Supplemental funding due to diminished Unclaimed Winnings

### Justification:

This package is to supplement the diminishing unclaimed winnings which have historically funded the horse and dog program. These no longer support the current personnel and travel required for statewide inspection of this program. At the same time, the industry is growing and there is a demand for more inspection services. This industry makes a large contribution to the Iowa economy.

This request is for the salary, benefits and travel for one full time inspector in the horse and dog program.

The objective is to supplement the decreasing amount of dollars from the Unclaimed Winnings with General Fund dollars. This will allow us to keep the current number of inspectors who are facing an even higher number of inspections due to this being a growing industry.

The unclaimed winnings funds have been showing a steady decrease over the last three fiscal years. At the end of FY 04 the IDALS was short \$45,000.00 in this program due to there not being enough money to bring in. We are therefore requesting \$36,448.26 in salary and benefits for one of the three inspectors and \$12,000 in travel dollars to provide for state wide inspections. The current downward trend in unclaimed winnings indicates that funding will only continue to decline.

The consequences of not appreciating this funding will be a peduation in staff and a great loss in complete to an industry that is greating and bringing manay into the Ctate of Israel

The objectives include serving as a member of the Homeland Security Information Network Working Group for the Agriculture and Food Safety Sector in Washington, attending Government Coordinating Council meetings as an alternate member with the Secretary, updating emergency response plans for the National Response Plan, and Chairperson of the NASDA Homeland Security standing committee.

### Consequences:

Without the financial resources, the Department of Agriculture will not be able to dedicate personnel to these initiatives. Progress in the areas of emergency response planning and planning for an agro-terrorism event will not continue. USDA APHIS and FSA as well as Farm Bureau will continue planning without involvement from state agencies. This could create confusion during an emergency response.

Fund a Chronic Wasting Disease monitoring program for farm deer

### Justification:

Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) is a fatal, neuro-degenerative disease of cervidae, affecting whitetail, elk, mule deer, and blacktail deer. The disease exists in the wild deer population in selected areas of the US, including NE, WI, IL, and SD. It has also been found in captive cervid herds in numerous states. Iowa has not had a case of CWD to date. IDALS developed a CWD surveillance and monitoring program in 2000. The program started with few herds and had grown to about 40 elk herds. In 2003, legislation classified whitetail deer as farm deer and brought them under the jurisdiction of IDALS. The number of herds desiring participation in the program increased greater than five-fold. Recent budget cuts were forcing us to re-examine our ability to provide the program prior to whitetail deer being added; this addition overwhelmed our ability to provide the services. FY04 funding has been procured through a one-year, one-time cooperative agreement with the USDA.

IDALS is requesting funding sufficient to maintain the farm deer CWD monitoring program. The funding will allow for a program planner to administer the program, including maintenance of the CWD database; provide for partial funding of field activities associated with the CWD program, including annual inventories and record reconciliations, oversight of sample collection by private practitioners, and ensuring compliance with animal movement requirements; and provide reimbursement of expenses for collection and submission of samples from animals offered for inspection at state-inspected slaughter plants.

### Consequences of not approving:

The consequences of not approving this decision package request will be the discontinuation of the CWD monitoring and surveillance program, as administered by IDALS. A major consequence will be that Iowa producers will lose their ability to market animals to states which require a CWD status – virtually every state.

### Justification:

Description: The Farmers' Market Nutrition Program (FMNP) has grown to over \$1.2 million in federal grants, matched with \$275,000 in state funds, and serving 77,000 WIC and Senior participants. The FMNP has played a critical role in the expansion of more than 121 farmers' markets in Iowa by channeling over \$11 million dollars to local producers. Two thirds of Iowa fruit and vegetable growers are now using the farmers markets as a marketing channel. IDALS is requesting \$54,954 to hire a Program Planner I to support the FMNP.

Objectives: To maintain the integrity of the FMNP with respect to vendor training & monitoring, check reconciliation, farmstand evaluation, and surveying participant & market changes; to meet the federal regulations that sufficient staff be available to administer the FMNP; to expand the FMNP to allow WIC to participate in all 99 counties and increase senior participation above 17%; to maximize the federal grant dollars available.

