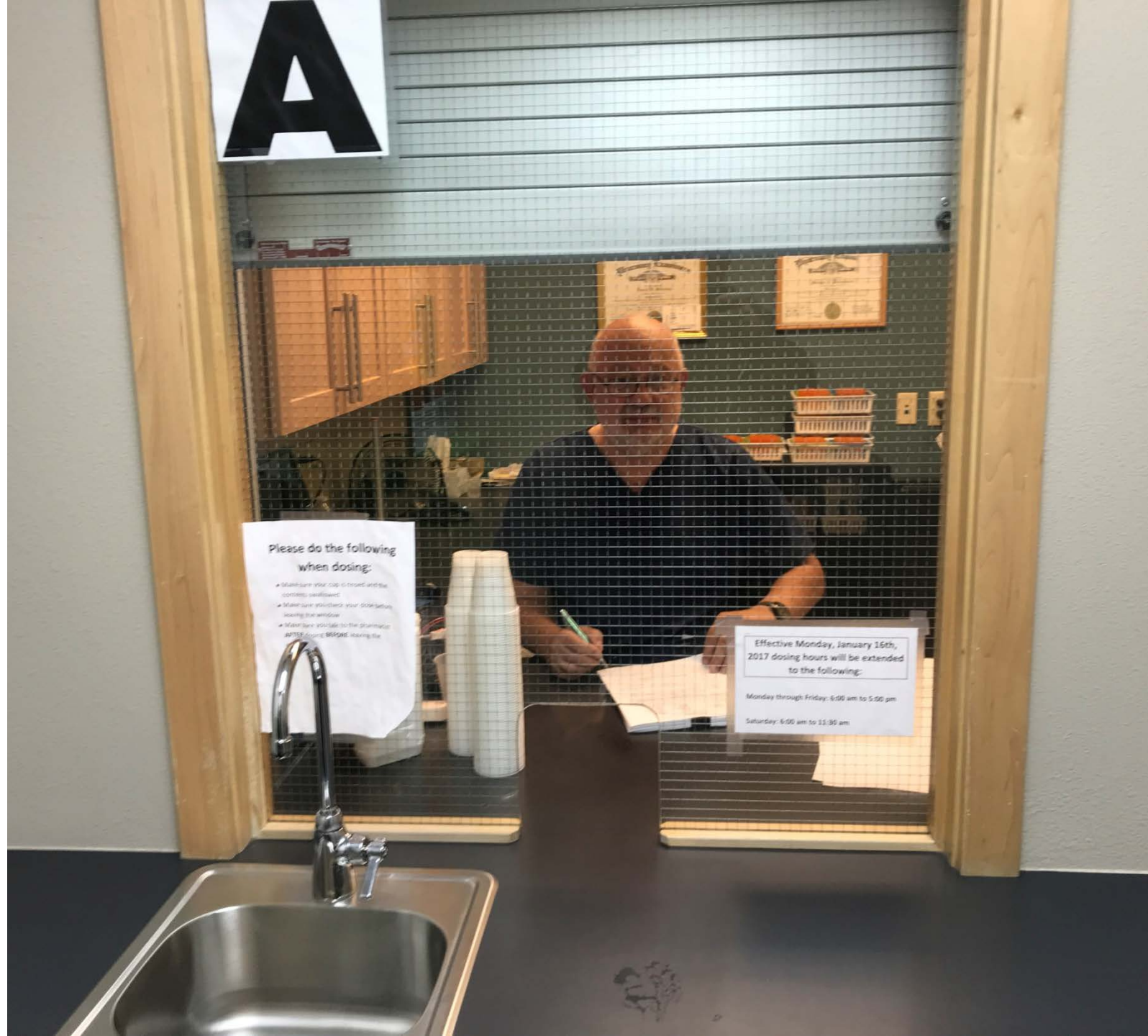

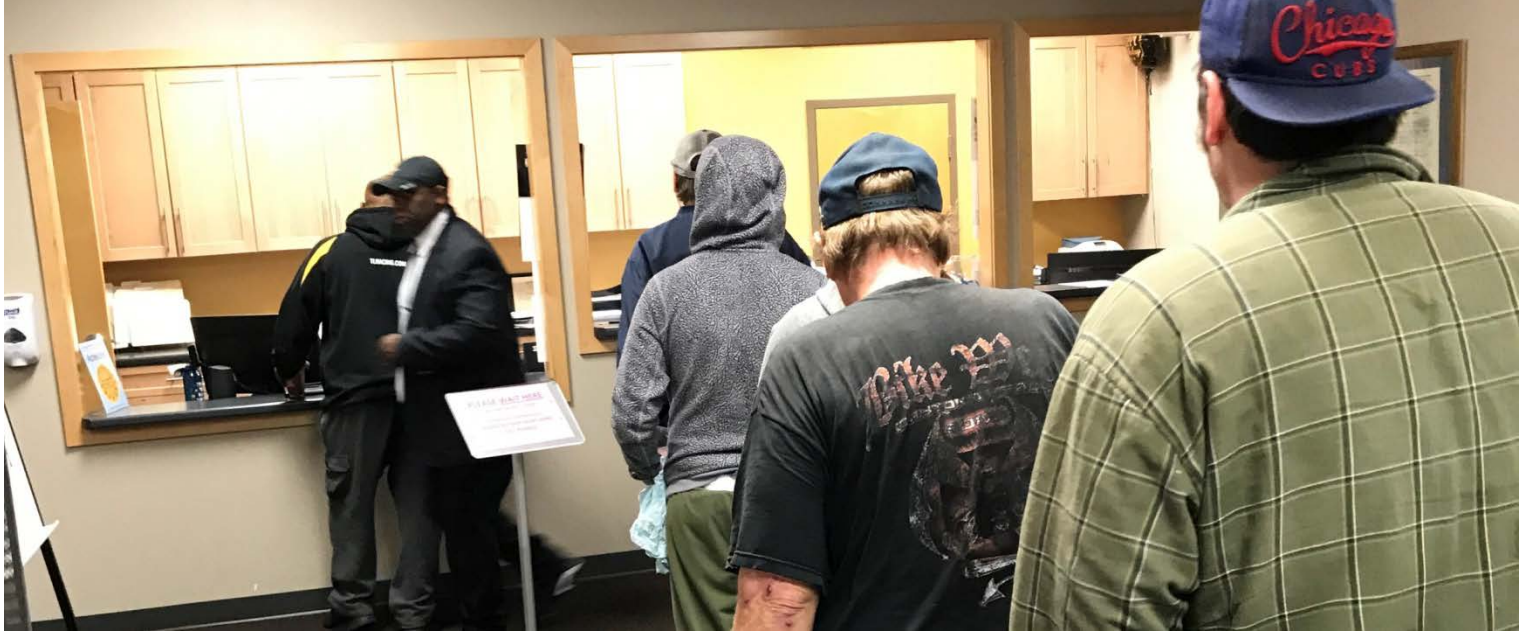
What is an OTP?

- Opioid treatment programs (OTPs) provide MAT for individuals diagnosed with an [opioid use disorder](#). OTPs also provide a range of services to reduce, eliminate, or prevent the use of illicit drugs, potential criminal activity, and/or the spread of infectious disease. OTPs focus on improving the quality of life of those receiving treatment.
- OTPs must be accredited by a [SAMHSA-approved accrediting body](#) and certified by SAMHSA. The [Division of Pharmacologic Therapies \(DPT\)](#), part of the [SAMHSA Center for Substance Abuse Treatment \(CSAT\)](#), oversees accreditation standards and certification processes for OTPs.
- Federal law requires patients who receive treatment in an OTP to receive medical, counseling, vocational, educational, and other assessment and treatment services, in addition to prescribed medication.

- Needs Assessment has been completed
- Strategic Plan in development
- Medication Units in Existing treatment centers

STR Approved Strategies

1. Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT)
2. MAT via telehealth or combined with in-person/on-site
3. Recovery Support Services (RSS)
4. Naloxone training/dissemination (service providers)
5. Naloxone training /dissemination (community)
6. Training of prevention and treatment staff
7. Training of healthcare workers and community
8. Services for patients with OUD re-entering communities from prison

What is a medication unit?

- Medication Units are facilities established as part of, but geographically separate from, an opioid treatment program from which licensed private practitioners or community pharmacists dispense or administer an opioid agonist treatment medication or collect samples for drug testing or analysis.

CFR 42, part 8, 8.2, 8.12

- Certified OTPs may establish medication units that are authorized to dispense opioid agonist treatment medications for observed ingestion.
- Before establishing a medication unit, a certified OTP must notify SAMHSA by submitting form SMA-162
- The OTP must also comply with the provisions of 21 CFR part 1300
- Medication units shall comply with all pertinent state laws and regulations

CFR 42, part 8, Subpart B, 8.11 (i)



Barriers

- There is a caveat; assessment and therapy cannot happen at the medication units.
- We have to set them up and take a risk before DEA will approve.
- CSAT won't approve until DEA approves, the system is not mature yet.
- Uncertainty how the MCOs and other third party payers will allow us to bill for the medication.
- Treatment Centers will need to learn about a new set of patients.
- Communities will need education about stigma and opioid addiction.
