

## **Fatherhood Program**

Mission: To nurture the potential of every child by focusing on educating fathers about the role they play, responsibilities they have, and well-being of their children.

Why: Children from fatherless homes are five times more likely to be poor and 20 times more likely to be incarcerated; 71% of all high school dropouts are from fatherless homes. Our communities and our children deserve better outcomes.

How: We educate in a direct way through the delivery of the evidence-based 24/7 Dad Curriculum in multiple locations throughout the YMCA of Greater Des Moines, Door of Faith Ministries, and Muscatine Family YMCA.

Who: We primarily serve low income men who are infrequently involved in their children's life and who want to do better. The average annual income of a participant is about \$14,000. Referrals come from previous graduates, corrections, and social service agencies.

Results: Graduates of the program between 2010 and 2015 have a lower recidivism rate than do other Polk County ex-offenders - 12% instead of 36% according to the lowa Department of Corrections. The average annual cost for the care of an inmate is over \$34,000. Ninety six graduates of the program in state fiscal years 2011 and 2012 significantly improved their on-time payment of support to the parent who lives with the child. The year prior to graduation, participants paid less than 38 percent of the support on time; however, the year after graduation, on-time support rose to 68 percent. The year after, the on-time rate rose to 70 percent. Even after four years, the support paid is 65%. To put that in perspective, the national on-time support rate is 64 percent and there are 33 states that do not reach the national level.

Purpose of Increased Funding Request: To build the capacity to deliver programs with fidelity throughout the State of Iowa in order to ensure more kids receive the nurturing and needed support physically, emotionally, mentally and financially from their fathers. With the increase in funding, we will be able to identify and expand to another community in the form of a start-up grant. This grant will cover the cost of curriculum, include facilitator training to another community and lead a statewide training for facilitators.
