

Through some of her toughest times, while her parents divorced and her nephew passed, Kira heavily relied on iJAG, both other students and the staff, for support. Little did she know how much of a difference iJAG would make and where she would rise to her senior year. Kira is now the first-ever president-elect of the JAG National Career Association and the president of her chapter at Waukee High School. She has been able to discover what she wants to do after high school and is now able to give back to the JAG Community.

Why are you proud to be have been iJAG's largest private investor since 2005?

I am proud that John Deere has been iJAG's largest private donor for nearly two decades because every dollar has positively impacted our youth, schools, community, and businesses across lowa. Our students are our future talent and our future leaders.

What benefits do you see from your investment with iJAG?

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The benefits I see in our investments in iJAG are measurably improved graduation rates and post-secondary success for youth aged 7th – 12th grade across some of our highest needs schools in Iowa.

Why do you think it is important for other companies to invest in iJAG's success?

I think it's important for companies to invest in the youth who need us the most. If we are not their village, then who is? By investing in these young men and women, we are investing in building strong communities and strong businesses.

What's one message that you would deliver to an employer thinking about getting involved with iJAG?

iJAG has 22 years of its impact on thousands of youth facing enormous barriers like poverty, homelessness, and abuse. iJAG has empowered them to graduate, further their education, and join the workforce. These youth have earned a 98% graduation rate, which is an incredibly powerful accomplishment. We also know that our investments are coupled with contributions from other private partners, state funding, and local schools, which makes iJAG an even better investment.



What does equity in education mean to you?

Research shows consistent long-term gaps in education for marginalized youth due to multi-faceted barriers. It will take special support and a concentrated effort to overcome them. Each person is unique, and each situation is unique. As a result, education programs that champion equity by tailoring their approach to each individual to remove complex barriers are necessary.

What mentoring experience can you share with us? What have you gained from this experience?

The most rewarding experience for me is when a student struggling with self-confidence tries something out of their comfort zone, like a job interview or a big presentation. I am overwhelmed with pride when I see them nail it, because I knew all along they could do it. Witnessing a student recognize, maybe for the first time, what they are capable of is transformational. That is why I love mentoring, and that is why my colleagues do too.

How have you seen the iJAG program benefit the young people we serve together?

I have seen youth touched by tragedy who have lost their way. I have seen iJAG Specialists reach out to them, get them into their classroom, and help them turn a 1.6 GPA into a 3.2 GPA. I have seen iJAG Specialists invite their class into their homes for Thanksgiving knowing some students did not have a family or a table filled with food. I have seen iJAG Specialists create an emotional safety net by providing advice and support that a mother or father might give. I have seen iJAG Specialists invite businesses, employers, and military into their classrooms to provide youth with valuable social capital. I have seen iJAG Specialists teach youth how to change a flat tire, sew a button on a shirt, manage a budget, or optimize a family's food supply. iJAG is giving these youth an army of support by creating community - all we have to do is open the door.
