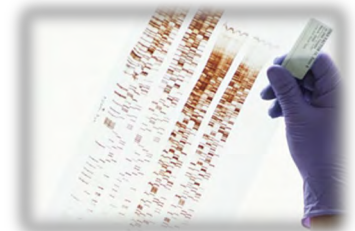
Laboratory Productivity

- The DCI Laboratory Crime Scene teams responded to 35 major crime scenes, generating over 9,300 photographs and used 3D laser scanning scene documentation technology at 10 of those scenes.



- In CY2022, the Criminalistics Laboratory provided analytical reports for forensic analysis to approximately 370 law enforcement agencies and every prosecutor's office in Iowa. In addition, all 160 evidentiary breath alcohol testing devices, with at least one located in each of Iowa's 99 counties, were supported and recertified by laboratory staff as required.

- We continued the trend toward decreasing overall average case assignment turnaround times. The three-year trend on average turnaround time is as follows: 68 days in CY2020 to 52 days in CY 2021 and to 41 days in CY 2022. The total case assignment backlog for the entire lab dropped from 2,446 in CY2020 to 2,221 in CY2022.
- In CY2022, the laboratory processed 6,758 convicted offender DNA profiles and 600 forensic profiles into CODIS (Combined DNA Index System), which resulted in 361 hit reports. We also made 1,152 entries into NIBIN (National Integrated Ballistic Information Network), resulting in 194 leads.





DIVISION OF INTELLIGENCE & FUSION CENTER

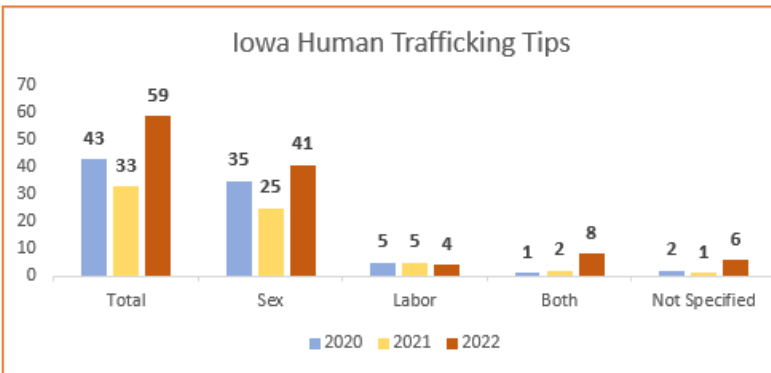
The Division of Intelligence (DOI) coordinates information sharing related to criminal activity throughout the state. DOI also supports state, local, and federal agencies with analytical and technological assistance. The Office to Combat Human Trafficking is housed in DOI. The Office to Combat Human Trafficking acts as a primary point of contact on the State's effort to combat human trafficking and assists law enforcement in responding to tips.

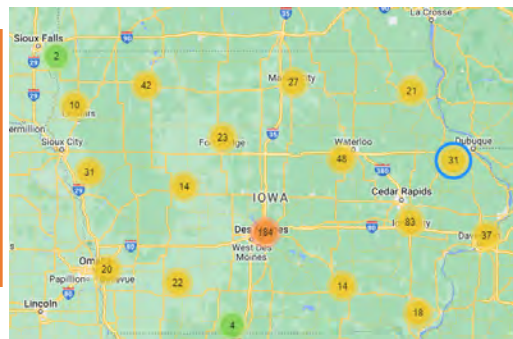
In 2022, the Office to Combat Human Trafficking continued to grow its human trafficking prevention training initiative with Iowa lodging providers. The statute requires Iowa lodging providers who host public employees or publicly-funded events and conferences, and receive public-use funds, to provide their staff with human trafficking prevention training.

Free online training is available 24/7 at the new website StopHTIowa.org. In addition to hosting the online training and administrative portal, the site contains a list of all certified lodging locations, educational resources for identifying human trafficking activity and a tip tool.



In February, DOI assisted with a proactive sex trafficking operation that resulted in 11 arrests. DOI also assisted with a similar operation in

Fort Dodge that resulted in 24 arrests for prostitution/sexual exploitation.