Decision-Making Criteria: The FMNP required 1.5 FTE's to administer a half million dollar program. 2 FTE's were required with the addition of the seniors component and expansion to over one million dollars. The current FMNP has expanded to over 1.5 million dollars but is currently administered by a single FTE. Just to keep the bare essentials of the program intact required 952 hours of staff time diverted from other responsibilities and 291 hours of overtime.

Consequences: May be unable to meet federal staffing guidelines to continue to receive grants or capture additional grant funding. May be unable to provide required training or reconcile more than a million checks, as required by federal regulations. Unable to respond to vendor concerns or document benefits to clients and markets.

Alternatives: Continue status quo as long as some state resources are available and Iowa qualifies; transfer the FMNP to another department that has adequate resources; discontinue the

Justification:

Description of the package:

Disease Program Veterinarian: Funding sufficient to hire a Disease Program Veterinarian to assist in the management of federal cooperative agreements, manage foreign animal disease preparedness, oversee various disease control programs, etc. We are down to two veterinarians in the office, compared to four relatively recently. There have been new disease programs (BSE. AI, END, CWD), funded significantly with federal funding that would benefit from dedicated support from the office. Some of the current control and surveillance programs (Low Path Avian Influenza, CWD, Johne's) are entirely state programs implemented in response to industry concerns and request. Others, most adequately described as monitoring programs (registration of all concentrations of poultry) are in need of coordination and liaison with the impacted industry.

The USDA APHIS VS has recently been offering funding to states in the form of cooperative agreements with detailed work plans and objectives for the funding. Management of these cooperative agreements is time-consuming and tedious, but necessary. As an example, this funding has allowed IDALS to acquire training for district veterinarians in conducting risk assessments for Johne's Disease. IDALS now desires to provide this service to producers and practitioners. USDA expects reporting of our Johne's activities. In order to meet the requirements of the cooperative agreement and provide a needed service to producers, additional oversight and management is needed. The goal of this effort would be to exert additional leverage for increased federal monies to aid in our efforts.

### Consequences of not approving this package:

We will have trouble meeting our objectives for cooperative agreement awards and jeopardize future funding. We will not be able to address legitimate industry concerns and meet program goals.

Justification:

DESCRIPTION:

Funding for continuing the apiary inspection program. This is not a request for an FTE but a request to fund 4 part-time (780 hour) apiary inspectors.

### **OBJECTIVES:**

Funding will be used to accomplish the following objectives:

- 1. Conduct inspection of bees, combs and equipment pursuant to Iowa Code sections 160.2(2), and 160.2(3) and Iowa Administrative Rule Sections 22.6(160) and 22.7(160);
- 2. Issue permits pursuant to Iowa Code Section 160.5 and Iowa Administrative Rule Sections 22.4(160) and 22.9(160);
- 3. Travel and attend board meetings of the Iowa Honey Producers Association (IHPA);
- 4. Maintain the apiary registry pursuant to Iowa Code Section 160.5; and
- 5. Staff time associated with providing information and referrals to callers regarding: Bee swarms and nuisance bees; Locating bees, hive and honey processing equipment for processing; and Packaging and marketing of honey products.

### **DECISION MAKING CRITERIA:**

Iowa Code Chapter 160 was published in 1924 and Iowa Administrative Rule Chapter 22 was published in 1976. The apiary inspection program as specified in this legislation has ensured for many years that bee diseases are identified and dealt with appropriately to minimize and even prevent the spread of honeybee diseases. This inspection program has helped maintain a strong, healthy and productive population of honeybees in the state for the pollination of ag and horticultural crops and the production of honey and related honeybee products.

### CONSEQUENCES OF NOT APPROVING:

If this Decision Package is not approved, there will simply be no apiary inspection program. Without the inspection program Iowa beekeepers will not be provided with the expertise necessary to identify honeybee diseases and assurance that bee equipment and combs are disease-free. Without such assistance honeybee populations and productivity may diminish and in turn producers of agricultural and horticultural crops would be adversely affected.

Justification:

Decision making criteria:

Johne's disease is a serious and widespread disease of cattle, sheep, goats, and other ruminants. Chronic diarrhea, weight loss, and eventual death characterizes the disease. The disease is slow to develop; an infected animal may go years without showing symptoms. An infected animal may spread the disease to a buyer's herd. The disease has a serious impact on milk production. The NAHMS Dairy '96 Study found that, in infected herds with 10% prevalence, the average cost to the producer was \$227 for each cow in the herd per year. The estimated prevalence from this study, combined with Iowa dairy herd statistics, provide a range of costs of this disease from \$15.2 million per year (\$18,160 per year for the 80 cow herd) to \$26 million per year for Iowa.

