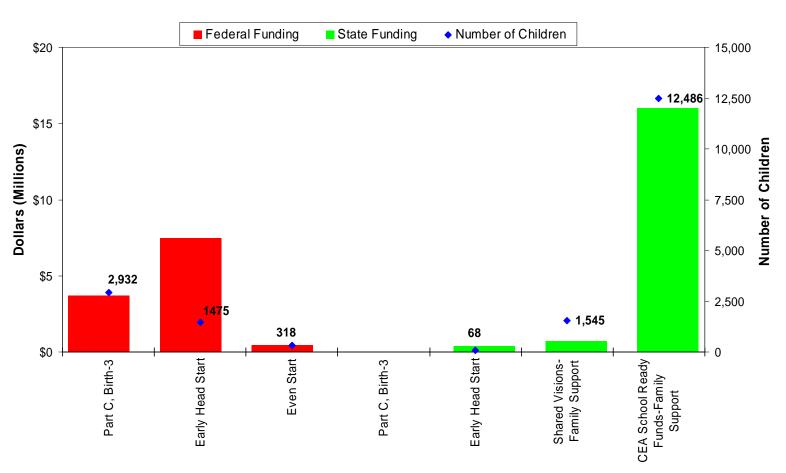

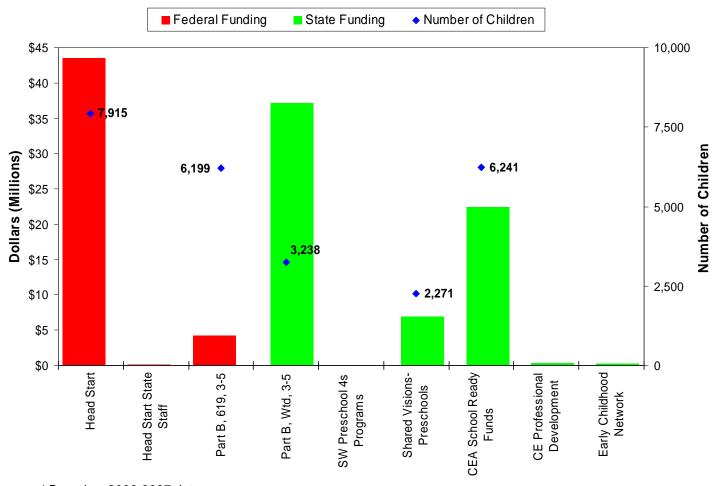

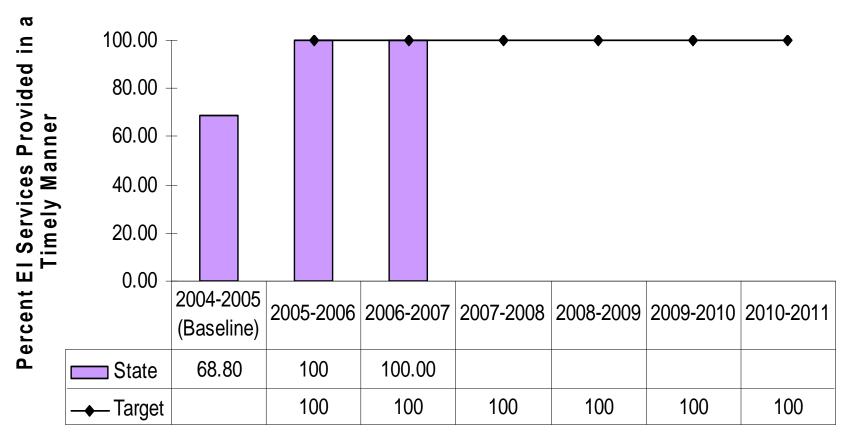

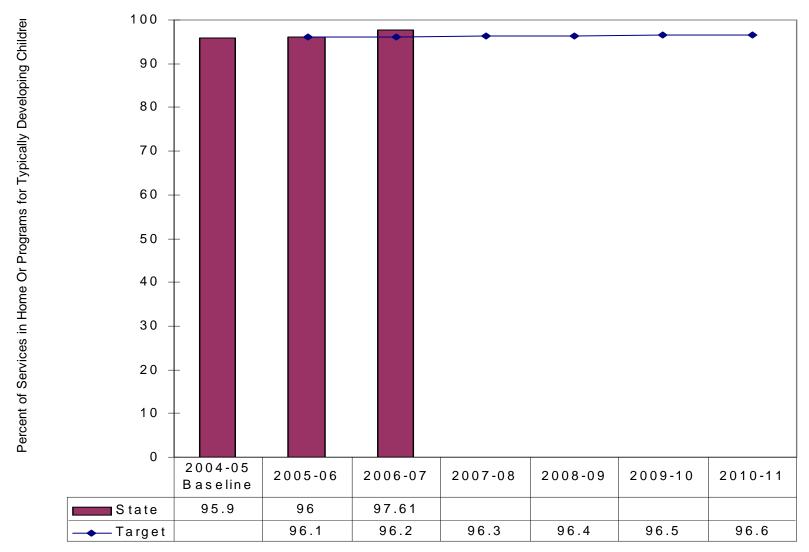
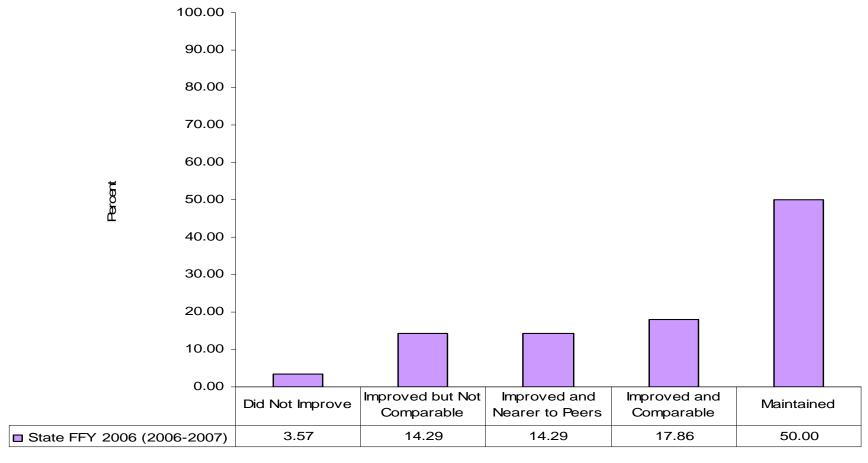

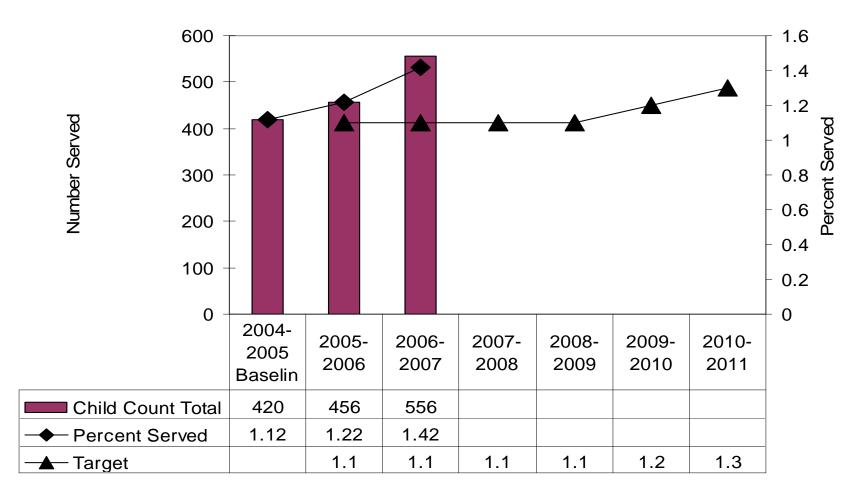