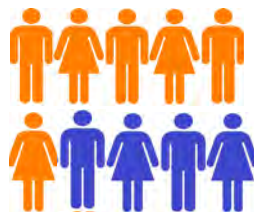
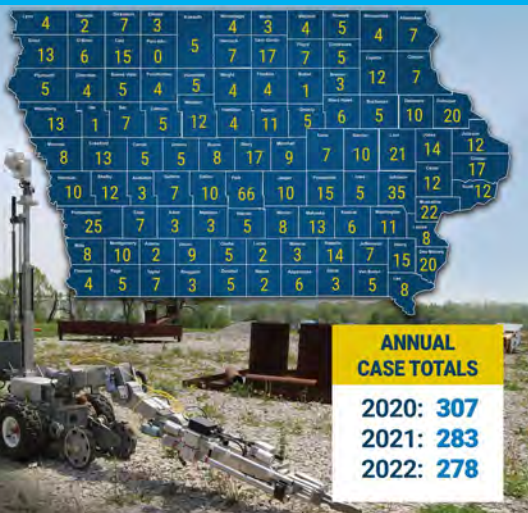

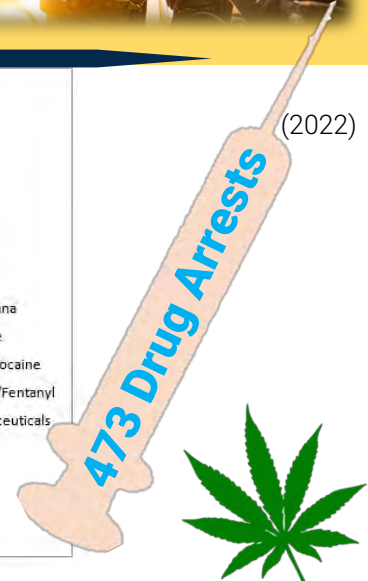


DIVISION OF NARCOTICS

The Division of Narcotics Enforcement (DNE) serves as the lead state agency in providing public safety through investigative enforcement of laws relating to narcotics and other controlled substances. DNE's mission is "With pride and integrity, provide a professional service to the people of Iowa in significantly reducing the supply of illicit controlled substances through specialized enforcement and training."

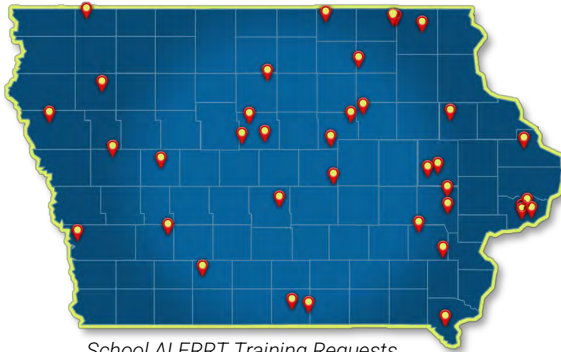
PREVENTING SCHOOL VIOLENCE

On June 14, 2022, Governor Reynolds announced \$100 million in school safety funding to support Iowa's 327 public districts and 183 non-public and independent schools. The Governor charged the Iowa Department of Public Safety with the formation of the state's first **GOVERNOR'S SCHOOL SAFETY BUREAU**. The Bureau is staffed with a Special Agent In Charge/Bureau Chief, Training Specialist, Senior Criminal Analyst, Secretary and five communications specialist positions to carry out the following objectives:

- ▶ An emergency radio to every school in Iowa.
- ▶ Active shooter training to schools and places of worship.
- ▶ Active shooter training to Iowa law enforcement and first responders.
- ▶ A threat reporting tool accessible via app, website, and phone.

The Bureau's training mission is to make active shooter training available to anyone who requests it—free of charge—using the **Advanced Law Enforcement Rapid Response Training** curriculum—ALERRT—plus civilian response and critical wound care courses. Since August 2022, nearly 1,000 teachers and law enforcement officers have received training for their professions.



EMERGENCY RADIOS

A total of **1253** radios were purchased for Iowa schools to connect with local law enforcement partners during emergency situations.

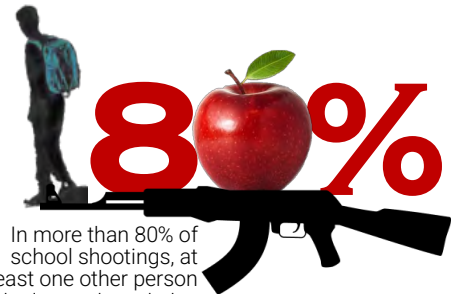
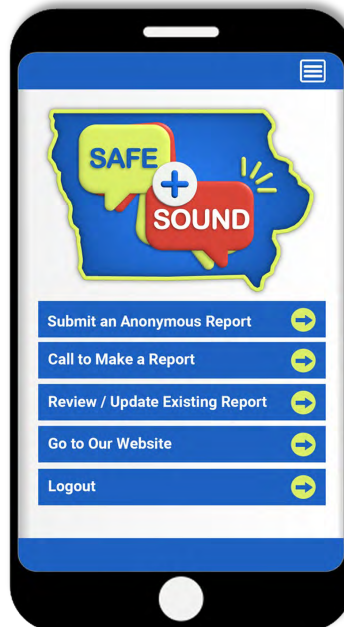

THREAT REPORTING TOOLS

The Bureau is currently developing a free and anonymous threat reporting platform accessible by app, website, or phone. In partnership with the Department of Education and the Iowa Department of Homeland Security and Emergency Management, these tools are expected to be introduced and rolled out to all schools in Spring 2023 and again in Fall 2023. Schools can opt-in at any time.

