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Iowa Department of General Services Vertical Infrastructure Program Iowa Vertical Infrastructure Advisory Committee

The Vertical Infrastructure Advisory Committee has adopted an enterprise-wide approach.

- Strategic Plan of Action provides definitions and procedures for major maintenance and routine maintenance
- Agencies work collaboratively with Committee to identify projects and establish priorities
- Projects prioritized against pre-determined criteria
- Funds directed to top ranked projects

Iowa Department of General Services Routine Maintenance Goals

- Stop the growing major maintenance backlog
 - Scheduled and preventative repairs
 - Essential part of on-going care and upkeep of buildings
- For FY2001, \$2 million = 19¢ per square foot
- Allocate on square foot basis to agencies
- Submit quarterly reports to Legislative Fiscal Bureau

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Iowa Department of General Services Major Maintenance Goals

- Reduce/eliminate major maintenance backlog
 - Critical repair needs to eliminate health/life safety threats
 - Critical repair needs to prevent further damage
 - Critical repair needs to meet changes in laws, regulations, codes, standards
 - Accessibility Needs (ADA)
- Dedicate annual funding
- Allocate funds on an enterprise-wide basis to projects based on established priorities


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



Members of the General Assembly,

In accordance with chapter 8.3A of the Code, I am pleased to submit to the general assembly recommendations concerning the state's capital projects five year plan.

A number of the projects in this plan have been prioritized through a collaborative process between the Vertical Infrastructure Advisory committee and the requesting agencies. In October the Advisory Committee met with representatives of several agencies to review and discuss Five Year Capital project requests by those agencies for which the Department of General Services provides support and for which the committee could offer advice and recommendations. As part of the committee's role to develop and submit comprehensive five-year plans of recommendations, they identified projects they believed should be considered for specific capital appropriations and those they believed more closely match the definition of "major maintenance."

Those projects recommended for capital appropriations were then ranked in priority order considering the priorities the committee outlined in their Strategic Plan of Action. Those projects identified as "major maintenance" have been added to the committee's on-going list of major maintenance projects and will be prioritized in June of 2001 for possible funding with the annual major maintenance appropriation. This prioritization process for major maintenance projects, first utilized in August 2000, received enthusiastic endorsement by the agencies involved and provides an enterprise-wide procedure for addressing the state's major maintenance needs.

Also, this plan reflects projects outside of scope of review of the vertical infrastructure committee. These additional projects are the result of the space study authorized by the general assembly during the 2000 session and priorities established by previous action of the governor and the general assembly.

As always, the vertical infrastructure committee and it's staff, the staff of the various departments involved in the projects and the staff's of the governor's office and the department of management stand ready to assist you in your evaluations of the state's capital needs.