Figure C4.1. Percent of Families Reporting that Early Intervention Services Helped the Family.



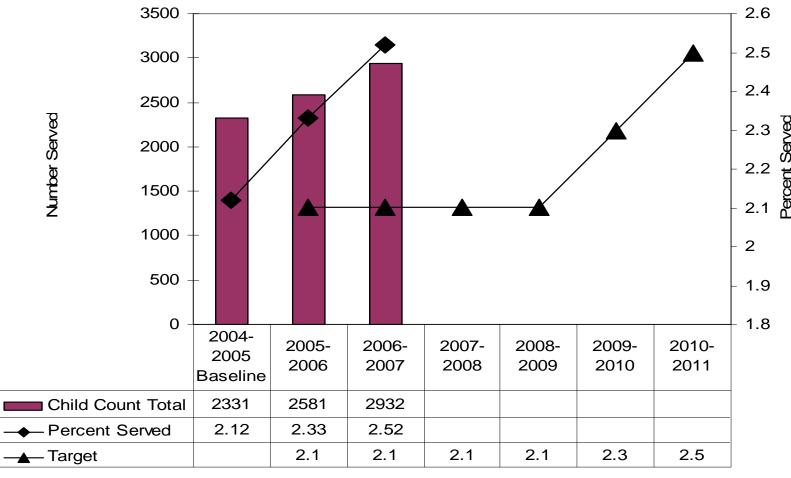

Figure C5.1. Number and Percent of Children with IFSPs, Ages Birth to Age One.