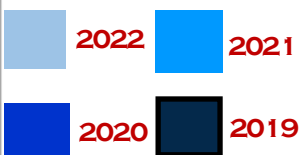


CYBER CRIME BUREAU

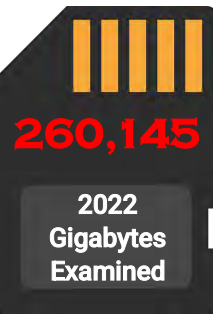
A digital crime scene is present in nearly all investigations. The DCI Cyber Crime Bureau was formed in July of 2021 and includes the *Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force (ICAC)*. The Bureau consists of 13 cyber crime agents within various disciplines and three Electronic Storage Detection (ESD) K9s. The Bureau is tasked with investigating crimes with a digital or cyber nexus and is co-located with the Office of the Chief Information Officer (OCIO) to foster collaborative responses to cyber threats.



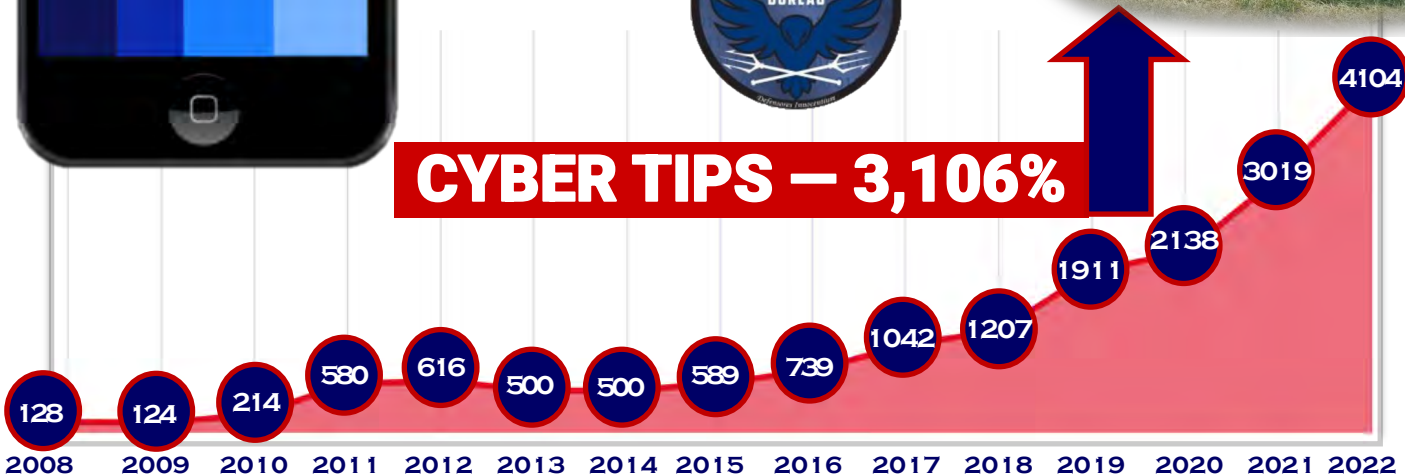
COLLECTING & ANALYZING DIGITAL FORENSIC EVIDENCE TO SOLVE CRIMES



Successful resolution of cyber investigations hinges on the recovery of digital evidence. **Data seized and analyzed from personal electronic devices and storage devices, once measured in gigabytes (GB) in early cases, has exploded to petabytes (PB)** – the equivalent of one million gigabytes. Over the past five years, cyber crime agents have examined a total of 1.4 petabytes.

DIVISION OF PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT & SUPPORT SERVICES

The Division of Professional Development and Support Services was created in September 2021 and encompasses several of the department's most essential services. Responsibilities of the division include oversight of the Professional Development Bureau, the DPS Academy, Peer Support Team, Critical Incident Stress Management Team, Therapy K9 Program, Accreditation, Mentoring and Community Engagement. The goal of the division is to equip our employees with the necessary training and support to perform their duties at a high level, to ensure accountability by maintaining policies in accordance with national best practices, and to encourage a culture of physical and mental awareness.



