<u>Code of Iowa 904A:</u> Board of Parole's primary role is to determine release from institutions.

<u>Code of Iowa 905:</u> Community-Based Corrections' primary role is to manage pre- and postinstitutional services for offenders.




Federal Court Orders:

 - 1. Health care 6. Exercise


 - 3. Access to religion 8. Discipline and




CBC Facts

- Residential bed capacity is 1,467


- On January 2, 2009, there were 3,266 staff employed in the institutions.
- The top 5 personnel classes in the institutions are:
 - Correctional Officer 1,634
 - Correctional Counselor 157
 - Registered Nurse 124
 - Correctional Food Service Coordinator 106
 - Correctional Trades Leader 85
- The institutions operate 24-hours a day, every day.
- It takes over 5 staff to cover a single, 24/7 post or job assignment.

In FY2001 the Institutions and Central Office employed 3,074 staff


- In FY2003 we added 106 staff for the Clinical Care Unit at Fort Madison
- In FY2005 we added 45 staff for new minimum beds at Clarinda
- In FY2007 we added 300 staff for the Special Needs Unit at Oakdale

In FY2008 the Institutions and Central Office employed 3,151 staff

The prison population increased 17.6% over the last ten years, from 7,431 to 8,740.



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
Advancing Successful Offender Reentry




Partnering with Outside Agencies


Reentry One Stop Centers in Polk and Black Hawk Counties

- One Stop Reentry Centers are an innovative approach to engaging offenders, families and neighborhoods in successful offender reintegration as well as strengthening families and the fabric of communities.
- The disproportionate incarceration rate of African-Americans is addressed by locating community-based resources in high crime rate African-American communities, increased hiring of African-American staff and effective collaboration with the African-American community and faith-based organizations.
- Primary substance abuse and mental health, education, and employment needs of offenders would be addressed through improved access to community-based resources.




Risk Identification:

Institution and CBC Top Priority Needs




Risk Management

- Managing offenders at the lowest security level possible consistent with public safety. Assigned to facility that best matches custody, treatment and reentry needs. The new classification system better reflects this belief.
- Reentry Case Plan negotiated and follows offender between institution and community setting.




Increased Offender Success: Probation

The number of probation revocations to prison dropped during the past fiscal year – mostly due to fewer new felony/aggravated misdemeanor convictions.

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SAVING LIVES: PREVENTING A TRAGEDY

The Mt. Pleasant Correctional Facility received a call from a woman stating she was the mother of one of our offenders, and she wanted to say good-bye to him because she had just slit her wrists. The Captain was able to track down information through the offender, ICON and phone calls to relatives. The Captain then contacted law enforcement out of state at the woman's location, and gave them the name and description of the caller. The authorities were able to locate the woman and deal with her needs – all within 42 minutes of the woman's call to the prison.

SUCCESSFUL REENTRY FOR THE MENTALLY ILL

CBC staff in the 8th District wrote that staff at the Clinical Care Unit had to work hard to prepare for the transition of a mentally ill offender to work release. A CCU Social Worker worked extensively with CPC's, Social Security Administration and others to ensure the offender's smooth transition from prison to the community. "The director and staff of the district that have been involved from our end believe that this was re-entry work at its best and a true collaborative effort," notes one CBC staff.

SUCCESSFUL REENTRY: CHANGING LIVES

Facing 25 years in prison for drug charges, an offender began receiving services at Goodwill Industries. His highly structured plan included work attendance expectations, curfew, and money management. He gained continuous employment, reached his savings goal and moved into his own apartment. Later he became a father and has taken responsibility for the care of his child. He completed probation successfully and was recently recognized as Goodwill Industries Northeast Iowa, Inc's Achiever of the year.





Reentry Issue: Mental Health

Offenders who are chronically mentally ill have much higher rates of return to prison than other offenders.

Major Reentry Issue: Substance Abuse Treatment Needs

- Institutions
 - Random sample of 320 incoming between 2005-07, 85% men, 91% women current disorder, substance abuse or dependence w/in last year (ICON Data Download 2008)
 - 78% men alcohol-use disorder during lifetime, 55.3% females
 - 93% met criteria for one lifetime psychiatric disorder, two-thirds met criteria for three or more
 - Approximately 60% released without treatment (Department of Management 2007)
 - CBCs
 - 75% identified with a substance abuse treatment need exit supervision (IDOC 2007)
 - 53% of the 75% identified as higher risk exit supervision without treatment (IDOC 2007)

Major Reentry Issue: Women Offenders

- Women offender populations have grown faster than male offender populations.
- More women offenders than men have substance abuse identified as a Priority One need.
- 67% of women offenders in institutions are mentally ill.
- Treatment resources in institutions and community-based corrections are a critical issue.

Gender-Responsive Case Management


- Women Offender Case Management Model (WOCMM) Technical Assistance Project
- Development and application of gender-specific assessments and interventions to reduce women's recidivism and increase healthy relationships among women offenders and their families
- Iowa one of three states piloting and evaluating
- ICIW expansion philosophically aligns with this evidence-based principle

Major Reentry Issue: Population Growth

- Increases in the following types of offenders have had a substantial impact on lowa's institutional and communitybased corrections populations:
 - Drug offenders
 - Sex offenders
 - Violent offenders (especially those subject to lowa Code 902.12 provisions)
 - Women offenders.
 - CJJP projects over 8,900 offenders in prison by mid-year 2018.

Major Issue: Aging Prison Population

The number of offenders older than 50 will rise over the next decade, from 912 at the end of FY08 to about 1,280 at the end of FY2018.



Increased Health Care Costs Expected


While offenders age 55 or older make up only about 4.8% of the prison population, they are responsible for:

- 10.2% of prescriptions
- 11.6% of medical conditions
- 13% of assistive devices
- 13.8% of nurse visits
- 10.3% of physician visits

Major Reentry Issue: Growth of CBC Sex Offenders

Increases in specialized caseloads, electronic monitoring costs, and treatment resources are expected.
