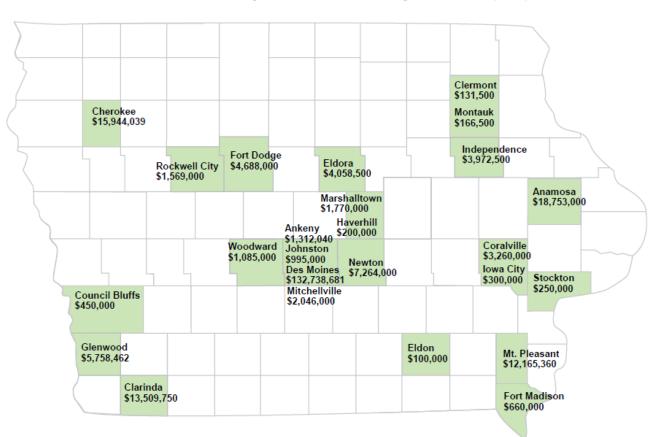
Major Maintenance Priorities

- 6. Building demolition.

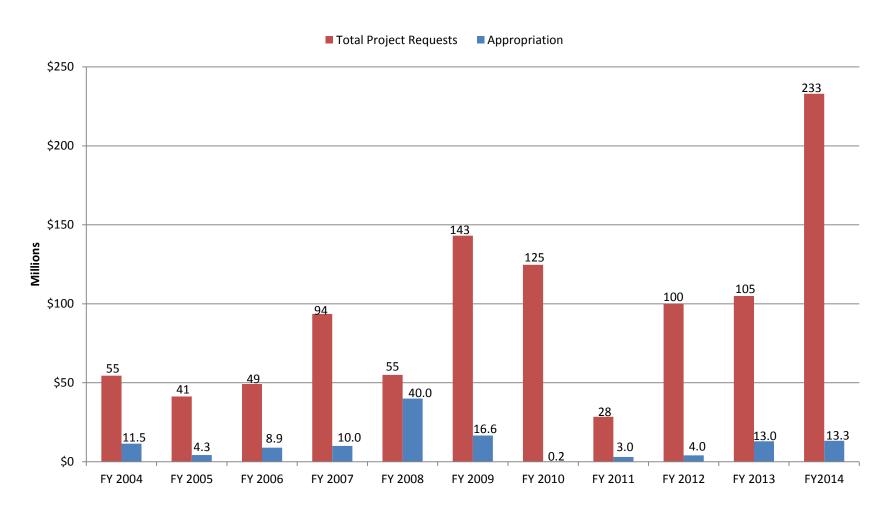

FY15 Major Maintenance Funding

- \$14 million appropriated for major maintenance in FY2015; Governor's budget recommended additional \$7 million
- Total \$21 million appropriation would fund:
 - all existing Priority 1 life/health/safety projects
 - nearly 60% of existing Priority 2 exponential damage projects*
 - 15 roofs
 - 10 tunnels
 - 21 tuckpointing jobs
 - Plumbing, security & elevator issues

Capitol Complex Association Fee

- Current fee of \$3.46/sf insufficient to operate buildings
 - Basic upkeep of mechanical systems; grounds; life, health and safety systems; lock shop; custodial
- Propose increase to at least \$5.90/sf, index to an industry benchmark for annual adjustment
 - Total impact of approximately \$3.5 million
- Need additional funding (major maintenance, routine maintenance) to address deferred maintenance backlog
