Inmate Labor

- 1. For 2006, a total of 1,203 inmates were employed through Iowa Prison Industries (IPI):
 - ➤ 351 inmates were employed in traditional industries.
 - > 760 inmates were employed by private sector employers.
 - ➤ 92 inmates were employed at IPI farms.
- 2. For FY 2006, IPI inmate labor hours totaled 1.3 million:
 - > 717,000 hours in traditional industries labor.
 - ➤ 316,000 hours in private sector labor.
 - > 277,000 hours in IPI farm labor.
- 3. IPI inmate labor trends/facts:
 - ➤ Traditional industries sales and productivity have more than doubled in the past 20 years.
 - > Traditional industries is likely to experience greater growth over the next ten years in service-oriented ventures.
 - Private sector jobs are the fastest growing jobs nationally.
 - > Private sector jobs are the most volatile, highly dependent on a strong economy.
 - ➤ A University of Baltimore study found that recidivism rates are lower for inmates involved in IPI than for other inmates.
- 4. For FY 2006, there were 11,778 inmate work crews:
 - ➤ Comprising a total of 71,590 offenders
 - ➤ Performing 698,688 hours of labor
 - > At a cost of \$804,462
 - ➤ Producing estimated benefits of \$6,986,876
