

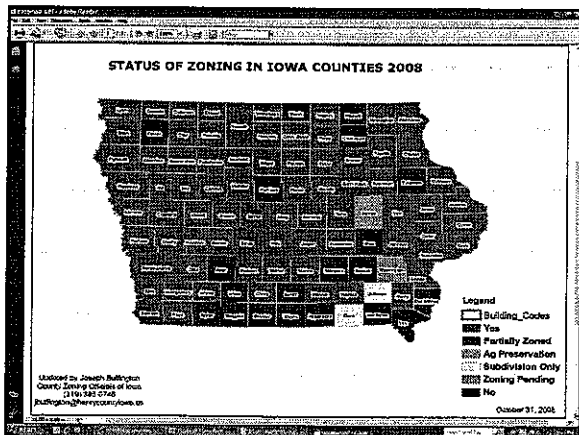

State Energy/Building Code Perspectives

Counties With Codes

- Pottawattamie, Polk, Dallas, Wapello, Bremer, Linn, Johnson, Scott, Blackhawk, Muscatine
- Each have adopted various IBC and IRC versions
 - DOE REScheck energy code compliance can be incorporated by reference
- Administration and enforcement is different

Wapello County Case Study

- Adopted in 2003
 - Building growth prompted
 - Public meeting with local contractors
 - No real enforcement problems today
- 1 building official (co. engineer), 1 inspector
- Mostly self-sufficient due to permit fees
 - County sets fees—sliding scale based on valuation of project
 - General fund would pick up difference

Pottawattamie County Case Study

- Adopted in 2007
 - Supervisor urged adoption
 - Consulting firm presence
- Consulting firm provides 1 building official, 1 inspector, 1 permit technician
- No cost to county
 - Permit fees: 75% to contractor, 25% to county

Bremer County Case Study

- Adopted in late 1970s
 - Recognized need to enforce standard practices
 - Reminders in newsletters and on city utility bills
- 1 building official (zoning director), 2 inspectors
- 28E agreements with 6 cities to issue permits—county gets all permit fees

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- Problems with enforcement
 - Counties have encountered few
 - Agricultural exemption is not understood
 - Can be difficult to interpret
 - Minimum requirements for life safety should be standard

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- Why haven't more counties adopted building codes?
 - Cost question
 - Very little development occurring
 - Not considered by Board of Supervisors
 - Perception of invasiveness

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- Encouraging counties to adopt building codes
 - Education!
 - Benefits of codes
 - Incorporate energy codes by reference
 - Partnering with cities through 28E agreements
 - Allows county to hire staff needed to enforce in the best manner
 - Maintaining local control

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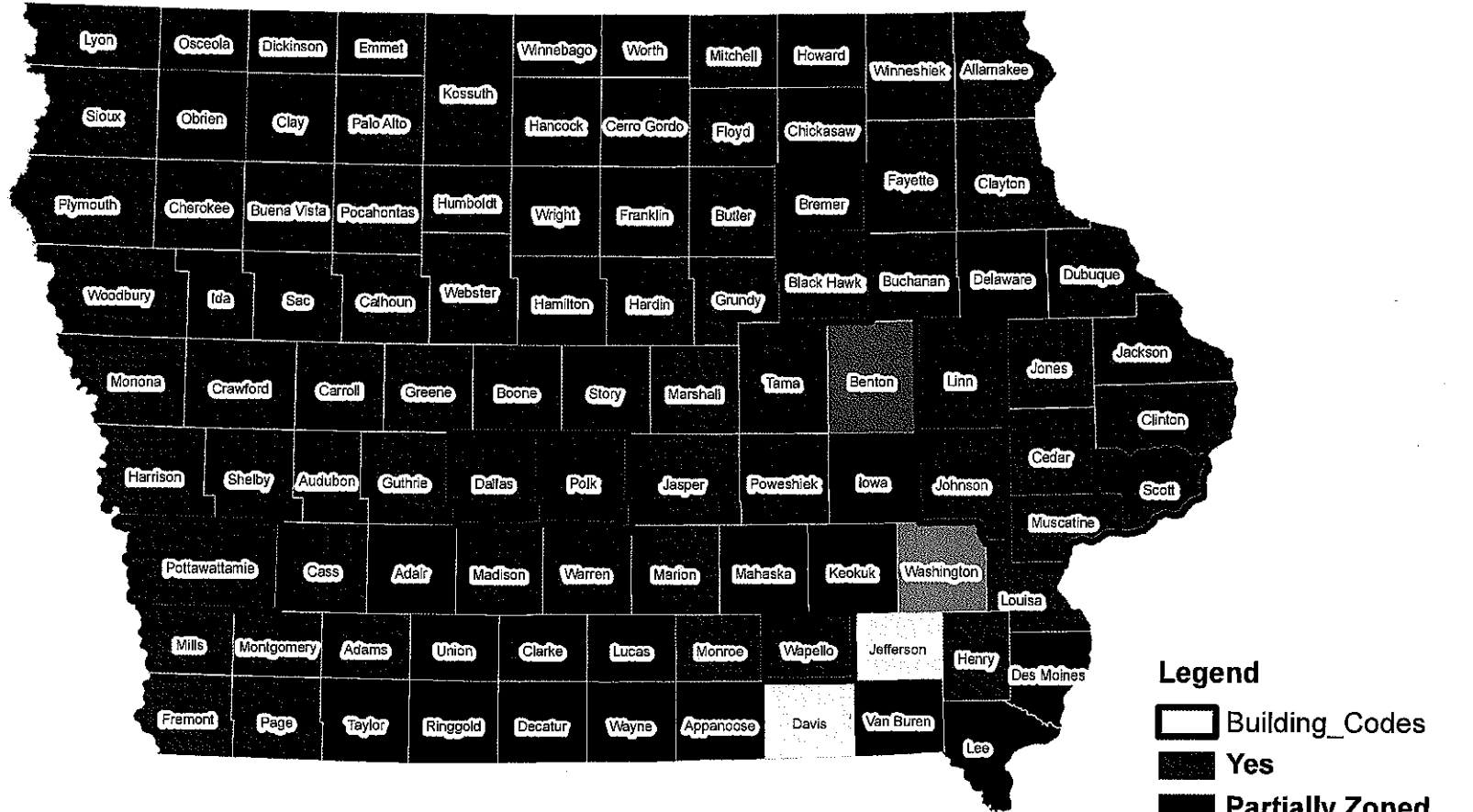
- Conclusion
 - 10 counties have building codes
 - Differ in administration
 - Well-enforced, successful programs
 - Education of benefits is key
 - 28E agreements underused
 - Final decision made locally
