HISTORY

The AMBER Alert System began in 1996 when Dallas-Fort Worth broadcasters teamed with local police to develop an early warning system to help find abducted children. AMBER stands for America's Missing: Broadcast Emergency Response and was created as a legacy to 9year-old Amber Hagerman, who was kidnapped while riding her bicycle in Arlington, Texas, and then brutally murdered. Other states and communities soon set up their own AMBER plans as the idea was adopted across the nation.

In August 2002, Governor Thomas J. Vilsack called on the Iowa Department of Public Safety to begin the process of organizing local and state law enforcement and the Iowa broadcast and media community to formulate an Iowa Amber Alert plan. During the first week of September 2002, Commissioner Kevin W. Techau invited Iowa law enforcement associations, broadcast and media, emergency management coordinators to examine the process needed within Iowa to implement a successful Amber Alert Program. On November 15, 2002 the Amber Alert Committee submitted a report outlining an Iowa Amber Alert Plan to Governor Vilsack.



TESTING

The Iowa Amber Alert Committee scheduled the first test of the Iowa plan on Tuesday February 4th 2003.

The plan became operational March 13th 2003.



Iowa's AMBER Alert Plan became effective March 13, 2003 making Iowa the 36th state to adopt an AMBER Alert Plan. Commissioner Kevin W. Techau, Iowa Department of Public Safety, along with members of the <u>coordinating committee</u> held a press conference in the Wallace Building Auditorium to explain the procedure developed for Iowa and announce that the plan is now operational. Tests of the system have been successful. Training sessions instructed Iowa's Law Enforcement Agencies on how to use the AMBER Alert Plan and the <u>criteria</u> that is to be followed.



IOWA AMBER Alert Criteria


- Law enforcement must confirm a child has been abducted.
- The child is under the age of **18**.
- The circumstances surrounding the <u>abduction</u> indicate that the child is in danger of <u>serious bodily</u> harm or <u>death</u>.


What causes you to believe the child is in danger?


When you locate the child and whoever they are with, will you make an arrest and file charges ?

 There is enough descriptive information about the child, abductor, and/or suspect's vehicle to believe an immediate broadcast alert will help.

- 22 minutes to get the alert out.

Post Activation Debriefing

Iowa DOT reviewed technology upgrade processes and increased notification redundancy.

National Weather Service changed computer coding as a result of discussions during our April 8th meeting.

The DPS will include the media notification group in our Initial e-mail message

The AMBER Alert located the suspect in this case.