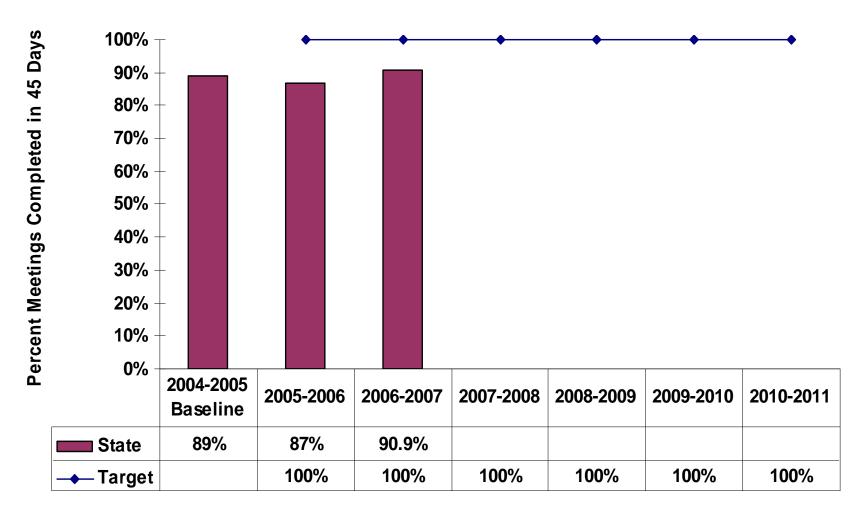

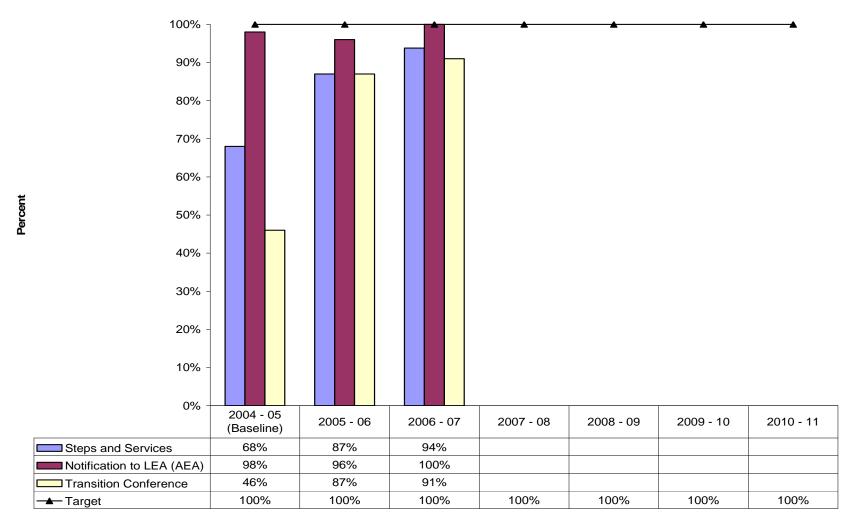
Figure C7.1. Percent of Evaluations and IFSP Meetings Completed in 45-Day Timeline.

