

Twelve-month Total Net Tax Receipts Through November 30, 2013

The attached spreadsheet presents net tax revenue deposited to State funds for the 12-month period ending November 2013 with comparisons to the previous twelve months. November 2012 to November 2013 one-month comparisons are also presented. The source of the information is the State accounting system, including non-General Fund accounts. All accounting transactions related to taxes remitted to the State were reviewed, along with the refunds issued against those taxes.



Overview of Current Situation

Although up 5.8% year-over-year, the rate of growth in Iowa annual net tax revenue has declined over the past six months. Of the \$417.0 million in annual tax revenue growth, 94.2% is growth in individual income tax receipts. Annual beer/wine, banking, cigarette/tobacco, fuel, gambling, and corporate tax revenue are all down on a year-over-year basis.

Month of November Comparison

November net tax receipts totaled \$708.0 million, an increase of \$18.8 million (2.7%) compared to November 2012. Major taxes and their contribution to the month's change include:

- Individual Income Tax (positive \$20.2 million, 7.0%)
- Sales/Use Tax (positive \$19.9 million, 6.8%)
 - Road Use Tax Fund use tax (fee for new vehicle registration) increased \$2.6 million.
 - General Fund sales/use tax receipts increased \$17.3 million. Gross sales/use tax receipts increased \$18.6 million, while regular tax refunds decreased \$2.0 million and school infrastructure transfers out increased \$3.3 million.
- Corporate Income Tax (negative \$4.3 million, - 42.2%)
- Fuel Tax (positive \$2.2 million, 5.9%)
- Cigarette and Tobacco Taxes (negative \$2.5 million, - 11.2%)
- Gambling Tax (negative \$10.2 million, - 34.9%) – There were five weekly gambling tax deposit dates in November 2012 but only four in November 2013. The November decrease reverses the monthly deposit date increase experienced in October.

Year-over-Year Comparison – Net Tax Revenue

During the 12-month period ending November 2013, net revenue from all taxes deposited to State funds totaled \$7.600 billion, an increase of \$417.0 million (5.8%) compared to the prior 12 months. Major contributors to the year-over-year dollar and percentage changes include:


- Individual Income Tax (positive \$392.9 million, 12.7%) – Individual income tax continues to post significant year-over-year annual growth with much of the gain the result of very positive tax year 2012 income tax final returns. Since the 2012 tax year impact began to influence General Fund revenue in mid-December 2012, the annual rate of growth should start to decline in mid-December 2013.
- Sales/Use Tax (positive \$70.0 million, 2.9%) – Sales/use tax receipts show gains over the past 12 months. However, at this time last year net sales/use tax was growing 5.9%.
- Corporate Income Tax (negative \$38.9 million, - 8.3%) – The corporate income tax produced significant revenue growth beginning May 2011, but year-over-year growth turned negative in October 2013.
- Fuel Tax (negative \$3.3 million, - 0.8%) – According to Department of Revenue monthly fuel sales reports, over the most recent 12-month period, Iowa taxable gasoline/ethanol gallons sold decreased 1.7% while taxable diesel sales increased 2.6%. The annual total for all taxable gallons fuel sold in Iowa is currently 3.0% below the last peak (12 months ending September 2011).
- Gambling Tax (negative \$13.7 million, - 4.5%) – According to Racing and Gaming Commission statistics, 14 of Iowa's 18 casino/track locations recorded negative annual adjusted gross revenue (AGR) growth for the 12-month period ending November 2013. The combined AGR change for the 18 facilities was negative 3.0% over the previous 12-months. Across all facilities, the AGR for the most recent 12 months totaled \$1.426 billion. The annual AGR total has been declining and is 3.0% below the November 2012 peak.
- Real Estate Transfer Tax (positive \$2.8 million, 16.3%) – After the strong gains posted in recent months, annual real estate transfer tax receipts total \$20.0 million and exceed the pre-recession peak of \$19.2 million set in June, 2006.

- Cigarette and Tobacco Tax (negative \$8.3 million, - 3.6%)

Tax Spotlight – Gambling Tax


Pari-mutuel wagering and gambling (excursion boats, gambling structures, and racetracks) are taxed under the authority of Iowa Code Chapters 99D and 99F. Taxes applied to pari-mutuel wagering and gambling are as follows:

- The pari-mutuel tax on horse racing is 6.0% of the gross sum wagered. However, if the gross sum wagered is less than \$90.0 million then the net tax is 0.0%. If the gross sum wagered is \$90.0 million or above, the net tax is 1.0% due to a tax credit based on the gross sum wagered. There is currently one establishment in Iowa that has horse racing.
- The pari-mutuel tax on dog racing is 4.0% of the gross sum wagered of \$30.0 million or less, 5.0% between \$30.0 million and \$55.0 million, and 6.0% on \$55.0 million or more. There are currently two establishments in Iowa that offer dog racing.
- The pari-mutuel tax on simulcast races is 2.0% of the gross sum wagered. There are currently three establishments in Iowa that offer wagering on simulcast races.
- On casino games, the State wagering tax is 5.0% of the first \$1.0 million of adjusted gross gambling receipts, 10.0% of the next \$2.0 million, and 22.0% of adjusted gross receipts over \$3.0 million. If the entity offering gambling is a racetrack, then the maximum rate can increase to 24.0% if the amount of adjusted gambling receipts is \$100.0 million or more. In addition to the three racetracks that offer gambling, there are 15 other casinos in Iowa with gaming subject to the State wagering tax in Iowa.




