Broadlawns Health Care Issues – 2014 Legislative Session

History

- Strong collaborative relationship on IowaCare with the State of Iowa (Win/Win).
- Broadlawns tax levy that has been transferred to the state over the past 7 years draws down an *additional* \$500 million.
 - o Broadlawns uses some of this funding to cover costs of expanded and unfunded care.
 - State of Iowa and counties outside of Polk County benefit greatly, utilizing more of these funds to care for patients in their respective counties.
- In addition, Broadlawns implements measures that drastically reduce costs of patient care by over 45%, resulting in net annual savings of approximately \$25 million per year. These dollars go back the State of Iowa to further support the IowaCare and other Medicaid programs.

Key Issues

- 1) Creation of new *lowa* <u>Health & Wellness Plan</u> while positive for hospitals throughout lowa, <u>creates significant financial uncertainty</u> for Broadlawns Medical Center. While many patients will certainly continue to use Broadlawns as their medical home, others many with unique <u>psychosocial issues may go elsewhere.</u> This inability to forecast future volume of patients creates difficulty trying to estimate needed resources. Approximately 50% of Broadlawns patient volumes today are lowaCare patients.
- 2) Capping of the IowaCare program and eliminating new patient enrollment effective 7/1/13 is resulting in a tremendous increase in the cost of <u>charity care</u> at Broadlawns. Prior to 7/1/13, Broadlawns provided the highest level of charity care in the state of Iowa. Since 7/1/13, charity has exploded and has more than doubled to 9% of its operating budget. The capping of the IowaCare Program has resulted in an <u>additional \$750,000 (approx) in new charity per month</u>. This will result in close to \$5 million of new charity care for the period of 7/1/13 to 12/31/13.
- 3) Broadlawns currently has the largest family medicine residency program in Iowa. Approximately 2/3 of our graduates go on to practice and stay in Iowa many of these go to rural Iowa. In addition, Broadlawns has a very large psychiatry and mental health program the largest in Iowa. Given the <u>extreme demand and need for psychiatrists in Iowa</u>, Broadlawns would like to build off its success running residency programs that recruit, retain and place physicians in the State of Iowa. Broadlawns proposes to start <u>a new psychiatric residency program</u> in Iowa. The uncompensated costs to operate a residency program such as psychiatry are very high. We would <u>request \$2 million</u> to start up and operate this program.
