

**Speaker Information from the Health and Human Services Appropriations Subcommittee  
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Bio: Ladenheim specializes in state-level access and financing issues: health care for the uninsured, insurance market reform, managed care, HIPAA, ERISA, risk pools, and comprehensive access reforms. She is the director of NCSL's HITCh (Health Information Technology Champions) project, which supports state legislative expertise in HIT. She has produced a series of research reports on state experiments in insurance reform for small groups and individuals, including a recent study on high risk pools. Previously, Ladenheim was Executive Director, Maine Health Policy Advisory Council, and has taught health policy at Johns Hopkins University; The George Washington University and other graduate and professional programs. She has an undergraduate degree from Harvard, a master's in public health from University of North Carolina- Chapel Hill and a PhD from the George Washington University.

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Bio: Jeanne Lambrew is an associate professor at George Washington University where she teaches health policy and conducts policy-relevant research on the uninsured, Medicaid, Medicare, and long-term care. She is also senior fellow at the Center for American Progress. She serves on the board of AcademyHealth, is chair of the Coalition for Health Services Research, and is the U.S. advisor for the Harnkess Fellows program.

Lambrew worked on health policy at the White House from 1997 through 2000, as the program associate director for health at the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) and as the senior health analyst at the National Economic Council. In these roles, she helped coordinate health policy development, evaluated legislative proposals, and conducted and managed analyses and cost estimates with OMB, the Department of Health and Human Services, the Treasury Department, the Labor Department and other relevant agencies. Prior to serving at the White House, Lambrew was an assistant professor of public policy at Georgetown University (1996). She received her masters and Ph.D. from the Department of Health Policy, School of Public Health at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and bachelor's degree from Amherst College.
