

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DATA STORYTELLING: DISABILITIES AND WORKFORCE



- Data storytelling allows state agencies, lawmakers and service providers to:
 - Gain a more complete understanding of the impact of programming
 - Examine impact
 comprehensively at the peoplelevel, rather than program by program
 - The Successful Employment for Persons with Disabilites in Iowa dashboards is one example.

- How does government best reach lowans?

Community Action Agencies Division Increasing Self-Sufficiency



Family Development and Self Sufficiency Program (FaDSS)

FaDSS assists families with multiple barriers to achieve goals of economic security and family stability. In FY22, 2,323 families received services. FaDSS families employed at exit increased monthly income from \$267 to \$1,458. Average monthly FIP payments fell from \$379 at entry to \$106 at exit. Families earned wages of \$7,727,658 resulting in FIP saving of \$1,033,373.



Low Income Home Water Assistance Program (LIHWAP)

Iowa received \$10.1 million for a new water assistance pilot program. Funds were used for crisis assistance for households facing disconnection of their water utility. Approximately 18,000 households were assisted in FY22.



Low Income Home Energy Assistance (LIHEAP)

Iowa received \$78.5 million in LIHEAP funding through the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021. Funds were used to increase the one-time regular assistance benefit of \$425 to \$765 and provide crisis assistance for over 110,000 households in FY22.




Community Services Block Grant (CSBG)

Iowa ranked first in the nation by the American Customer Service Index administered by the U.S. Dept. of Health and Human Services for its administration of the CSBG. Ratings included state plan development, training and technical assistance, monitoring practices, communication, effective partnerships, and trust in the state agency.