Tax Revenue and Employment


The average reading for Iowa nonfarm employment over the 12 months ending October 2013 is 1,523,700 and net State tax receipts over the same 12 months totaled \$7.600 billion, or \$4,976 per nonfarm job. This is \$1,191 higher than the per-job average for the 12 months ending June 2005. The blue line on the following chart depicts the annual tax revenue collected by the State per job, calculated monthly. The red line subtracts the impact of inflation since June 2005 from the blue line. The red line indicates that inflation adjusted tax revenue per job has increased \$359 since June 2005 and the remainder of the \$1,191 increase (\$832) represents the impact of inflation.

Tax Categories Used in Table

Franchise (Bank) Tax: The franchise tax paid by banks is deposited in the State General Fund. Credit unions are taxed under a different system than banks, but the credit union tax is included in this line also. Of the total deposited, the bank tax provides approximately 98.0% of the revenue and the credit union tax 2.0%.

Beer & Liquor Tax: Taxes on beer, liquor, and wine are deposited in the State General Fund, the Liquor Control Fund, and a small amount is deposited in an Iowa Economic Development Authority fund for wine promotion.

Cigarette & Tobacco Tax: Prior to July 1, 2011, all cigarette and tobacco products tax revenue was deposited to the State General Fund. Beginning FY 2012, the first \$106.0 million of revenue from cigarette and tobacco taxes is deposited to the Health Care Trust Fund and the remainder is deposited to the State General Fund. Beginning FY 2014, all cigarette and tobacco tax revenue is deposited to the Health Care Trust Fund.

Corporate Income Tax: All corporate income tax is deposited in the State General Fund.

Motor Vehicle Fuel Tax: All motor vehicle fuel tax is deposited in one of two road use funds, with the exception of tax revenue from the sale of aviation and marine fuels.

Gambling Tax: Gambling tax is deposited in several State funds. For FY 2013, \$40.0 million was deposited to the General Fund and the remainder to other State funds. Other funds receiving deposits of gambling tax revenue over the last 24 months include the School Infrastructure Fund, the Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund, the County Endowment Fund, the Vision Iowa Fund, the Revenue Bond Debt and Subsidy Holdback Funds, the Technology Reinvestment Fund, and the Iowa Skilled Worker and Job Creation Fund.

Individual Income Tax: Most individual income tax revenue is deposited in the State General Fund. A total of \$4.0 million per year is deposited in the Workforce Development Fund. An annual \$2.6 million diversion to the Child Daycare Fund ended in FY 2009. In addition, several economic development programs are financed by individual income tax withholding. In those instances, the employer does not remit the tax withheld from employees and it is never deposited in a State fund. That revenue is not included here.

Inheritance Tax: All inheritance tax is deposited in the State General Fund.

Insurance Premium Tax: All insurance premium tax is deposited in the State General Fund.

Other Taxes: Other taxes include brucellosis eradication property tax (deposited in a Department of Agriculture and Land Stewardship fund), drug stamp tax (State General Fund), utility replacement property tax (State General Fund), and car rental tax (Road Use Tax Fund). Other taxes also include a suspense account used to hold tax deposits prior to determining the correct tax type for the money and tax revenue transferred by the Department of Revenue to separate accounts to fund tax collection activities (tax gap and Department operations).

Real Estate Transfer Tax: Real estate transfer tax is collected by counties. Counties retain 17.25% and remit the remainder to the State. The distribution of State portion of real estate transfer tax revenue is currently changing each fiscal year, with the State General Fund portion reduced to 65.0% by FY 2015. The portion not deposited to the State General Fund is deposited to the Housing Trust Fund and the Shelter Assistance Fund.

Sales/Use Tax: General sales/use tax is deposited in the State General Fund, while most vehicle use tax is deposited in the Road Use Tax Fund. Beginning FY 2009, the vehicle use tax is referred to as a fee in the Iowa Code. To allow continuity of data, the revenue from the fee is reflected in this document as tax revenue. Also beginning FY 2009, the School Infrastructure Local Option (SILO) sales tax was converted to a statewide 1.0% sales/use tax and the revenue from that statewide tax is transferred out of the State General Fund monthly through a refund appropriation. To allow for continuity of data, the refund transfers are subtracted from State revenue as part of the net sales/use tax calculation.

Local Option Taxes: Local option taxes are presented at the bottom of the table and are not included in the numbers above. Prior to FY 2009, local option taxes included the SILO tax, Local Option Sales Tax (LOST) for local government finance, Local Option Income Surcharge for schools, and hotel/motel tax. Beginning FY 2009, the SILO tax was converted to a 1.0% statewide tax and the SILO was eliminated. To allow for continuity of data, the transfers from the State General Fund as a result of the 1.0% statewide tax are included in the local option tax amount.

Report Database - The database for this report is the State accounting system. If transactions are incorrectly coded in the system as tax revenue or tax refunds, the numbers presented here will be impacted.
