





Title IV-E Funds Received



- Increasing rate of kids placed with relative and fictive kin
- Diminishing qualified placements in QRTP
- Challenges to implementing evidence-based programs



Therapeutic Foster Homes

- Kids need families
- Joint effort with Medicaid team to keep youth integrated in the community.
- Wrapping services around children with serious behavioral or emotional needs to promote stability and normalcy.
- Foster Parents with increased training, support and 24/7 services
 - · Children stay in a family-like setting
 - Reduce the need for shelter placements
- Cedar Rapids Service Area
- 3 homes accepting youth
- 2 youth placed
- Implemented screening activities
 - Visits
 - Setting services
 - Meeting foster families
- Child must discharge to CRSA
