

BUILDING A BETTER SYSTEM



January 2022

New Reemployment Case Management System provides earlier assistance for unemployment claimants while raising expectations about the aggressiveness of their search for new jobs.



September 2022

IWD launches new Business Engagement Division to contact employers and connect them directly with the workforce services they need.

Iowa Legislature reduces maximum unemployment benefits from 26 weeks to 16, creating additional incentives for Iowans to re-enter the workforce.



July 2022


Realignment will consolidate management of all workforce programs, creating an opportunity for more efficiency & increased access to the system that can help lowans achieve rewarding careers.

OUR PROGRESS SO FAR: UNEMPLOYMENT

- Unemployment Claims have returned to prepandemic levels, and in some cases gone beyond, hitting historic lows.
- Weekly unemployment claims compared to 2021:
 Down 52.6%
- Total unemployment benefits paid in FY 2022: \$286 million
 - 48 percent reduction from pre-pandemic levels
 - Lowest since 2000
- lowans receiving unemployment benefits:
 - <u>Peak</u>: 204,175 (May 2020)
 - <u>Current</u>: 26,481 (January 2023)



Initial Unemployment Claims in 2022 hit their lowest levels since 1973.



TABLE 8: EASING THE BURDEN FOR EMPLOYERS

Iowa's prior investments in the **Unemployment Insurance Trust Fund** now are providing stability for businesses.

Table 8 in 2023 = Lowest Unemployment Insurance rates allowable by law.





An lowa business in the same tax rank as the year prior and paying the median tax rate will pay \$72.20 less per employee in unemployment taxes in 2023 – an average 25 percent reduction in their unemployment taxes.



REEMPLOYMENT CASE MANAGEMENT

- Launched in January 2022, RCM provides enhanced assistance during Week 1 for unemployed lowans in the hopes of getting them back to work as quickly as possible.
- In its first year, the program helped more than 5,000 lowans find a quick return to work.

How it Works



Career Planners held more than **24,000 individual meetings** with RCM clients.



Reviewed work search, made direct connections to workshops and training.



New software matched worker skills with those in demand with employers.



During first year, 5,048 clients reported leaving program with a job.

REEMPLOYMENT CASE MANAGEMENT

- Built on proven tools, resources, and assessments that help return unemployment to its original mission.
- Not about eliminating benefits but reducing the need for unemployment.
- Because lowa needs every worker to be active and in the economy.

RCM goes further than previously existing programs by meeting with more people and helping them earlier in the process. (Attendance at AJC workshops *nearly tripled* during the past year.)

More one-on-one assistance

faster return to workforce.



Program completers have landed careers across economic spectrum, from \$21.00 per hour to \$155,000 per year.

New IWD Division formed at Governor's direction to make it easier for businesses to get help.

- One-on-one assistance.
- Long-term partnerships to solve problems.

Launched with 100-day outreach to employers.

- Companies with at least 50 employees & little to no recent IWD engagement.
- 2,697 total visits



BUSINESS ENGAGEMENT

What We've Learned:

Companies overwhelmingly are pleased to have someone actively participating alongside them to solve workforce challenges.

Evapco, Lake View

Company connected with more than 100 high school students after IWD invite to manufacturing event.

Bruin Manufacturing, Marshalltown

The company long had struggled to find job applicants. Then, during 100-day visits, IWD's Business Engagement Consultant showed Bruin leaders how to post jobs on lowaWORKS and market positions on Facebook.

Result: In three days, the company received 50 applicants for a previously hard-to-fill position.

RAPID GROWTH IN REGISTERED APPRENTICESHIP

lowa surpassed a record 10,000 active apprentices in Nov. 2022.

- 5,402 new apprentices last fiscal year.
- 163 new programs highest number of new programs in the country.
- 890 different programs now available across the state.
- Still Growing.





INNOVATIVE ADDITIONS

Teacher / Paraeducator Registered Apprenticeship program

- Total of 134 school districts participating.
- On track to add 1,000 teachers and paraeducators by end of this year.

Health Careers Registered Apprenticeships

- Virtual reality training supporting real world experience at nursing facilities and hospitals.
- Working with 22 school districts to create an estimated 450 apprentices.

PROPOSED: STATE APPRENTICESHIP AGENCY (SAA)

State Apprenticeship Agency (SAA)

- Greater flexibility to set direction for state's leading Registered Apprenticeship (RA) Programs
- Greater access to apprentice and labor force data, allowing lowa to be more responsive to employer needs
- Streamlines processes and creates more opportunities for innovation

- The Iowa Office of Apprenticeship would be established within IWD, leveraging existing staff to oversee program development, compliance, business engagement, and grant management.
- SAA would also establish a state-level advisory board with members from multiple industry sectors.

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REWARDING GOOD IDEAS

IWD provides multiple pathways to workforce opportunities through state funding targeted for local businesses, students, and job seekers.

- Combined, a total of \$115 million in grants was awarded in 2022.
- [Does not include nearly \$21.5 million awarded in FY22 through the Last Dollar Scholarship.]





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Unemployment Trust Fund (cont.)



In 2023, for the first time in two decades, the tax rates used to fund unemployment benefits are in **Table 8**, the lowest rates allowed by law.



Tax Table formula based on:

- Trust fund balance (the higher figure of balance on June 30 or August 15)
- Total UI contributory wages
- Trust fund target level as a percentage of UI contributory wages



Estimated Impact: An lowa business in the same tax rank as the year prior and paying the median tax rate will pay \$72.20 less per employee in unemployment taxes in 2023.
