Iowa Governor's Office of Drug Control Policy (ODCP) 2015-2016 Federal Priorities At-A-Glance

Governor's Office of Drug Control Policy

The Iowa Governor's Office of Drug Control Policy (ODCP) is a small stand-alone state executive branch agency. ODCP's Director also serves as Iowa's Drug Policy Coordinator, and chairs a 15-member Iowa Drug Policy Advisory Council. ODCP serves three primary purposes spanning multiple jurisdictions, disciplines and issues: (1) coordination of substance abuse prevention and treatment programs, and drug enforcement efforts; (2) drug control policy development; and (3) federal grant program administration.

Byrne Justice Assistance Grant (Byrne JAG) Program

Funds 24 Iowa crime control projects, including 17 drug enforcement task forces in 63 counties, plus drug/crime prevention and treatment.

ODCP Supports:

- CJS funding commensurate with other discretionary program funding levels.
- Reauthorization with enhanced accountability and efficiency (e.g., statewide strategic planning and coordination, and passing all funds through state for enhanced monitoring or raising local-direct grant threshold from \$10,000 to \$100,000).
- Changing Byrne JAG 10% flat penalty for Adam Walsh Act/SORNA noncompliance, to recognize good faith effort (e.g., scalable penalty commensurate with compliance levels that would reduce Iowa's current penalty amount from about \$100,000/year).

Marijuana

ODCP supports:

- Development of safe, tested and effective research-driven cannabis-based medicines for use by health care professionals to treat patients with valid medical needs, without compromising the health and public safety of Iowans. ODCP is concerned with the health and safety of all Iowans. ODCP does not support marijuana legalization.

Synthetic Drugs

ODCP supports:

- New and enhanced controls to keep pace with the ongoing evolution of synthetic drugs, to deter distribution and use of dangerous products.

Prescription Drug/Opioid Abuse

ODCP supports:

- Strong state Prescription Drug Monitoring Programs (PMPs)
- Public Education and Professional Training
- Tamper Resistant Technology
- Prescription Take Back Programs

Methamphetamine


ODCP supports:

- Strong state precursor controls (e.g., NPLeX), multi-jurisdictional enforcement, effective prevention/treatment, and Southwest border enforcement.


The rate of past month illicit drug use among Iowans 12+ is **7.34%**, 13th lowest among states, & lower than the national average of 9.27% (NSDUH 2011-2012).

➔ Meth lab incidents & related trends in drug-related prison admissions, meth treatment admissions & child abuse cases involving meth in Iowa have dropped more than **80%** since their peak in 2004 (ODCP 2014).


2014 Meth Lab Map (IDPS-CY)




Meth Lab Incident Reports (IDPS-CYs)

➔ Iowa has the **7th** most meth treatment admissions & **11th** highest *rate* of meth treatment admissions in the U.S. (2012 TEDS).


➔ **46.7% more** treatment admissions occur via the criminal justice system in counties covered by drug task forces (ODCP 2011).

➔ Alcohol is the substance most abused by Iowans...**50%** of clients screened/admitted to treatment (Iowa DPH, SFY 2014).


➔ **5.02 million gallons** of distilled spirits were sold in Iowa last year. Per-capita, that equates to each Iowa adult having 2.30 gallons of distilled spirits, in addition to 2.01 gallons of wine & 34.39 gallons of beer available to consume (ABD SFY 2014).

➔ **12,390** Iowa youth & adults seeking treatment, cited marijuana as their primary substance of abuse (Iowa DPH, SFY 2014).


Drugs of Choice Among Iowans in Substance Abuse Treatment (IDPH SFY 2014)




Primary Substance of Abuse for Juvenile Treatment Clients (IDPH SFY 2014)



Origin of Marijuana Seized by Iowa State Patrol Significant Highway Interdictions (IDPS 2014)




Marijuana-Related Emergency Department Visits (IDPH 2014)




→ 6% of Iowa 11th graders report prescription or over-the-counter drug abuse in the past 30 days (IYS 2012).

→ Medicines account for 6 of the top 10 substances involved in poisonings in Iowa. Pain medicine is #1 (IA SPCC 2014).

→ Iowa has the 14th lowest rate of prescription pain reliever abuse, but medicine abuse is the fastest growing form of substance abuse in the State (NSDUH 2012-2013/ODCP).




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
Iowa Rx Pain Reliever OD Deaths Methadone & Other Opioids (IDPH)