IDALS received a \$60,000 cooperative agreement from USDA for education about Johne's Disease. The funding provided training for District Veterinarians in conducting herd risk assessments and will provide herd risk assessments to a limited number of cattle herds. An educational and informational meeting has been completed, with 100 attendees. Future funding is contingent on our ability to accumulate and report on activities relating to Johne's Disease. IDALS lacks the resources and staffing to meet these reporting requirements.

For any control plan for Johne's Disease, it is important to know the prevalence, as it impacts disease control and elimination strategies. State funding may be leveraged to obtain additional federal funding. It is proposed to subsidize testing for herds: following an approved herd plan, herds desiring enrollment in the test-negative herd status program, and for infected herds.

### Consequences of not approving:

A lesser ability to compete for federal funding available to states for Johne's; continued inability to provide services to the cattle industry, particularly dairy, in dealing with this important disease.

### Justification:

Description: Employ 2 additional inspectors to inspect fuel pumps & measuring devices, small scales such as counter scales, small platform scales & grain moisture meters. Fuel quality samples will also be collected on a limited basis to check octane levels, ethanol levels and amounts of MTBE.

### **Objectives:**

\*Provide an adequate inspection program of over 30,981 fuel meters, 1221 moisture meters and 10,864 counter scales for accuracy & safety features

\*Assure consumers of accurate, fair weighing and metering of commodities sold

### Decision making criteria:

- \*Code of Iowa Chapter 214.11 mandates an annual inspection of motor vehicle fuel pumps which is difficult to meet with the current staffing level (six inspectors). These staff must annually inspect and calibrate over 31,000 fuel meter pumps. These same six inspectors attempt to contact 2887 businesses with 10,864 counter and small scales
- \*Additional inspectors would provide for more inspections to be completed and safety and fuel quality issues to be inspected and a more regular basis. It will also allow for more counter scale inspections in grocery stores, department stores and small businesses.
- \*The new Metrology Lab will provide better assistance in the areas of fuel quality, octane testing, ethanol level testing & related fuel issues. The addition of two inspectors would enhance this
- \*Code of Iowa Chapter 215A.2 states an annual inspection of grain moisture meters in Iowa is mandated. Inspections in this area will assure correct grain moistures & farmer grain transactions at the point of sale

### Consequences:

- \*Fraudulent or false transactions will occur which negatively impacts consumers
- \*Unfair competition can result in putting honest business people at a competitive disadvantage
- \*Consumers will pay more for commodities sold through inaccurate devices

Justification:

Description:

Grapes and wine are value-added and agri-tourism opportunities. The IDALS requests \$106,864 to hire a state viticulturist and resources to re-establish grape growing and wine production.

To establish 1000 acres of commercial vineyards, to increase the number of native wineries, to develop tourism; to increase market share of native Iowa wines; to work with Midwestern states in developing research and promotion programs.

Iowa State University estimated the economic impact of a modest industry (1000 acres and 15 wineries) to generate \$8.01 million in income, \$16.8 million in value added, \$42.15 million in output, and employ 375 Iowans. The analysis considered only the grape and wine production phases but noted that the wine industry is linked with significant tourism activities.

### **Decision-Making Criteria:**

Since 2000, Iowa has progressed from 22 vineyards on 30 acres to over 234 vineyards on 500 acres. Wineries have grown from 11 to 31. The primary need is technical and marketing assistance. Current assistance will not be available after June.

### Consequences:

Vineyards and wineries will rely on trial and error and mistakes will be repeated by new entrants. Information on new hardy cultivars, disease and insect control, and best production techniques will not be collected and disseminated. Assistance in marketing, contracts, and cooperatives will not be available. Connecting growers to wineries will not occur in a coordinated manner. Grapes varieties will be planted that are already in surplus or not used by wineries. Wineries will lack adequate supplies and purchase out-of-state grapes. Iowa will lose the economic impact of grape and wine production and the associated tourism.

### Alternatives:

Continue status quo and allow grape growers and wine producers to continue their individual efforts. Provide funding to purchase the technical, marketing, and coordination assistance from
