The Senate met in regular session at 9:03 a.m., President Sinclair presiding.

My vote yea represented an inadvertent and accidental use of the green button (Yea), when in fact I had intended to utilize the red button (Nay) in the vote. The President of the Senate had closed the voting system prior to my being able to change my vote. Let it herein be noted that I was not in favor of final passage of <u>House File 2319</u>.