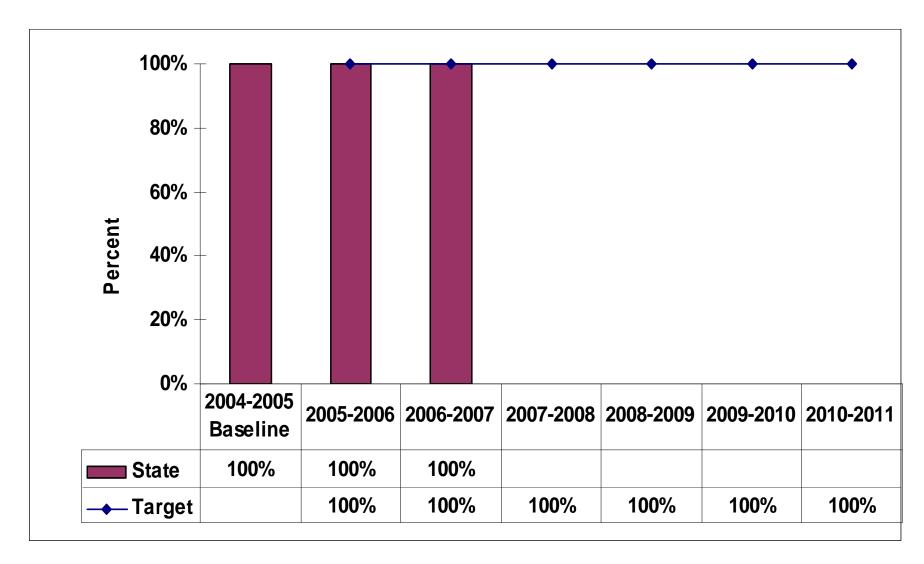

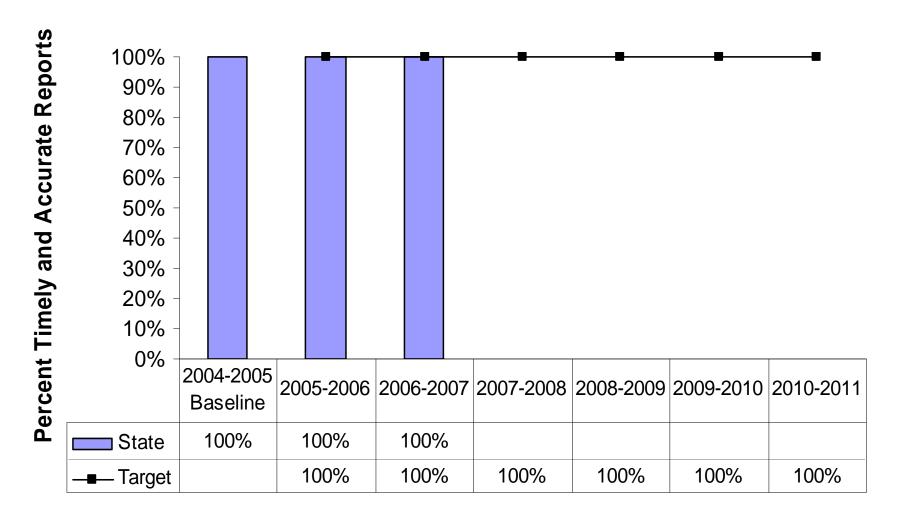

Figure B7.1 SEA Percent of Preschool Children with IEPs who Demonstrate Improved Positive Social-Emotional Skills.

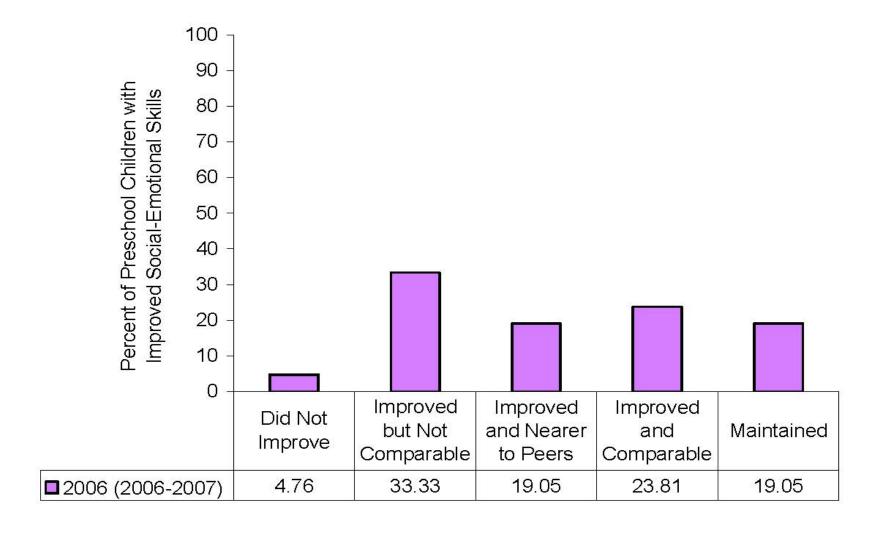
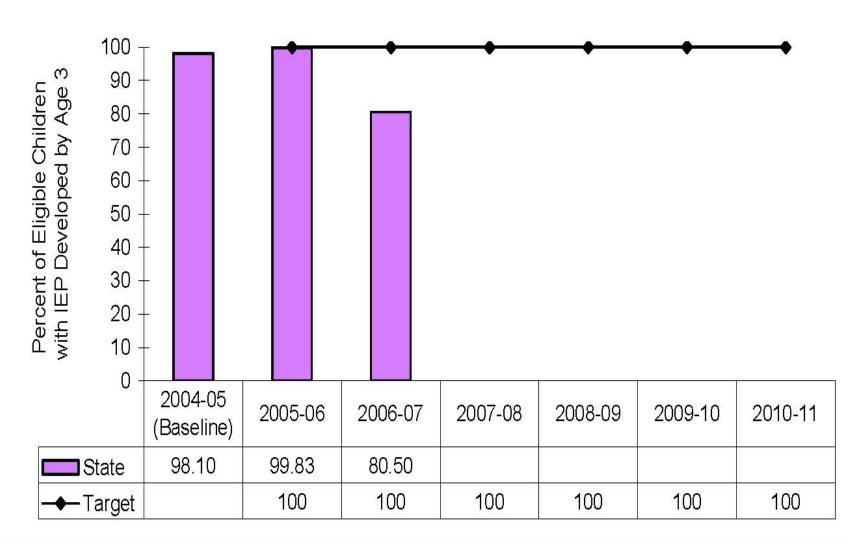