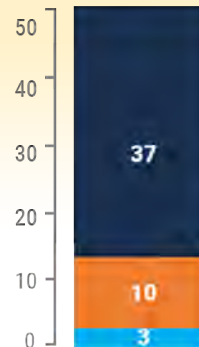
RECRUITING

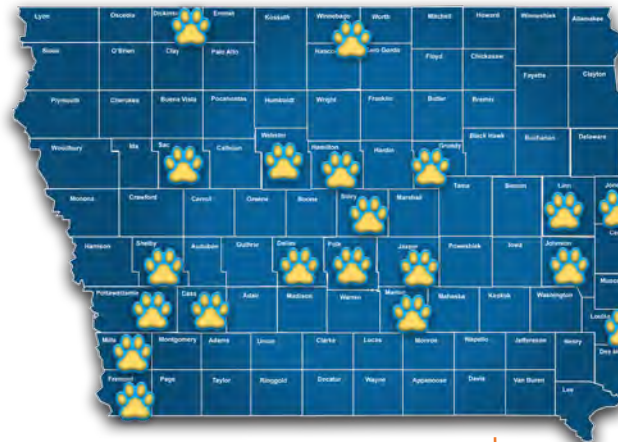
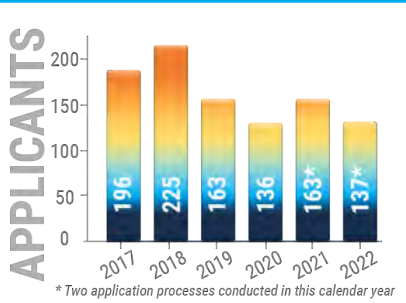
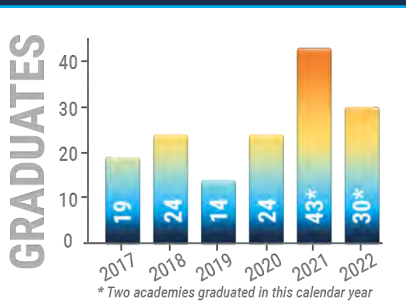


WELLNESS BUREAU

COMMISSION on ACCREDITATION for LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES (CALEA)

The Iowa Department of Public Safety is accredited through the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA) and has held this accreditation since 2011. The award of accreditation represents our commitment to professional excellence in the areas of policy and administration, operations and support services. Iowa DPS is one of only 11 Iowa law enforcement agencies with CALEA accreditation.

GOVERNOR'S TRAFFIC SAFETY BUREAU

The Governor's Traffic Safety Bureau (GTSB) administers the State of Iowa's allocation of federal highway safety funds from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) as authorized by the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act. In partnership with public and private entities, highway safety programs are developed and implemented to reduce traffic crashes and resulting fatalities, injuries, and property damage. These programs include enforcement, education, media/outreach, data, and engineering. In FFY 2022, the GTSB allocated \$8,860,735 in federal highway safety funds and managed 385 contracts with traffic safety partners across Iowa.

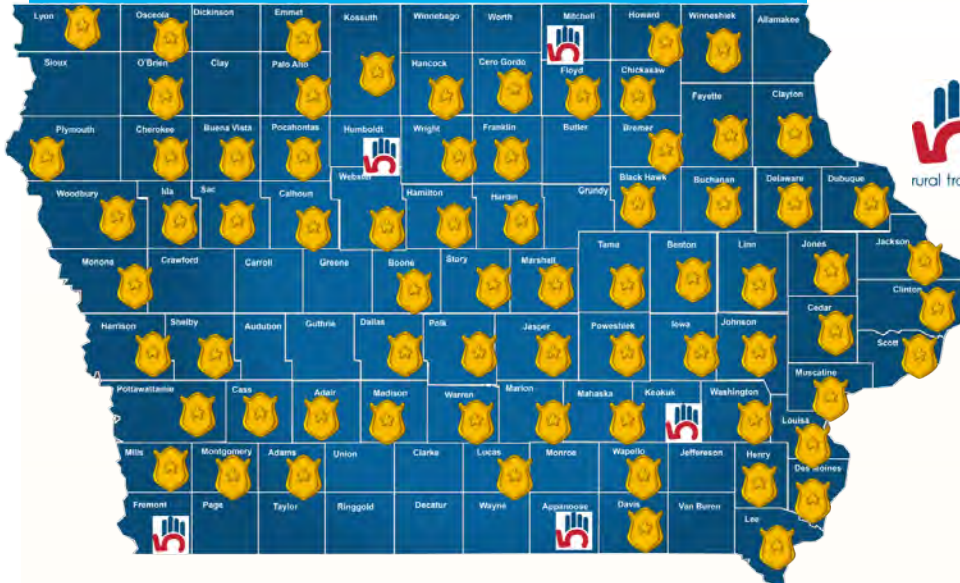


DRE PROGRAM



The Governor's Traffic Safety Bureau provides all drug impaired driving training to Iowa law enforcement officers through the Drug Evaluation and Classification Program. As a certified DRE, an officer is able to determine if a subject is impaired and unable to operate a motor vehicle in a safe manner.

In an effort to save lives through increased seat belt use, the GTSB launched the High Five Rural Traffic Safety Project. High 5 is a data driven multi-agency endeavor to help increase seat belt usage and reduce serious crashes in some of Iowa's most overrepresented, underserved rural counties.

EQUIPMENT FUND — \$5,000,000

The Department of Public Safety's Equipment Fund provides critically important resources. With the annual support of our elected officials, DPS can procure equipment that allows the department to focus on securing a high-quality of life by protecting Iowans and visitors to our state, and keeping our officers safe so they can perform their duties and return home to their families.

PROTECTING OFFICERS



MANAGING BODY-WORN CAMERA DATA - \$75,143

With the creation and continued commitment to the Department's equipment fund, DPS is now able to acquire integrated body-worn video cameras for each Trooper and select Special Agents for a total deployment of up to 450 units. The daily management of the voluminous data produced by this program, in addition to installing and maintaining the mobile router in each vehicle will require dedicated personnel. To staff this program, the Department is requesting an additional Information Technology Specialist (IST3). As an Iowa State Patrol Remote Service Center team member, this position would also assist in deploying mobile video/BWC systems, initiating firmware updates, troubleshooting, ensuring vehicle technology integration, providing evidence platform support, conducting fleet staff training, and solving after-hours issues.



INTEGRATING MOBILE TECHNOLOGIES



Body-worn camera implementation would supplement the Iowa State Patrol's vehicle-mounted video cameras that have served Iowans and visitors over the last 25+ years.



Coordinating Mobile Routers



As capabilities of mobile routers evolve, oversight and implementation of device features will increase. Router duties will include monitoring telemetry functions, troubleshooting connectivity issues, updating configurations, and programming associated servers.

Iowa Statewide Interoperable Communication System — \$6,754,358

The Department of Public Safety is required to maintain the state's ISICS radio system. The amount requested covers the seventh lease/purchase contract installment, necessary leases, and maintenance costs. The remaining costs are paid from the Road Use Tax Fund and Primary Road Fund given DOT's use of the system. Support of ISICS provides border-to-border microwave-based communication designed to improve public safety efforts across the state. This request, which begins FY2024, includes the state's assumed annual contracted maintenance agreement in the amount of \$2,300,000.



STATEWIDE CONNECTIVITY DURING EMERGENCIES



ISICS is Iowa's digital communication network of more than 140 towers. It provides public safety agencies, first responders, schools, and utility workers around the state with

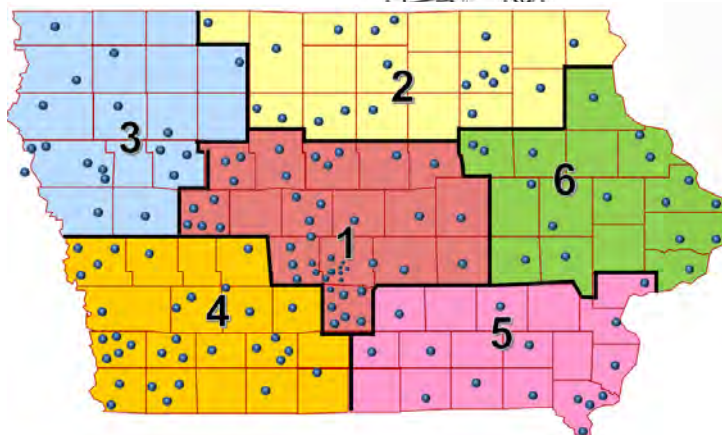
unprecedented connectivity. ISICS continues to grow each year, and now supports 31,975 radios statewide. Currently, all 108 Public Safety Answering Points (PSAPs) are connected to the statewide network, which provides interoperability to first responders and emergency response agencies.



ISICS withstood two derechos with no outages, and minimal disruptions to service due to its resiliency and back-up mechanisms. As a result, more and more agencies are looking to connect to ISICS because it has proven to be a reliable interoperable network.

INTEROPERABILITY

Public safety communications require the ability for different agencies to communicate clearly and seamlessly with one another. To help facilitate communication with those agencies that have not joined ISICS, the ISICS Board provided grant-funded radio equipment to every PSAP in Iowa.
